FARMING CONDITIONS

A writer in November Lippincott's declares that in the United States the movement away from the eastern farms to the great cities has been checked, and that hereafter farming will steadily grow more in favor. The following four reasons for the change are given:— 1—There are no longer cheap or free western lands to compete.

NIGHT SCHOOLS

It has been suggested at a meeting of the council of the Board of Trade that night classes might be conducted in the public schools, to give technical instruction to young men engaged in trades and desirous of increasing their knowledge and efficiency. To make such classes of real benefit it would be necessary to provide suitable apparatus and practical teachers. It is really a large question, but one that deserves the most serious attention.

The history of night schools in St. John has not been encouraging. Several attempts have been made to establish winter classes, but with rather poor results. If now an effort were made, backed by such an organization as the board of trade, the conditions would be more favorable and no doubt better results would be obtained.

CHAMP CLARK AND OTHERS Champ Clark asserts that nine-tenths of the people of the United States favor the annexation of Canada. Perhaps they do. Canada is worth having. But the nine-tenths, with the exception of Champ Clark and a few more libeled political demagogues, have too keen a sense of what is due to themselves and a friendly neighbor, to give any expression to such views.

CANVASSING THE WOMEN

The Socialists and the suffragettes are very much in the public eye in the city of Los Angeles. At the primary, in the contest for mayor, the Socialist candidate polled the largest vote, but did not get a majority over all. He must therefore run another election, with the next highest candidate as his opponent. The latter is the candidate of what is called the "Good Government" party. There were five candidates in the primary. Harrison, Socialist, got 29,117 votes; and Alexander, "Good Government," 16,730. In the final contest between Harrison and Alexander, on Dec. 5th, much will depend upon what the women do. It is expected that 40,000 of them will have been registered as voters before the election takes place.

TARIFF REVISION

Mr. Borden in Halifax and Mr. White, the new finance minister, in Lansdowne, Ont., made some observations on Thursday evening on the subject of tariff revision. Mr. Borden spoke in general terms, merely stating that the government would establish a permanent tariff commission, which would ascertain all necessary facts in connection with the conditions and cost of production, and advise as to the conclusion which ought to be drawn from the facts so ascertained.

BOLTED WITH THE TIPS

Milwaukee, Nov. 4.—It has developed that the women waiters at the banquet given to President Taft last week collected \$85 in tips by passing plates among the guests, but that before they had distributed the money a man demanded that it be turned over to him, to be evenly disbursed among all those employed at the dinner. The man, who disappeared with the money, was one of the waiters, the women say, but they do not know who he is and the police are trying to locate him.

"I think I am safe in saying that there is in contemplation no immediate change without the most careful enquiry, with all the just consideration of the claims of all who may be interested, producer and consumer alike. I do not mean to say that the tariff must remain as something fixed, stereotyped or crystallized. The interests of the community as a whole must always be before us. It will be the duty of the government to take such measures as may be necessary to remedy any inequitable or unjust advantage enjoyed by trusts and combines. In other words, my conception is that while stability of tariff should be a chief consideration in times of such prosperity as we now enjoy, we must make it the subject of constant study in order that, as necessity arises it, may be modified to meet the changing conditions of a constantly changing country."

On its face this appears to be a general statement to which no reasonable objection could be made; but, when we remember that it is made by a member of a government which must pay its debt to the manufacturers, the real meaning becomes clear. The "trusts and combines" will not be at all disturbed by the reference to them. The "constant study" will carefully avoid those phases of the tariff question which are of most interest to the consumer. The modifications of the tariff will be made with scrupulous regard for the fat dividends of the manufacturers.

The tariff commission in its search for facts will know in advance what facts to discover and what to ignore. The country has committed itself to a high tariff policy, and must take what is offered.

CARUSO TO SING ON FIRST NIGHT

Aida Will Be Opening Bill of The New York Opera Season

SOME OF THE SINGERS

Concert Season of More Than 600 Performances Has Started—Musical Notes of Interest From the Metropolitan of the United States

(Times Special Correspondence) New York, Nov. 1.—Ludwig Thuille's "Lohentanz," one of the new operas promised by the Metropolitan Opera Company management, will have its initial American presentation during the first New York week of opera, Johanna (Gadsli), the soprano, and Herman Jadowker, whose first appearances two seasons ago brought recognition, will have the leading roles and Alfred Hertz will conduct.

The concert season in New York, which will number more than six hundred performances before spring makes its appearance, has started and we have heard Vladimir de Pachmann, who returned with a fine crop of hair and his exquisite art still unimpaired; Reinald Werrenrath, a promising baritone who needs further vocal development to reach the goal he is striving for; Efran Zimbalist, the Russian violinist; Harold Bauer, pianist; and the American debut of the Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra's new conductor, Josef Stransky.

