British Government Takes Hand In The Traffic Strike

PROSECUTION ON SUNDAY GASES

MACDONALD NAMES COMMITTEE WITH EXTENSIVE POWERS

Commissioned to "Take Any Necessary Steps" to Bring Trouble to End. PRESS BACKS HIM

Declaration of War Against "Small Communist Inspired Contingent."

BY LLOYD ALLEN (United Press Staff Cor.) London, June 7.—The British Labor Government today intervened in the "Red" strike of power house workers which yesterday put most of London's great network of subway systems out of commission.

A plenary strike committee to deal with the revolt of the "rank and file" leaders who had opposed the walkout was created. The committee was empowered by Premier MacDonald to "take any necessary steps."

Secretary Predicts Spread Leonard Akhurst, secretary of the unofficial strike committee, announced this morning that the strike was more successful than ever and might be expected to spread to other cities today.

A three day Whit Sunday holiday started today and for that reason passenger traffic in the subway was lighter and the metropolis suffered less than on Friday.

The entire British press supports the Government's declaration of war against the "small, Communist inspired contingent responsible for the strike."

The Daily Herald, an exception, is carefully neutral. "The yarn that Communists are agitating the men on is a mere invention," the Labor organ says. "The men are badly paid and, rightly or wrongly, think their claims for better payment have been neglected."

However, they have taken the wrong way to have their grievances redressed. They struck against the orders of the union leaders, and walked out after demanding increases of 10 shillings a week with a 23 minimum week and a week's annual vacation with pay.

NAMES WOMAN FOR VICE PRESIDENT Prohibition Party Nominates H. F. Faris, a Banker of Missouri For Presidency.

Columbus, Ohio, June 7.—The prohibition party adopted its platform and nominated a national ticket yesterday.

Nominations were: For the president—H. F. Faris, Clinton, Missouri, banker; for vice-president, Miss Marie C. Brehm, temperance worker of Long Beach, Calif.

Enlists 12 Times In Six Months

New York, June 7.—Every army recruiting officer in the United States has been warned to look out for William Edward Moore, who within six months has enlisted twelve times under aliases. Moore has taken the oath of enlistment in six states.

Army officials here admit they are puzzled. At the most all Moore could gain is the price of a night's lodging, one meal and possibly transportation from one place in a corps area to another. Major B. M. Bailey, a staff officer at Governor Moore's headquarters, said that Moore had laid himself open to court-martial on two charges: fraudulent enlistment and desertion. Conviction on either of these charges carries a penalty of two years' imprisonment.

The only solution I can offer," Major Bailey said, "is that the man has a mania for enlistment." Moore was first shown on army records as enlisting at Fort Slocum, N. Y., on Nov. 27, 1917. Since then he has used many names to elude the watchfulness of the recruiting officers, but his identity has become known by comparison of the fingerprint records.

WILL NOT SEEK TO DEFEAT JUSTICE

Fathers of Leopold and Loeb Only Ask Investigation Under The Law.

Chicago, June 7.—Their millions will not be used to save Nathan Leopold, Jr. and Richard Loeb, confessed slayers of Robert Franks, from the gallows, a joint statement issued last night by the fathers of the accused youths, both Chicago millionaires, said.

"Only such defence as that to which every human being is entitled is provided for their sons," the statement said. "Assuming the facts in this case are substantially as published, then the only proceeding they favor is a simple, solemn investigation under the law, touching the mental responsibility of their accused sons."

Mrs. Heber Vroom Is a Councillor

Toronto, June 7.—The result of the ballot for the election of councillors of the L. O. D. E. for the various provinces was announced at yesterday's sessions as follows: New Brunswick, Mrs. Heber Vroom, Rothesay; Nova Scotia, Mrs. G. Paulther, Halifax; Prince Edward Island, Mrs. J. E. B. McCready, Charlottetown.

Appeal in N. B. Case Dismissed

Ottawa, June 7.—Judgments in several minor cases were rendered by the Supreme Court of Canada yesterday.

In the Maritime Provinces list the appeal of the New Brunswick and Canadian Railway vs. The New Brunswick Railway Company was dismissed with costs, acting Chief Justice Ilderton dissenting.

MILLERAND IS SEEKING PREMIER IN LEFT GROUP

Reported Ready to Take Drastic Action to End Crisis in France. A BRITISH VIEW

Hamilton Fyfe Writes That Premier MacDonald Helped Out Poincare.

By WEBB MILLER (United Press Staff Correspondent.) Paris, June 7.—Prepared to take drastic action to end the ministerial crisis, President Millerand today continued his consultations with prominent French politicians, trying to find among them some one to be Premier.

Left hold undisputed majority in the Chamber of Deputies, Millerand is seeking a Premier from that group. But the Socialists and many other deputies of the Left are on record as demanding his resignation and none of their number can accept the premiership with Millerand in office. It is impracticable for him to offer office to a statesman of the Right, because such a government could be defeated on the first vote in the chamber.

Credits MacDonald. By HAMILTON FYFE (United Press Staff Correspondent.) Editor of London "Daily Herald." (Copyright 1924, by United Press.) London, June 7.—When we do the right thing, when we act sensibly, when we make a genuine effort to be fair and to look at our disputes "from the other fellow's point of view," the reward often comes to us in an unexpected shape.

