CANADIAN FORESTRY JOURNAL

The October number of the Canadian Forestry Journal is of special interest to the view of the Canadian forestry convention which is held in Ottawa in January next.

The first article is a sketch of "The Montreal Forest Congress" held in Montreal in 1882. This meeting gave the impetus to selling in the establishment of the fire-ranger service which has saved from destruction large areas of forest throughout Canada.

"Woodland Taxation," by Dr. J. D. Clark, Forester for the Province of Ontario, is a practical article of great value and will help materially towards a clearer understanding of the effects of such taxation and of the principles on which it should be based. Other articles are "Tree Planting in the West," by Norman M. Rose, assistant superintendent of forestry for Canada; "West African Forests and Forestry," by Dr. A. Harold Unwin; "The Bahr el Jebel Forests in Ontario," "Forest Fire in Ontario." Two splendid illustrations of the timber north of Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, demonstrate that the west has good forest as well as fertile fields.

The Canadian Forestry Journal is published in Ottawa by the Canadian Forestry Association, and is a publication of great interest and value.

F. J. McPeck, superintendent of the N. B. Southern Railway, is ill with pleurisy at his home in Carleton Place.

Announcement was made recently that the wages of union miners in Alabama would be advanced 25 cents per ton, the average selling price of iron working this increase. The maximum wage of 575 cents a ton will be paid the coal miners from now on.

Amsterdam, Holland stevedores are on strike. The paid-up membership of the American Federation of Labor was, at the time of its last report, 1,750,000.

The plans are ready for the meeting of the American Federation of Labor on Wednesday, November 15. The convention, which will be the silver anniversary, will be held in Pittsburgh, the most important event ever held by the federation.

There are in the United States 312,270 manufacturing establishments, employing a total of 108,383 children under sixteen years of age. The total wages of these children for the year preceding the census was \$2,691,692, or an average of \$132 per year for each child. This is about \$5 per week.

Within the next three months Mississippi planters expect to receive several thousand Italian laborers who will be employed in the cotton fields of the state next season.

The German government spends \$100,000 a year for the benefit and encouragement of sea fishing, and contributes about \$15,000 a year towards the expenses of the German Sea Fishery Association.

The November issue of the American Federationist, official publication of the American Federation of Labor, contains a vigorous article on the subject of Chinese Exclusion.

The organized workmen of New York are carrying on a vigorous educational campaign among the voters of the State on the issue of the "Labor Amendment" to the State Constitution.

Forty-five damage suits, growing out of evictions of miners last winter were filed against the leading coal companies in the bituminous fields of Charleston, W. Va. The total amount of damages asked for is \$112,000.

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GARBAGE SYSTEM Ottawa May Lead St. John in This Important Matter.

(Ottawa Free Press.) It is practically certain that Ottawa will have before long a system of garbage disposal.

The board of works met last night to consider the question and to examine into the report prepared by City Engineer Ker and Alderman Askwith, who this summer made an inspection of various systems in a number of the most important American cities.

After some discussion of the advantages of reduction plants, incinerators and the destruction systems, it was decided to adopt the principle of the latter. The details, however, were not gone into, but further and no doubt definite consideration will be given these at another meeting to be held Wednesday evening next.

The adoption of a distribution system would mean the giving of the contract to a contractor, whose duty would be to collect the garbage certain days in the week and dispose of it in whatever way he chooses, only he must take it outside the city limits. City Engineer Ker in the specifications he drew up for the guidance of the would be tenderers, has it specified that the collection of the garbage must be made regularly and the carts must be of a special design to be approved by the city engineer and the board of health. The carts would be closed ones, more like tanks with proof covers so that there would be no offensive odor. The horses and harness must also be well kept and "respectable." The collectors must also wear a khaki uniform.

THE KINDERGARTEN
The visit of Inspector Hughes of Toronto to this city, and his address on Thursday evening on kindergarten work should draw public attention more fully and favorably toward the essential part of the work of education.

Writing to the Times on this subject, one who is deeply interested in kindergarten work says:
"Kindergarten was far ahead of his time, and indeed that we treat our children as individual spiritual beings and teach them to perceive things in this connection, holding that the child comes into the world with a natural sense of the ideal.

When professional and art schools are opened up for grown-up youth only, they cannot begin what was lost in childhood. One can readily see the effect of this kind of education, among the poor and neglected especially, the little ones whose chances otherwise are small for lessons in love, courtesy and usefulness here isolated, and their inimitable value as a foundation for good citizenship, in a class which costs the state much for punishment, without relieving it of constant menace, and all to no purpose for the reclamation of the individual.