Reginald de Koven, whose skill opened the way for the American composer in this country in the field of Opera Bouffe, will soon have another work credited to the long list he has already brought. "The Wedding Trip," is the name of the newest work by the author of "Robin Hood," and its premiere takes place very soon. List Centenary programmes are being given all over the world by the representative symphony orchestras. The great composer was born October 22, 1811. The New York Symphony Society has just given the first concert of the season devoted to Liszt writings.

That admirable cellist, Paolo Grappo, who is playing in Europe with such credit to himself, sails shortly for this side of the Atlantic to begin his season, which will be long and call him to the principal cities of the United States and Canada.

New York opera goers are interested in the appearance of Marguerite Matzenauer, the German contralto, who is expected to make her American debut the first night of the Metropolitan's season as Amneris in "Aida." She sings equally well in English, German and French.

Another operatic newcomer who will shortly have his vocal and artistic abilities measured is the American basso, Putnam Griswold. According to accounts he is one of the foremost of living basses, and, if this be so, his addition to the Metropolitan roster of principals was a proper managerial move.

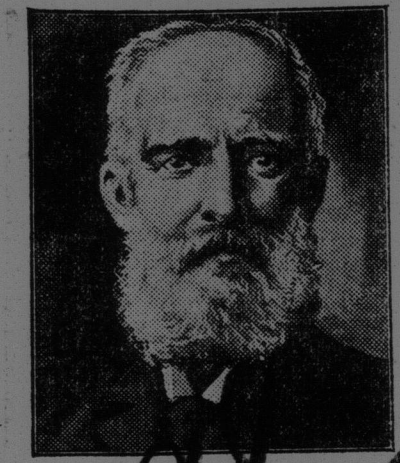

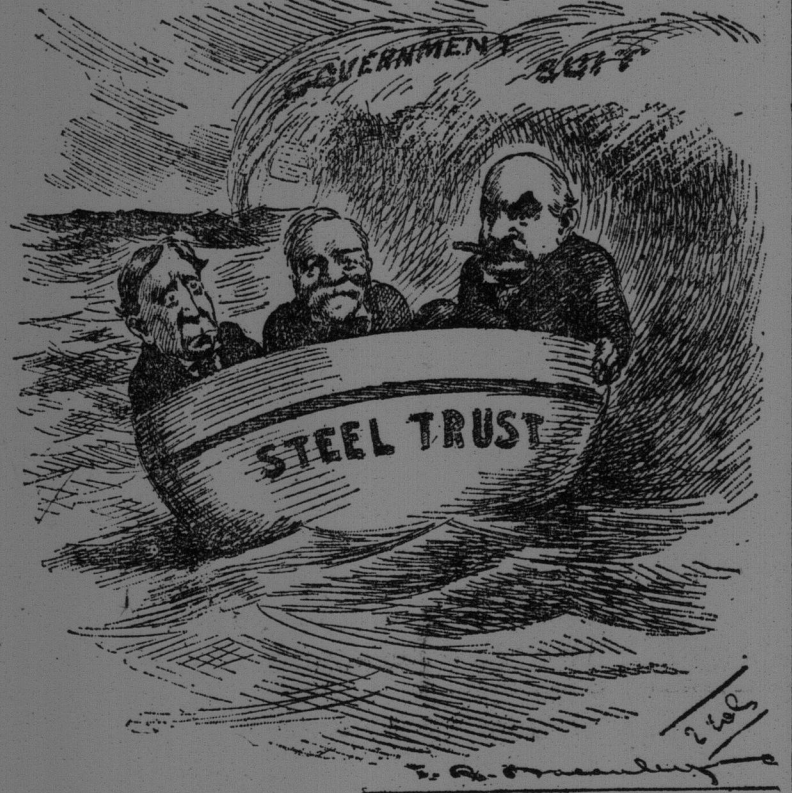

WOMAN'S HAT SUGGESTS VALUABLE INVENTION

Water Filter for Use in Armies Comes From the Pierrot Shape. London, Nov. 3.—A dainty woman's hat of the fashionable pierrot shape has led to the invention of an ingenious military filter which may save many lives on active service.

The idea was first suggested to Dr. Frederick Alexander, the medical officer of health for Poplar—who has patented this improved apparatus for straining water by the hat his sister-in-law wore. Four or five cone-shaped bags like pierrot hats are suspended upside down, one above the other, in an easily portable pyramidal frame, made of four uprights of wood or metal in Dr. Alexander's invention. Muddy or dirty water, which is frequently the only supply available to troops on active service, can then be poured into the topmost hat with the certain knowledge that by the time it has trickled through all the straining-bags it will be as clear as crystal.

