Four yards of 44-inch crepe de chine will make the dress, and a yard of satin will be required for the belt, with 3/4 yard of lace for the vest.

With the exception of the stay, the pieces of the pattern are all placed either on a lengthwise fold of the material or a lengthwise thread. The importance of this may be realized when it is stated that any variation from the rule is likely to cause a break in the perfect lines of the dress.

The construction of the dress is not difficult, the waist being similar to other models that have appeared in this column, especially as regards the overlapping back. In making the skirt, though the upper front part of back gore should be finished on double "oo" perforation for an opening to pass the satin or ribbon through.

No material is used to greater extent than crepe for the making of dressy frocks for late spring and summer. Delicate shades of greenish yellow are in great demand, and they look very rich cabbaged with dark brown satin.

Addressing the London chamber of commerce yesterday the British trade commissioner to Canada declared that if Canada had not granted a preference to Great Britain trade with the Dominion would by this time have been practically nil.

BAPTIST MINISTERS.

(Maritime Baptist.) Rev. E. O. Steeles of Nictaux Falls, N. S., is visiting Albert County enjoying a brief vacation at his former home.

The news that the thermometer registered 84 at Fredericton yesterday aroused a feeling of envy under the winter overcoats of St. John people.

The community council in Fairville should have great success with its tag-day and there should be the desired surplus after the playground is provided for to erect a bandstand.

But for the protest of Mr. Carvell, the bill providing for the Valley Railway bridges would have gone to its second reading yesterday in a form that would have delayed work for a year. Mr. Hazen was not in the house.

Judging from the discussion in parliament yesterday, Hon. Mr. Rogers is not greatly impressed with the need of an 1150 ft. dry dock at St. John. The city council and board of trade should endeavor to get some definite information on this subject.

The return of Colonel Roosevelt to New York after his long hunting expedition and exploring tour in South America was not accompanied by any display of fireworks. As this is an off season in politics the fireworks may come later.

The Church in Wales has been disestablished. The bill passed its third reading in the house of commons last night, with a majority of 77 votes, and under the operation of the Parliament Act now becomes law. The measure was bitterly fought by the church dignitaries, but popular sentiment had decided the change and parliament has registered the popular will.

The announcement that the provincial government will bear the cost of a trestle to be used while a concrete bridge is being built, to carry the street railway and general traffic over the deep depression in the road near the company Home, makes it easier for the company to complete the extension of its line to East St. John. The extension of the line to East St. John and to Coldbrook this summer will encourage more people to make homes in the suburbs, and also emphasizes the need of appointing a town-planning commission and having a town-plan prepared without delay.

Sir Edward Carson declared yesterday that he would rather die than see Ulster under Home Rule. Sir Edward is the most pronounced fanatic of modern times. Unhappily a man in his position wields considerable influence. Nevertheless, open defiance of the King and constitution by Sir Edward and his followers will not deter the government from carrying out its policy. It desires Home Rule by consent, and is making every effort to bring about that result. If it fails because of the obstinacy of Sir Edward Carson and other Unionist leaders it must still go on with its Home Rule policy.

There has been no difference of opinion regarding the need of taking some action to place the affairs of the Canadian Northern Railway on a more satisfactory basis. The controversy has arisen over the extent to which the government of the country should go, and the nature and extent of the security it should demand for its financial outlay. The contention of the Liberals in parliament, and they are backed by Messrs. Bennett and Nickle in the Conservative ranks, is that the Borden government is giving too much to MacKenzie & Mann, and not making the country sufficiently safe in the matter of security. The government has forced the bill providing for the issue of bonds through its first reading, but the fight is by no means over. The Liberals on the second reading will introduce amendments and

OTTAWA WAITERS PETITION AGAINST THE NO TIPS BILL

Ottawa, May 20.—In the senate yesterday a petition of the Chateau Frontenac waiters against the anti-tipping bill of Senator Davis was read. It stated that should tipping be made illegal waiters would be fortunate if proprietors paid salaries of \$75 a month, and upon that a man with a family could not live and dress as a waiter was obliged to do, and that all of the forty-five waiters in the Frontenac were opposed to the bill. Belief was expressed that ninety per cent of the waiters of Canada were against it. The petition stated that tipping was now optional and should be no longer optional.

