### Britain Must Assert Rights in Egypt, Says Colonial Secretary

Birmingham, Nov. 29-Colonial Secretary Amery, in a speech here, delared Britain held a position in Egypt which she was unable to abandon. "For three years we have shown amazing forebearance. More than our ights we do not claim, but these we do claim and intend to assert.

"The murder of the Sirdar only hastened our assertion," he said,

#### Refuses Aged Suitor, Father Kills Her

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 29—Because his daughter, 14 years old, refuses to marry the man he had chosen for her, Salvatore Giglia shot and killed, the girl and then ended his own life. Before committing the murder he had removed his other child, a girl of 10, to his parents' home, some distance away.

Giglia and his family came to this country nine years ago and a year later his wife died. Since then Giglia, a consumptive, has spent some years in public hospitals.

Giglia had hoped to see the eldef girl safely settled before he died and was anxious that she accept an elderly suitor acceptable to the father. The child refused, however, and recently family disputes have been heated, the neighbors tell the police.

## SITUATION IN THE SUDAN SERIOUS

Believed in London It Will Not be Necessary to Reconquer.

**MUTINEERS GIVE IN** 

Two British Officers Were Killed and Eight Men Wounded.

BY H. W. BAILEY (British United Press.)

London, Nov. 29 .- General Allenby has been given a free and by the British Government to take whatever measures he deems necessary for the preservation of the British hold on Egypt, regardless of their severity and for the preservation of order under the British suzerainty in the Sudan.

The government is determined to uphold the British authority in both Egypt and the Sudan, a British official told the British United Press this morning, and to suppress every manifestation of anti-British sentiment.

May Not Have to Reconquer. Mutiny of Sudan regiments yester-CROW'S NEST PASS day has done something to dampen the ptimism of the British Government that the crisis would pass off without Alberta Liberal Convention Rejects Resolution For Restoraserlous disorder. Experts are confident, owever, that the British can retain calgary, Alta., Nov. 29.—Strong opposition from delegates representing widely separated sections of the province resulted in the rejection, by Alberta Liberals in convention here of a resolution calling upon the Dominion Government to restore the Crow's Nest Pass agreement.

The convention went on record against a "wide-open" policy of immigration of white races from all countries in Europe.

The mutiny among the troops was confined to two platoons of the eleventh Sudanese and the mutineers who survived surrendered after a bombardment of the compound of the Egyptian army hospital. Two British officers were killed and eight men wounded.



In regard to the statement that the medicine was a "valuable preparation in the treatment of tuberculosis and diseases of the pulmonary tract," he said that doctors had testified that no one medicine known was of benefit in all diseases of the pulmonary tract. They had said that what might help in one case of asthma might harm in another.

in one case of asthma might harm in another.

Doctors had also testified that there was nothing known to science which could be administered by injection or in the form of medicine which would kill the bacillus of tuberculosis.

As far as the treatment of symptoms of the disease was concerned, the plaintiffs had told of a case of "night sweats" being stopped in two days. Doctors had testified that the only medicines which would do this were of such a nature that their inclusion in a preparation were illegal unless the name was on the label.

The defence, he said, had obtained an analysis of the medicine from one of the most competent authorities in the Dominion. There was nothing in it which doctors had testified was of any value in the quantities found for the treatment of tuberculosis or diseases of the pulmonary tract.

He said that the article in question had been written before the campaign for the sale of the preparation had been commenced but had been published afterwards.

Malice was claimed by the plaintiffs.

Did the júry think that Dr. Farris was actuated by any feeling of hatred or dislike for the men making the preparation or did they think he was more likely to be actuated by motives having to do with the guarding and protecting of the public health, he asked.

Captain Firmin is one of the three adventurers concerned in the gun-running exploit which ended in enormous fines. The others are Captain C. H. Attield, D. S. O., and C. P. Himman. 