"The idea of these cone-shaped bags," said Dr. Alexander, laughingly, "was given to me by my sister-in-law's pierrot hat after I had been reading a book on military requirements. It is quite simple, and so are easily portable on the march. Directly the upper bags become clogged by deposit from very dirty water they can be replaced, for they are hung by hooks and eyelets to the frame. The apparatus would be useful in everyday life in the home, for water that has been boiled and passed through this straining apparatus is as pure as pure can be."

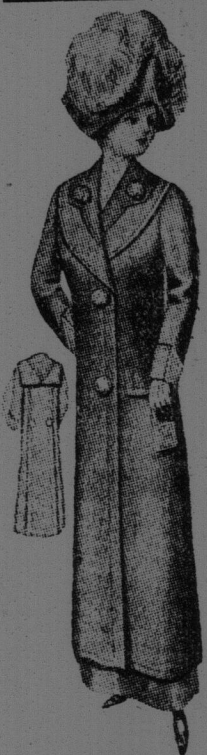

POLICE COURT TODAY

Teams Must Not Be Allowed To Obstruct the Sidewalks

But two prisoners were arraigned in the police court this morning. Charles McCarthy was remanded on the charge of drunkenness and Hugh Kelley was fined \$8 or thirty days in jail on the charge of drunkenness and \$8 or two months in jail for profanity. James Dempsey, reported for driving a horse and wagon on the sidewalk in Pond street, did not appear, but Councilor Donovan, his employer, explained to the court that Dempsey was removing manure from the Dominion Express Co's barn and that it was necessary for him to drive on the sidewalk. The Magistrate said that there was altogether too much of this going on in the city, and said to the police that all offenders in future should be brought before him. "The rights of pedestrians in this matter, must be looked after and teams should not be allowed to encroach whatever on the sidewalk. It too often occurs that citizens have to take to the road while a coal team or some other wag on obstructs the sidewalk. This has to cease, and all offenders brought before me will be fined." The matter was allowed to stand over till next week.

THE WATER SERVICE Residents of Mount Pleasant are reported in favor of the double pressure water system at least as applied to their part of the city. Since the valves in the mains were manipulated to divert a larger supply to the higher levels they say they have enjoyed a more satisfactory service than they have had for years. The fire insurance underwriters are said to be pleased with this situation as regards the heights but are waiting for the next tests to see the effect on the lower parts of the city.

LUMBER OUTLOOK NOT GOOD

Operators All Agree That Cut This Season Will Be Smaller

VARIOUS REASONS

Most of the Local Mills Will Probably End the Sawing Season Early in December Though One Firm Will Run Into New Year

The outlook presented to the lumbermen in this province for next year does not seem particularly encouraging at the present time and, unless a change for the better presents itself, it is not expected that the season of 1912 will be recorded as distinctly noteworthy for its activity. All lumbermen agree that the cut this year is to be greatly curtailed and various reasons are given for the decrease. The strike in England some weeks ago practically paralyzed business for a time, but trade is now assuming its normal conditions. The disturbance in trade, however, caused much uneasiness. Ocean freights advanced considerably and this fact curtailed shipments during the months of September and October. It has been practically impossible to charter any tramp steamer in the ordinary way for a lumber cargo, as business for them in other ways, has been much better. These reasons are attributed by authorities on the lumber trade for the slackness at the present time, but there are others as well. Stocks of Canadian spruce are not excessive in England, it is reported, but the competition for the last month was disappointing. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia spruce has formidable competitors in the Russian woods, which up to two years ago were not marketed in very large quantities, but since that time have become factors in the British lumbering trade.

English capitalists have gone into Russia to play in the manufacturing business and production has greatly increased, and is expected to still further increase. Labor in Russia is but a fraction compared to what it is in Canada, and the cost of production are considerably cheaper; while the ocean freight is only about one half what it is from maritime province points. Though it is an acknowledged fact that Russian wood cannot compete as to quality with that of Canada, yet the price of it is considered the United Kingdom, is responsible for the increased demand as small quantities can be purchased at a relatively low price and delivered in a remarkably short period.

Operations on a small scale have been begun in the New Brunswick woods, and several lumbermen have sent crews into the woods but their work will be quite limited as compared with other years on account of the reasons given and because of the general curtailment. Since they have quite a supply of logs already piled up, it is expected that the mills of Sisson, Cutler & Co., will be about the last to cease operations this year, in fact it is thought they will run until well into the New Year.

With most of the other mills, however, this will not be the case. Early in December they will probably see the close of the mills owned by Murray & Gregory, Charles Miller, John E. Moore & Co., Hilyard Bros., Messrs. Warner and others, but much, of course, depends upon the weather, which if favorable may allow some of these plants to continue cutting for a little while longer.