That is what has happened to the Prime Minister, Ramsay MacDonald. There is no doubt as to the result of the French general election is in great measure due to Mr. MacDonald's wise change of policy towards M. Poincare. The most that this policy seemed likely to do was to induce in that stiff lawyer-like person a more reasonable frame of mind. But it has done far more than that. It has swept him away.

Lord Curzon had stayed in office as Foreign Minister, there is little doubt that the French nation would have voted for M. Poincare in settlement. If Mr. MacDonald had continued Lord Curzon's policy of veiled opposition and petty annoyances, the French would have kept their backs up. MacDonald's method—frank courtesy, coupled with a clear and friendly statement of the facts—put large numbers of the French people in possession of those facts for the first time.

They paid attention to them because they were put forward so politely, without any wish to "score," and they came to the conclusion that the facts proved M. Poincare's policy to have been a melancholy failure. It was the very friendliness of MacDonald's letters which made them convincing. Their logic would have availed nothing if their tone had been acrimonious. By being "suave in manner" and "firm as to matter," according to the advice of the Latin proverb, MacDonald did more, we fancy, to persuade the French to change their minds about M. Poincare than all the denunciations of him by his political opponents.

This is the first striking justification of the line the Prime Minister has pursued. The chief obstacle to a repatriation settlement is out of the way. There is now every hope that Labor's foreign policy will be crowned with brilliant and enduring success.

Maritime Newspaper Men On Executive

Vancouver, B. C., June 7.—John M. Imrie of the Edmonton Journal was elected president of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association yesterday.

Other officers elected were—George E. Scroggie, Toronto Mail and Empire, vice-president; N. T. Bowman, Toronto Telegram, treasurer. The new executive committee includes W. H. Dennis, Halifax Herald; E. W. McCready, St. John Telegram.

Says Unsinkable Ship Is a Myth

London, Jan. 7.—(United Press)—"The unsinkable ship is a myth," said Sir Alan Anderson, presiding over the international conference of world shipping interests in London.

"It is not only a myth," he said, "it is a dangerous myth, for it induces false confidence. A modern ship, properly handled, does not sink unless she hits something harder than water; but if she charges another ship, or rock, or iceberg, she will sink in spite of bulkheads, loadline and deck cargo regulations, and the lives of all on board will be in peril in spite of lifeboats, rats and boats.

"The only absolute safeguard at sea is a vigilant master. Bulkheads and other precautions may and will mitigate disaster, but they are more likely to prove useful if they are wisely, and not extravagantly, framed."

SHOWS NEW STATUS OF THE DOMINION

Canada Now is Negotiating Her Own Treaties Direct With U. S.

(Special to The Times-Star.) Ottawa, June 7.—Before the House adjourned last night the Prime Minister made an interesting statement on the mission of Hon. Ernest Lapointe to Washington in connection with the signing of a treaty relating to rum-running and the smuggling of narcotic drugs. It is noted that this accredits the step taken in connection with the Halibut treaty. Canada is now negotiating her own treaties directly with the United States and is going directly to the King for his signature and approval after they have been signed by Canada and the United States.

It is looked on as evidence of the new status which Canada has attained in the British Empire, first in the halibut treaty and now in this matter. The King, on the advice of his Canadian ministers in a matter in which Canada is primarily concerned, has given full powers to our minister to do all that this minister could do in concluding treaties. "The British Government," it is said in official circles, has been splendid in the manner in which it has co-operated promptly and without reserve."

ASKS GOVERNMENT TO PAY DEFICIT

Edmonton, Alta., June 7.—Following discussions between the Government and Premier Greenfield of Alberta, a proposition has been forwarded to Premier McKenzie King that 100,000 tons of Alberta coal for points in Ontario be handled this summer at a freight rate of \$6.50 per ton, the Dominion Government guaranteeing the ways from loss on its movement if this rate proves actually less than operating cost.

WOMAN, 89, FINED IN "STILL" CASE

Quebec, Que., June 7.—"Hootch" knows no age, and yesterday a plea of guilty to a charge of having an illicit still in her possession was made, through her attorney, by Mrs. Hubert Mathieu, a resident of St. Mars des Carrieres, who is 89 years of age.

She was unable to appear before the court to face the charge, which had been laid by the federal revenue department. Justice Choquette imposed a fine of \$200 and costs.

MINE EXPLOSION KILLED FIFTEEN IN PENNSYLVANIA

A Score or More Were Injured at the Same Time. RESCUE DIFFICULT

Thousands Besiege Colliery Premises and Guards Keep Them Away.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 7.—Fifteen men are known to be dead and a score or more were injured in the Loomis Colliery of the Glen Alden Coal Company in Hanover township yesterday. Fourteen bodies have been brought to the surface. The explosion occurred in the bottom vein of number four slope, number two shaft, when sparks from a blast are believed to have ignited a heavy pocket of gas. Forty-one men were working in the section affected, and some of these made their way to the foot of the shaft. All were more or less burned. Rescue crews at once entered the workings, but their efforts were hampered by a serious fire and cave-ins.

THE FREE STATE MAY NOT ASSIST

Does Not Agree With Proposals Regarding Dispute With Ulster.

Dublin, June 7.—In connection with the boundary controversy between Ulster and the Free State, Deputy Milroy, in the Dail Eireann, has given notice that he would introduce the following resolution:—"The Dail Eireann expresses dissatisfaction with the course pursued in dealing with Article XII. of the Treaty and calls upon the Executive Council to cease participating in any further negotiations pending the setting up of a Boundary Commission. It further calls upon the Executive Council to fix the limit of debate to which it will assent in consulting the Commission."