GOOD YEAR FOR THE INSURANCE PEOPLE

Regina, May 20.—The insurance companies did an exceptionally good year's business in Saskatchewan during the last year. According to a statement issued by A. E. Fisher, superintendent for insurance for the province, the amount which the life insurance companies had at risk was \$41,996,300.90; the premium income was \$1,865,901.19, and the loss paid amounted to \$220,545.64. The fire insurance companies had at risk \$112,308,446.60, the premium income was \$2,427,848.54, and the loss paid \$1,271,088.65. The fire loss ratio was 52.36 per cent, or in other words, the loss paid amounted to a little more than half of the total premium income, which is an exceptionally good showing. The biggest fire of the year was at Big River Lumber Company's plant, where approximately 121-2 per cent of the fire insurance premium income was lost.

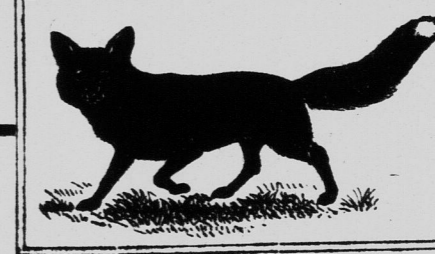

FOUND ACOUSTICS ALL RIGHT. Missourian Found His Voice Suited Hall Back Home. H. Building in Regina. Regina, May 20.—That building operations are materially improving is shown by the fact that permits issued by the Regina building inspector during April were for buildings of an aggregate value of \$408,100.

THE HEAVIEST OFFICE BUILDING IN THE WORLD. (Engineering News.) The Equitable Building, now under construction in New York City, from its great area presents an interesting problem in heavy erection. It will be the heaviest office building in the world when finished. The steel erection was made especially difficult by extensive cross-lot timber bracing, which holds the basement retaining wall until sufficient steel work has been installed to take the load. It was necessary to set the derricks and with them erect the steel-work for the three stories below ground, all without damage to the cross-lot bracing.

The new building will be about 160 x 312 feet in plan and about 600 feet above the street and sixty-five feet below at lowest point. It is considered a thirty-six-story building, but there will be intermediate floors at the third and thirty-fourth floor levels, making thirty-eight floor levels. The elevators, stairways, lavatories, smoke-stack, etc., will be placed in the centre or core of the building. All offices will have an exterior exposure. The steel-work was erected to the second floor by six steel girders, with seventy-six foot masts and sixty-five foot booms. The heaviest column weighs thirty-two tons. Above the second floor the heaviest piece to be handled weighs about sixteen tons, and 15-ton derricks with 80-ft. masts and 85-ft. booms replaced the original six. The longer reach of these lighter derricks rendered them much more useful in handling material from the street.

After the steel-work west of wall columns 7 and 125 was erected, derricks proceeded to erect the basement steel-work eastward, moving forward along the basement steel, erecting steel-work ahead, similar to the moving of a traveler. In this way, liability of accident to the cross-lot bracing was reduced, and the expense of building bents for supporting the derricks was eliminated. The total steel aggregates 38,000 tons. It is shipped to Greenville, N. J., lighter over to New York city in the vicinity of the Battery, and trucked to the job. Each derrick handles the steel from the street for its particular section.

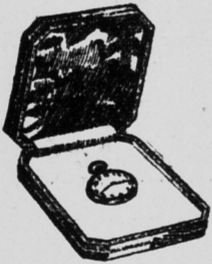

Among the pitchers Condon has won all his three games in the box. Dederich of Lynn has won two and lost one. Only his own and lost one. Woodbury lost the only one he worked in.
