


# THE IMPAIRMENT OF THE PROVINCIAL CREDIT.





They will learn to feed these animals re-gularly and properly and to provide plenty of fresh water so that these crea-tures can get to it whenever they want a drink. Birds will also be thankful for lots of water, and it will be a pleasure to watch them make use of it. A few-say six or ten-can have a grand Band of Mercy.