At the Ministry of Justice last night it was said that the Government would not be represented on the proposed judicial committee which is to be asked to give an opinion on Article XII. of the Treaty, providing for a commission to delimit the boundary, and that it would not be bound by any decision reached by the committee. It was added that Chief Justice Kennedy has not been asked to join the committee and that he would have declined to do so had he been invited.

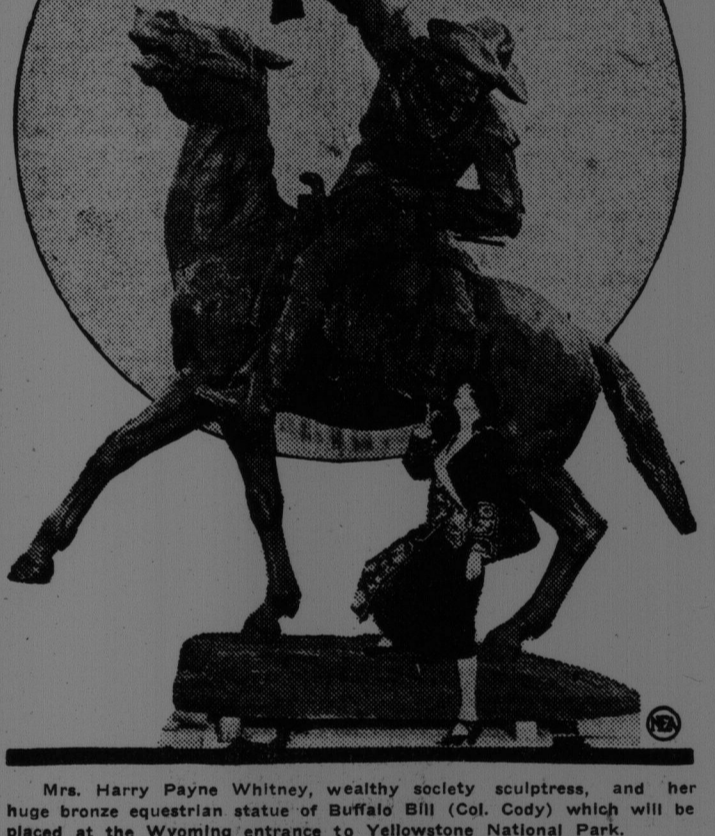
Ukrainian General Sivkevich Arrives in Canada With Family to Make His Home.

Quebec, Que., June 7.—Bohshevism is a form of virulent disease which, like an epidemic of cholera or typhus, will be wiped out, said General Waldemar Sivkevich, ex-Chief of Affairs of the Ukrainian Republic at Budapest, who arrived here yesterday on the Canadian Pacific steamship Melita. He intends buying a farm in Western Canada and settling down with his wife, son and daughter, and his secretary, Dr. D. Lalkov, who for five years was chief of the Ukrainian foreign mission office at Budapest.

At the outbreak of the world war, General Sivkevich commanded one of the Russian armies in the unsuccessful offensive against the Prussians, and when the Bolshevik revolution broke out he returned to Ukraine to take the command of an Ukrainian division in the fighting against the Bolsheviks, taking a prominent part in the expulsion of the latter from the southern half of his country. He was wounded three times during the four years of fighting. His entire property was confiscated by the Soviet Government, and he decided to come to Canada to settle.

He said that in his opinion the only way to free Russia and the other countries from the Soviet Russian regime was by an absolute and complete boycott in which all the great nations would co-operate.

London Has Giant Visitor, Said To Be Tallest Man in World

London, June 7.—Herr Jan Van Albert of Amsterdam, who has arrived in England, almost made the metropolitan police giants look like Lilliputians.

If Jan is not tall enough to wipe the dust off the stars, he certainly can light his cigars from the lamps while standing in the street. It is said he is the tallest man in the world.

"I am 23, and 9 ft. 3 1/2 in. tall," he said in an interview. "And I am still growing. I can tell by the way my clothes are getting too small for me. I have to have all my things made specially for me."

"The doctors are very much interested in me. They say I am so big because this gland (touching a spot near the back of his neck) is much larger than the ordinary person's. My apils cost me twice the ordinary price."

During his stay in this country Jan is to appear in variety theatres. He is famous for his enormous appetite as well as for his height. For breakfast he disposes of two soup plates of oatmeal, 15 eggs, three helpings of smoked fish, a large steak, seven slices of bread and butter and marmalade, and eight cups of tea.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL BYRNE WRITES TO CHIEF OF POLICE

Fourteen Cases of Alleged Violation of Lord's Day Were Submitted. REPORTED MAY 25

Consent to Prosecute Asked For, is Withheld in All the Cases.

In response to a communication from Chief of Police Smith of St. John to Hon. J. P. Byrne, Attorney General of New Brunswick, in which 14 cases of alleged violation of The Lord's Day Act were reported and permission, asked for prosecution, the Attorney General has replied, withholding his consent in every case.

This information was given to The Times-Star by the Attorney-General over the long distance telephone this morning. His reply to Chief Smith, he said, was written on June 2, and posted on the same date. The Chief said yesterday that he had received no word.

WILL GET THEM IN BEFORE JULY 1

Japanese Government Will Aid in Outwitting Uncle Sam—Cost \$65,000.

Tokio, June 7.—(United Press).—It is announced that the Government agrees to subsidize extra sailings of Japanese ships to America to carry the returning troops and brides before July 1, for the amount of \$65,000. This does not apply to fares, but goes direct to the companies to offset their losses through the diversion of their ships.