WORK FOR ST. JOHN
There are now in this city lumber and pulp mills and wood-working factories, lime kilns, cotton mills, corn mills, rolling mills, foundries, nail factories, brass works, engine and boiler works, brush and broom factories, paper box factories, cigar factories, biscuit and candy factories, tea blending and packing houses, fish curing and packing houses, pork packing houses, carriage factories, vinegar factories, axe and other edge tool factories, tannery, saw works, paint and lead works, glass works, wire fence and mattress works, machine shops, and numerous other industries. Harness, clothing, fur, hals, blankets, hosiery, furniture, mantles and grates, stoves and other lines are manufactured. Spices, coffee, essence, and other such goods are prepared and packed.

ELECTRIC RAILROADS
Electricity may be introduced in the operation of the Transatlantic Railway in Ontario. The chief engineer of the railway, Mr. C. B. Smith, has just returned from Europe, where he looked into the working of electric roads and became convinced that they were operated successfully. The Toronto World, in a report of an interview with him, says:
"Mr. Smith inspected a number of electric railroads, while on the continent, and found that some of them were greatly superior to the best in America. He was informed that the operation was cheaper than by steam, and that the more frequent service built up the traffic. Motor cars were used for the passenger and electric locomotives for the freight service. The Italian electric roads gave a particularly fine service, the passenger trains running at from 35 to 45 miles an hour, and the freight trains from 27 to 29."

OTAWA WANTS REFORM
The Ottawa Citizen states that "There is talk of the formation of Ottawa of a Citizens' Municipal League, made up of those who take an intelligent interest in municipal affairs and are anxious that proper men to safeguard the public interest be elected to the city council. A number of citizens are discussing the formation of such a league and the Citizen says, "It is hoped to have it under way and exerting influence in the forthcoming civic campaign."

MAN AND MACHINERY
Type-setting machines were introduced a few years ago in the production of daily newspapers, each machine doing the work of several men. They destroyed the trade for a time, changed it permanently, but they did not destroy it. Today, notwithstanding the use of these machines, more men are engaged in producing a daily newspaper than was the case when type was set by hand. The setting of type by machinery has so cheapened and expedited the work that newspapers have doubled and tripled in circulation; they have grown more numerous. From the backwoods, where men cut and ship pulpwood, through the pulp and paper mills, the warehouses, the printing office, the ink factories, the type and press foundries, the news-stands, right to the homes of the people, where enlarged and cheapened newspapers enter daily, increased employment has been given to men by the introduction of the type-setting machine. And yet its finest effect seemed to be to throw skillful men out of work. Still, it is not true that in such the same way every labor-saving machine in time restores the balance that it temporarily disturbs? In the case of the type-setting machine it was a necessity. Hand-setting was too slow. It could not handle the piles of copy that poured in from all corners of the world. In carrying written news the steel locomotive had outstripped the horse and the telegraph had outdistanced the locomotive. When human hands could not set the type fast enough, the human brain devised machinery that could do it.

BRITISH AND AMERICAN TARS SAT SIDE BY SIDE

New York, Nov. 13—Prince Louis of Battenberg passed today in a stately and would have tested the stamina of a political candidate engaged in a campaign of the whitening order, and stood the strain with a fortitude worthy of a British admiral. He began the round of entertainments with a reception at the chamber of commerce where he was greeted by a representative gathering of captains of commerce and financiers.

From the banquet a special train bore the prince and his suite back to New York in time to appear at the home show where his entrance was the signal for a tumultuous welcome from a great assembly of representatives of the fashion and wealth not only of the metropolis, but of all the principal cities of the union.

Three cheers were given to Rear Admiral Prince Louis, then to Rear Admiral Evans. Leaving the dinner for a few moments they went into the balcony and gazed upon the impressive scene. Every sailorman was on his feet, waving his cap and led by a quartermaster at the end of the hall the mighty company cheered as only British and American sailors can cheer—clean cut, altogether and far-reaching until the sounds reached across the sea that beat on Conroy's shore.

Another inspiring scene occurred when, after eating a hearty dinner, exactly the same as that to which each sailor set down, the two admirals came down the centre of the pavilion, between the solid ranks of cheering blue-jackets. The prince had an engagement at the home show and was compelled to leave the banquet early. As he did so he stopped to congratulate the Quartermaster Schumacher of the Maine, who, as chairman of the committee on arrangements and reception had supervised the entire preparations for the dinner. The prince then shook hands with each of the "side boys" who were lined up at the entrance to pipe the two admirals "over the side."

Three admirals in the vicinity of the Bowerly pavilion looked as if midnight had returned. Inside, the picture was one which surprised even the most experienced who had worked all night in its construction. Overhead a fringe of British and American flags stretched around the hall.
