The Halifax Recorder of Saturday states that the R.M. Steamer Belmont arrived at that port on Friday morning, in a passage of 12 days from Liverpool. She experienced much difficulty in getting along, and was not able to get over 100 miles. On the one day she could not get over 100 miles. The Mail arrived in this city on Saturday evening. The same old and monotonous routine was remarked last week, previous to the Belmont's arrival. There are pretty large arrivals from abroad at Liverpool, but those at Liverpool are to a moderate extent. The millers are in general pretty well supplied, and, as we last week observed, there is not any immediate prospect of an advance in price.

The cotton market has been exceedingly quiet during the week. The accounts of the state of trade are not very encouraging at Manchester. The demand for Goods and Yarns is but limited; there is not, however, any change in prices. The advances per Overland Mail has tended to retard the operations of buyers. The inquiry for Manchester goods is confined to a limited extent, but prices in general are well maintained.

LORD GOUCHER.—Letters have been received in London, stating that Lord and Lady Gough may be expected to arrive in England about the close of January. The Lordship will no doubt be received with the greatest possible enthusiasm by all classes of his countrymen. Lord Gough is now nearly 70 years of age, 55 of which have been passed in the military service of his country.—London Globe.

CANADA.—The Montreal papers state that the amount of produce daily finding its way by Laprairie and the Richelieu to the States, is quite unprecedented in the history of previous years. The exports are regularly clothed with flour, potatoes, and other articles.

STOCKS OF GOODS OF ALL KINDS are extremely low in Montreal at the present time. Many more merchants in the city are supposed all lands perished, and have all but cleaned out the stocks of dry goods and groceries of wholesale dealers.