It is possible that the steamship Shinyo Maru, which is due from America on Monday, will not make the China and Philippine run, but will turn back to America. It is estimated that there are now about 900 who are not able to secure accommodations.

EARL'S COOLNESS SAVED PRINCESS

They Were Charged by a Wild Bull That He Had Wounded.

Messina, Transvaal, June 7.—(Canadian Press Cable, via Reuters).—The Earl of Athlone, Governor-General of South Africa, and the Princess Alice had a thrilling adventure, if not a narrow escape from being killed, while on a hunting expedition in the Transvaal. The Earl shot and wounded a wild bull, which turned and charged straight at His Excellency and the Princess. The infuriated animal was being driven down on the vice-regal party, and was only thirty yards away when the Earl fired and killed him.

The Earl and Princess were in imminent peril for a short time, but the cool and unerring aim of the Earl saved them from danger.

ONLY ONE MORE

In Chicago last year 287 murders were committed, but of all the murderers arrested only one was convicted and executed.

"The crime was premeditated and cold-blooded. Yet the two criminals are the sons of wealthy Chicago families, accustomed to all the comforts of life, and have been intent in their pursuit of higher education.

"In seeking the motive for this crime it may be necessary to discard the idea that it was done for money. The hope of gain could only be a faint possibility.

"Probably these twisted brains had some idea that even if they were detected they might escape punishment, having noted that in their country wealthy criminals have frequently, in one fashion or another, contrived to cheat justice.

"The American farmer that his ill could be cured by domestic legislation disregarding world market conditions. embark upon so wild an enterprise. The Americans will have to grow wheat under conditions which will enable them to meet world competition, or they will have to be content with producing enough for their own needs.

The paper has been coming into the United States market of late from Finland, Sweden, Norway and other countries in which wages are much lower than on this continent, and where, except in Sweden, a gold-standard currency is in vogue.

While the people of British Columbia, who pay the highest taxes in the world, might have hoped that four trials were sufficient to establish the guilt of the killer, Chong Sam Bow, that is not the case.

Summarizing some features of the new American taxation measure which is of interest to Canadians, the Montreal Gazette says:—

The income tax in force up to the present provides for a normal tax of four per cent. on the first \$4,000 of net income and eight per cent. on the remainder. The rates established by the new act are two per cent. on the first \$4,000 of income, four per cent. on the next \$4,000 and six per cent. on the amounts in excess of \$8,000.

The retiring president of the International Paper Company, the principal manufacturer of newsprint in the United States, announces that the erection of a new plant in Canada will be begun shortly, and that ultimately the company, on the exhaustion of its timber tracts in the United States, will be forced to transfer its operations to this country.

The truth is, of course, that paper mills in the United States, situated, as many are, remote from the sources of pulpwood supply and on power sites that give a flow of water varying from the excessive volume of the spring freshet to the trickle of mid-summer, cannot compete with the virgin spruce forests adjacent to ample water power still to be had in this country.

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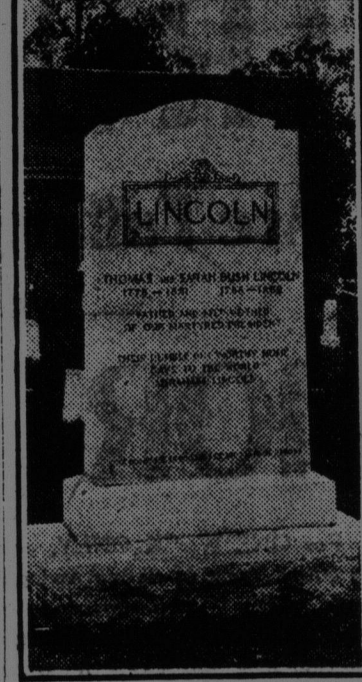
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LINCOLN'S FOLKS

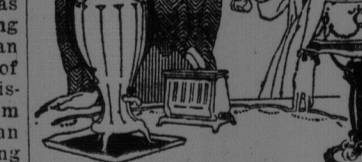
One of Lamb's Daily Half Dozen

DEATH SENTENCE IS CONFIRMED

Walter Muir Loses His Appeal to Supreme Court

Montreal, June 6.—Walter Muir, New York student, will hang July 11 for the murder of Ferdinand Laviolette, in Valleyfield last December, unless the

sentence is commuted by direct plea to the Canadian Minister of Justice. His appeal for the quashing of the conviction and new trial was unanimously rejected here today by a full bench of the Court of Appeal, thus cutting him off from any further recourse to the Supreme Court, as a dissenting opinion is necessary to obtain this.

LOSE WEIGHT
One-half cup stewed rhubarb, 1 piece crisp broiled bacon, 1 cup spring vegetable soup, 1 cottage cheese sandwich, 8 ounces halibut steak, 3 new beets sliced in lemon juice, half cup combination vegetable salad, 2 tablespoons pineapple sponge, 1 pint skimmed milk, 1 toasted bran muffin, 1 tablespoon croutons with soup, 2 slices rye bread.
Total calories, 1122. Protein, 296; fat, 332; carbohydrate, 324. Iron, 0.192 gram.

