LONDON'S EXPENSIVE FOG

Last Week's Awful Days of Gloom Allowed Successful Test of an Ingenious Device.

London, Dec. 24.—The blackest fog ten years' was what people said about the fog on Wednesday, but the "densest when living memory" was what they said of it on Thursday.

This is all the more remarkable considering that it had been thought London was shaking itself free to a certain extent from heavy fogs, owing to there being less smoke than there used to be in years past.

The fog came down the day succeeding Thursday evening. People went to places of amusement in comparative clearness, and came out about 11 to find themselves in a thick fog. It was not then very bad, but worse was to follow.

The real trouble began on Wednesday morning. It was not a fog such as fell upon London a few weeks ago, when Egyptian darkness and a few yards further on in light, with blue sky overhead, but a black, blinding fog, which enveloped not only London, and the country far into the north, disorganizing traffic on both sea and land.

Such a fog, so dense and dangerous, to attempt to cross the street, except where a certain amount of regulation, was at the risk of one's life.

On Thursday, in particular, walking on the pavements it was impossible to see even the curbstone. The omnibus drivers had to leave their streets, and lead the horses along the streets, while the conductors tried to pilot the way with lanterns.

Had it been in the city, it was even worse. In Westminster way, all over Down Westminister, in fact, brilliantly lighted shops were quite useless to light up even the pavements, while the middle of the roads was wrapped in impenetrable darkness.

JUDGE FREES 15 PRISONERS OF COURT ATTACHE'S CHOICE

But One Recipient of Ante-Xmas Mercy Was Sorry to Leave a Comfortable Cell.

New York, Dec. 24.—Ante-Christmas mercy was dispensed in an unusual manner by Judge Frank J. Higgins on the first criminal court in Jersey City today.

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ABOLITION OF PASSPORTS FORWARD MOVE OF RUSSIA

Takes Local Effect at Once and Foreigners Will Be Included at End of War.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 24.—For the present the abolition of the passport system, announced by Interior Minister Sviatopolk-Mirsky, will only apply to Russians, and not to foreigners, although it is intended that the end of the war will abolish the system governing foreigners also.

The abolition, so far as tourists are concerned, will be a great help and material assistance, as in the case of Russians.

The present passport system constitutes more annoyance than the actual restriction of legitimate tourists. No one, no matter how well known, is permitted to cross the frontiers without a passport.

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MRS. CHADWICK DENIES HUSBAND'S PENDING ARREST

Asks Sheriff to Treat Him Well, and Says it is Worst That Has Happened.

Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 25.—Sheriff Barry left for Albany and New York tonight, carrying with him the papers for the arrest of Dr. Leroy S. Chadwick, who is expected to land at New York on the steamship Pretorian some time Wednesday morning.

This afternoon Mrs. Chadwick showed unusual nervousness. She finally sent for the sheriff with the statement that she wanted to talk over the trip to New York with the impending arrest of her husband. The sheriff spent almost an hour with the woman in her cell, during which time she wept convulsively.

"I know you will treat the circumstances as kindly as possible under the circumstances, but please remember that he is innocent of any wrongdoing," said Mrs. Chadwick, as the sheriff entered her jail quarters.

The coroner explored the indictment against her husband, and said it was an awful mistake. "This is the worst thing that has happened to me in the few weeks," said Mrs. Chadwick. "I never thought my husband would be dragged into this. It is so unjust, for if ever an honest man lived, it is in the clothes of my husband."

Several times she referred to the doctor as "my dear husband," and she said that she would do anything to help him. She was able to make the situation as easy as possible for her step-daughter.
