RED HAIR MAKES FOR POPULARITY, SCIENCE FINDS, BLUE EYES AID

London, May 20.—(By mail.)—It has always been mildly distinguished to have red hair, and science, through the investigation of Professor Karl Pearon into "the relation of health and the psychical and physical characteristics in school children" has discovered that it is also a short cut to popularity, reports The Westminster Gazette. The path, apparently, is made easier by the possession of blue eyes. Red-haired girls enjoy the advantage to a less marked degree than red-haired boys; but, on the other hand, they gain something in the estimation of their acquaintances by having wavy locks, whereas, unless a boy's hair is red, it is totally uninteresting to his own kind. Whether, as the professor believes, boys of nineteen feel the same indifference to the locks, smooth or otherwise, of the opposite sex is a little more doubtful, and we should expect a little more discrimination from the red-headed section of the community. Be that as it may, it is at least a less controversial matter than the relation of brains and athletic power. It will be a comfort to many a perplexed and dubious parent to reflect that the two are quite often found together. Though Professor Pearson is a little cautious he gives us to understand that it is the bright rather than the dull child who makes the best athlete—a conclusion which will still leave it open to question whether intellectual progress follows naturally and inevitably upon the heels of devotion to games even for the red-haired.

The transmitting machine, which was invented by M. Belin, has now been installed in the Rue de Grenelle post office. The telegram is placed on a revolving cylinder. Over the surface of the paper runs a needle, which in its movements breaks and restores an electric current. Special ink is used in writing the telegram, so that the words are in slight relief above the surface of the paper. The delicate needle strikes the obstacle made by the letters, is jerked upwards and interrupts the electric circuit. These interruptions are all registered at the receiving end, and the result is that by an inverse process the exact pattern of the written telegram is reproduced and this "tele-autograph" is delivered to the addressee.