Pineapple Sponge.
Two cups chopped fresh pineapple, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup water, 2 eggs (whites), 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin.
Combine water, sugar and pineapple and cook for 10 minutes. Soften gelatin in four tablespoons cold water. Let stand 10 minutes. Add to boiling fruit and stir, remove from the fire and stir until gelatin is perfectly dissolved. When cool and beginning to thicken, add the whites of the eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a mold and put on ice to chill and become firm. The yolks of the eggs are used for a boiled custard sauce for the rest of the family.
Total calories (without sauce) 1202. Protein, 110; fat, 12; carbohydrate, 180. Iron, 0.068 gram.

GAIN WEIGHT.
One-half cup stewed rhubarb, 2 slices bacon, 1 fried egg, 3 slices fried corned mush, 3 tablespoons maple syrup, 1 cup spring vegetable soup, 2 heaping tablespoons corn soufflé, one cottage cheese sandwich, 8 ounces halibut steak, 3 new potatoes in quarters in lemon butter, half cup combination vegetable salad with 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, 4 tablespoons pineapple sponge with 4 tablespoons boiled custard sauce, 1 cup fresh cherries, 1 pint whole milk, 1 toasted bran muffin, 2 tablespoons croutons with soup, 4 slices rye bread, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 cheese cups to accompany dinner salad.
Total calories, 3937. Protein, 476; fat, 1631; carbohydrate, 1830. Iron, 0.209 gram.

Add more butter to the vegetable soup for this menu and if possible make it of whole milk or cream.
If actually measured, two heaping tablespoons of any dish like corn soufflé would mean four level tablespoons.
This cottage cheese sandwich should be made rich with cream, butter on the bread and mayonnaise.
When preparing the beets, sprinkle liberally with sugar, spread generously with butter and then add lemon juice to make piquant.

MAYOR SAYS CITY WILL KEEP MONEY

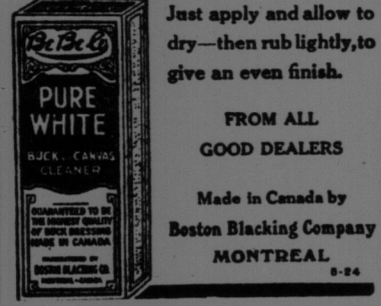
H. C. Page Asks for Return of Auctioneer's Sale License.

A delegation of the Retail Merchants' Association met the City Council yesterday afternoon and presented a request that a rebate be made in the amount of \$500 paid by H. C. Page as a license for the auctioneer who recently conducted a sale in his store, on the ground that the legislation under which this fee was collected had never been intended to apply to auctioneers but to prevent the dumping of stocks of bankrupt houses upon the city by outside concerns. W. H. Harrison, K. C., and H. C. Page were the speakers for the delegation. Those present for the retail merchants were F. W. Roach, A. E. Everett, H. Mont. Jones and H. C. Page.

W. H. Harrison, in presenting the case for the refund of the amount paid in excess of the regular auctioneer's license fee of \$84, plus the business license of \$20, contended that it never was the intent of the act to protect auctioneers but was to prevent the bringing on of slaughter sales by outside concerns. Even if the law did apply to auctioneers in general it could not equitably be applied in this case,

as Mr. Page was the man who was carrying on the sale and he had been a taxpayer in the city for many years.

Mayor's Comment.
Mayor Potts remarked that the council could not change the legislation, and he was sorry to see that the Retail Merchants were so narrow that they could not see any other class but the auctioneers. Mr. Page could not get his money back, he said.

Mr. Harrison said that new legislation could be obtained and the council

could, if it so wished, return a part of the money paid.
The Mayor said he had been told by Mr. Ellis that it was the intention of the bill to protect the auctioneers as well as other classes.
Mr. Harrison said he did not wish to enter into an argument as to the technicalities under which the fee of \$500 had been collected, but he did wish to point out that it was only fair to Mr. Page to meet his request in this matter.
The Mayor asked who drew the act and Mr. Page replied that it was Mr. Teed.

The Mayor's Wager.
Mr. Harrison pointed out that this sale had been undertaken by Mr. Page only to realize on some of the stock which he had on his shelves and was not in any sense of the word a forced or slaughter sale; that no goods had been brought in specially for this sale and that the auctioneer had been brought here because he was an expert in selling this line of goods.
Mayor Potts said he had made an offer to Mr. Page to have a committee select two lots of goods, equal in value, up to the amount of \$1,000 and that if he (the Mayor) did not take as much money out of his lot as the imported auctioneer, he would pay the license fee himself. His offer had not been taken up.
Mr. Page said he felt that the law had been wrongly applied in his case and that it was a piece of persecution to make him pay \$500. There had been other sales conducted in the city within the last few weeks where this tax might have been exacted with more equity than from him. Pressed to name some of these, he named one

sale, which he contended was organized and conducted by outside people, and one of the shoe sales, the name of which he did not mention.
"Like to See Them Get It"
Mr. Harrison asked the city solicitor, who was in the room, what his opinion of the intent of the act was.
The Mayor objected to Dr. Baister answering the question, and stated that when he wanted the opinion of the city solicitor it would be sought in his office and not in a public meeting with the other side present.
After the delegation withdrew the

Mayor said the money had been paid and, as far as he was concerned, it would not be returned.
Commissioner Bullock asked if a resolution of council would not override the decision of the Mayor, and the Mayor replied "I would like to see you get it."

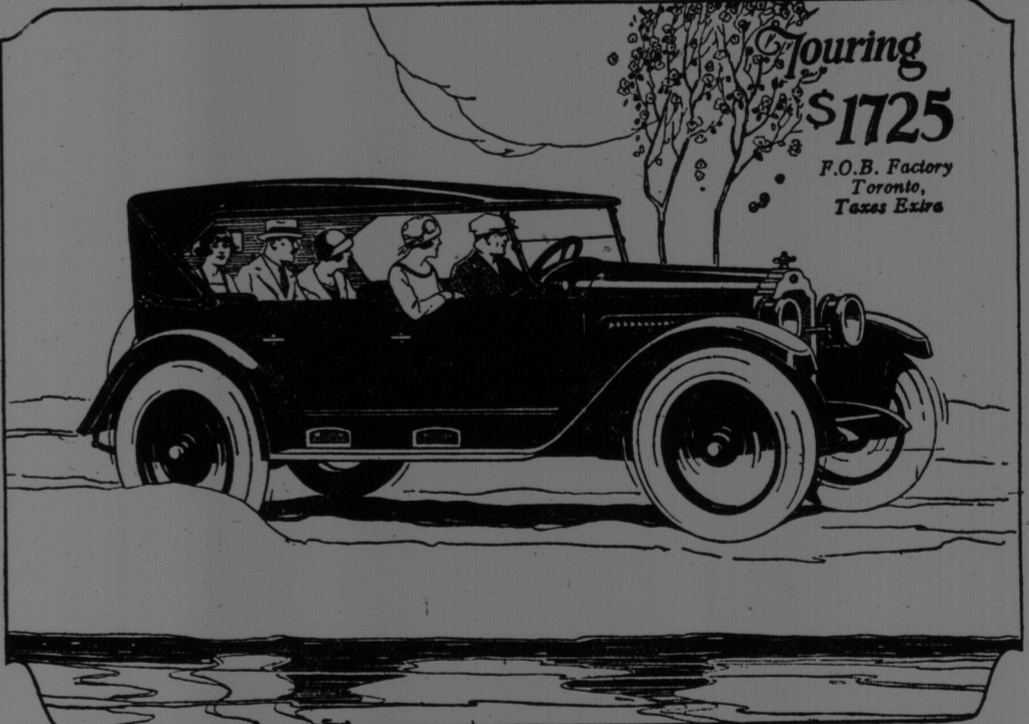

LIEUT. GOVERNOR TO OPEN CONVENTION

Accepts Invitation of Canadian Good Roads Association to Speak.

The eleventh annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association at St. Andrews-by-the-Sea will be formally opened on June 24 by the Lieut.-Governor of New Brunswick, the Hon. W. F. Todd. Notification to his effect has just been received from His Honor by the secretary of the association, together with the in-

formation that the Lieut.-Governor will also give an address to the delegates.

The large number of acceptances from federal, provincial and municipal bodies to the invitation to send delegates to the convention which will last from June 24 to June 27 next, assures that this year's gathering will be an undoubted success. From all parts of Canada have come notification to the headquarters of the association that delegates are being appointed, and arrangements are going forward rapidly for the accommodation of what will be the most representative gathering of people interested in highway construction and maintenance held in years.

10,000 Invited.

Ten thousand invitations to attend the convention have been sent out by the association, whose objects are to disseminate information relative to the best methods of constructing and

maintaining improved highways throughout the Dominion. Federal and provincial Governments, municipal councils, good roads and automobile organizations, Boards of Trade and kindred bodies, highway engineers, contractors, and the public generally, have been invited to attend, and because of the practical character of the convention programme, the time selected for the gathering, and the delightful location chosen for the meeting, the opportunity of combining business and pleasure is being taken advantage of to an exceptional degree. Many delegates are motoring to St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, while special Pullman cars are being arranged for from Toronto, Montreal, and other centres, and intending delegates are advised to notify the secretary, George A. McNamee, New Blks Building, Montreal, without delay in order to secure the necessary hotel and other reservations.

The tentative programme of the convention which has been sent out shows

that each session will be devoted to a special subject which will be discussed from various angles, these being divided under the heading of finance, administration, construction, maintenance, and traffic. Fully qualified speakers from all parts of the North American continent will set before the delegates the latest available information on these subjects and ample time will be provided for general discussion of the various problems arising in connection with them. Members of the executive of the association have left for New Brunswick this week to complete the final arrangements for the convention, and everything possible is being done by the local reception committees to ensure that the delegates and their wives will be well looked after.

Special Conferences.

In addition to the general convention there will be two special conferences held in conjunction with it. The inter-provincial conference of Government officials and highway engineers will meet for the further discussion of the important matters brought up at the special Winnipeg conference. These include such questions as uniformity in construction and preparation of cost data, systems of tendering, co-operative purchasing of road supplies, reciprocity in regard to provincial motor licenses, inter-provincial numbering of provincial routes to facilitate tourist travel, automatic signals at railroad crossings and general safety and protective measures, federal aid and kindred subjects.

There will also be a special conference of representatives of the various universities in Canada with a view to providing, or extending where already existing, the necessary courses for the technical training of highway engineers. Some \$70,000,000 a year is spent in highway construction and maintenance throughout the Dominion and an effort is to be made to draw up uniform standards of training so that with the scientific construction that will be

made more general, there will be more economic and more efficient results obtained for this huge expenditure. Those in charge of highway construction are being invited by the university representatives to attend this conference and aid them in drawing up a practical course of training for highway engineers.

One of the most important subjects to come before the general convention will be the much discussed problem of who shall pay for the roads, and

whether cities should make contributions towards provincial construction work. This is a matter in which all municipalities are keenly interested and a keen discussion, is anticipated on it. Maintenance matters will also receive particular attention during the convention.

The various good roads, and automobile organizations in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are taking an active part in arranging for the attendance of

delegates, many of whom will motor to St. Andrews for the convention.

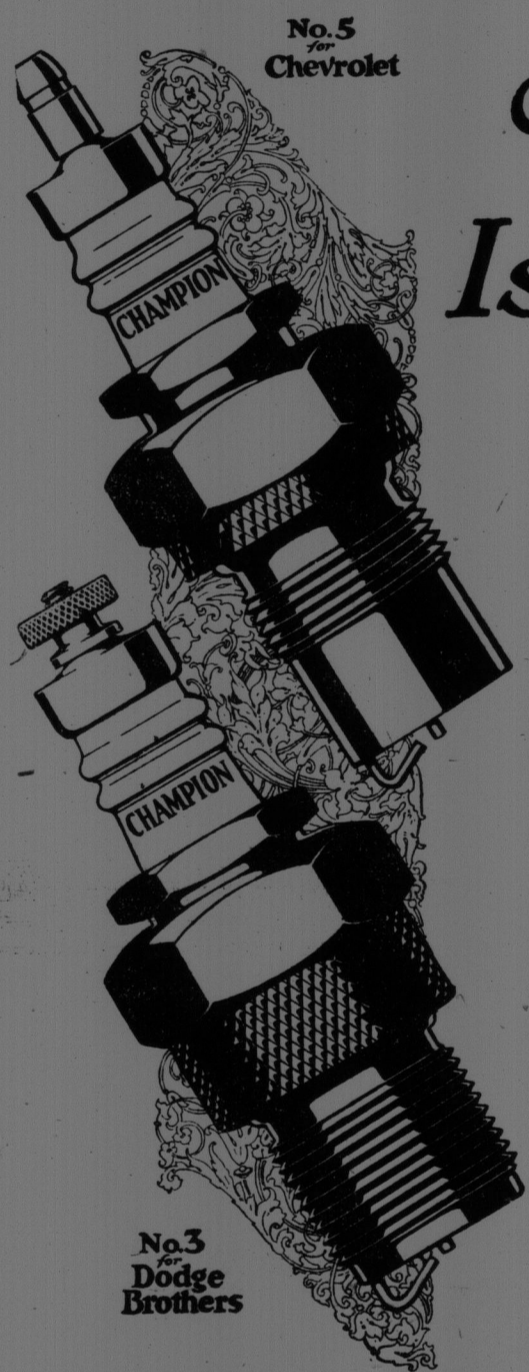
BREAKS WRIST WITH CRANK.

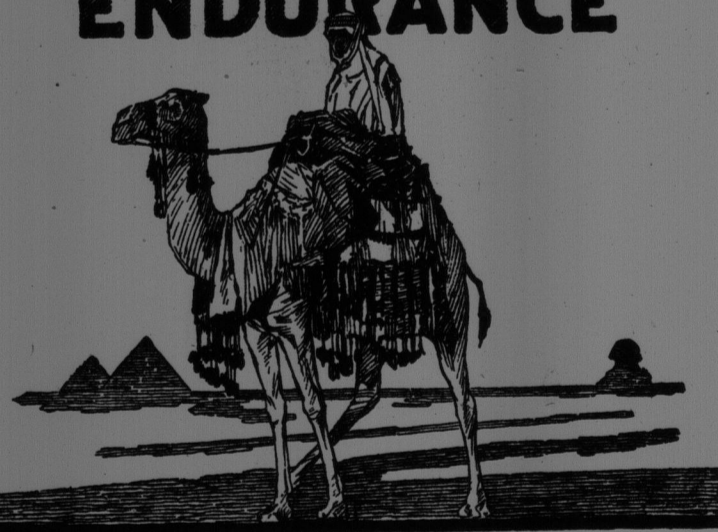

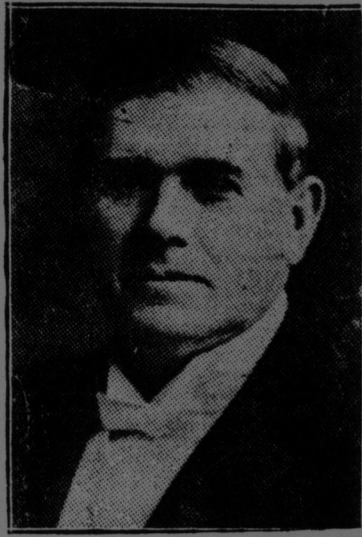

LEAVES ESTATE TO HIS RELATIVES

Sir Louis Davies' Will Soon Ready for Probate

Ottawa, June 6.—An estate of \$171,951, all of which is left to relatives has been bequeathed by the late Sir Louis A. Davies, former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, who died on May 1, 1924, and whose will is shortly to be filed at the court house for probate, by the Toronto General Trust Corporation which has been appointed co-executor of the estate and its sole trustee.
By the terms of his will, the late Chief Justice created a trust fund of \$80,000 of his estate for his widow, on the condition that she does not remarry, or in the event of her re-marrying the amount of the trust fund from which she is to be paid the proceeds is reduced to \$30,000. In any event the proceeds from the trust fund are to be given to the widow for her support. The will also provides for the creation

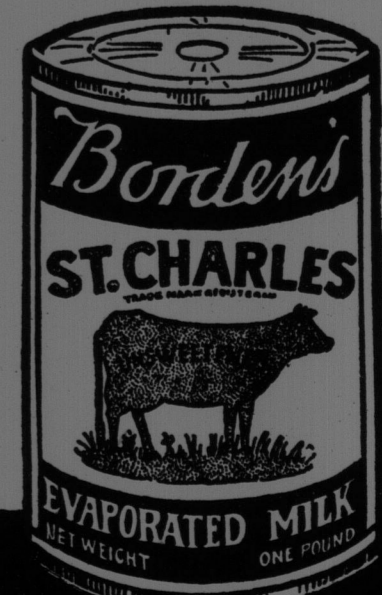

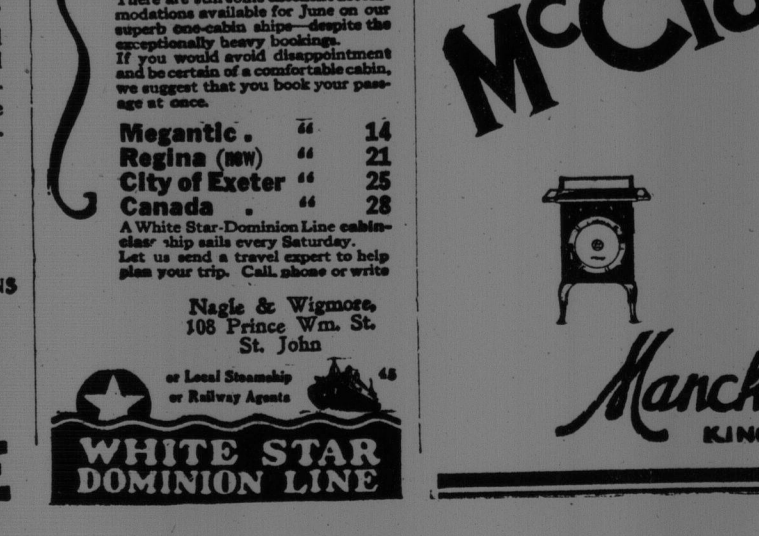

The boy at Harvard, where he was a sophomore, announced a determination to leave college and go to work so that he might get married to the girl of his choice. He approached his parents with trepidation. But they backed up fully, and last night Mrs. Shaw made it plain that everybody in both the Shaw and the Burt families was delighted with the marriage.

Love at First Sight.

Miss Burt's session with the "Poppy" company, headed by Madge Kennedy, was her first venture on the stage. She was determined to try her art before the footlights, and had a small part in Gould Shaw saw her and fell in love at first sight. His classmates described him as "mad about her," and often told of his "ravines" over Mrs. Burt. The entire Shaw family also "raved" about her, and she was a guest at Boulder Farm a number of times during her "Poppy" company's engagement here.

ACTRESS FOLLOWS
LOVER IN SUICIDE

22-Year-Old Beauty Takes
Poison After Death of
Film Director.

Los Angeles, June 7.—Heart-broken over the suicide of Lew Mason, a motion picture director she had expected to marry, beautiful 22-year-old Cecil Werner, an actress, followed Mason along the path known as "the easiest way out."

Cecil took poison. Her body was found in a little room she had occupied since her arrival here a few weeks ago to enter motion pictures.

In the note which Mason wrote just before he died, and which was found near his body after police broke into his gas-filled room, the movie director said:

"It's too much, much too fast." The hours that followed the suicide of Mason, Cecil Werner, the girl who loved him, likewise reflected on the swift sequence of events which followed her brief romance with the director, and just before she ended her life she too, wrote a note, a portion of which read:

"It is too much for me—not worth the ending." "It all seems so futile to me. I'm not the least bit afraid." Shortly after she received the news of Mason's suicide, Miss Werner shut herself up in her room. She refused to be consoled. She refused to eat. She spent hours weeping.

When Mason was found dying, a photograph of Cecil Werner was found clasped in his hands.

DIVORCE PLEA LOST
BY EVELYN NESBIT

Counter Claim is Dismissed
When She Fails to Ap-
pear at Trial.

New York, June 7.—Evelyn Nesbit, former wife of Harry K. Thaw, failed to appear before Supreme Court Justice Wagner or to be represented by counsel at the trial of the suit for divorce brought against her by Jack Clifford, actor and athletic director. As a result Justice Wagner dismissed a counterclaim for a divorce made by her, and reserved decision in the suit brought by Clifford. The hearing lasted only twelve minutes.

Mrs. Elizabeth Jones of 405 West Fifty-seventh street, testified that between September, 1917, and March, 1918, when she was employed as a chambermaid at Murray's, 202 West Forty-second street, she had seen Eugene Strong, a motion picture actor, named as correspondent in Clifford's suit with Miss Nesbit.

Outside the courtroom after the trial, Clifford said he was sorry that his romance had ended in a divorce court. "It all began at my camp up-State when Gene Strong and my wife were engaged with me in making a picture," he explained. "I engaged Strong and another supporting man for the cast, and in three days I wasn't in it at all."

"Matters came to a head one day when little Russell, whom I loved as if he was my own boy, called Julius Steger, a Fox film director, a 'nut.' I chided Russ for talking to anyone that way and Evelyn went up in the air. At the end of it Russ came over to me, sat on my lap and told me he loved me more than he loved his mama."

"From that time on Evelyn and I were at odds. As a matter of fact I feel terribly upset about losing little Russell."
