## Dedicatory Service

The formal dedication of the Seventh Day Adventist Church took place last Sunday afternoon, Elder M. N. Campbell of Osawa, Canada, preaching the dedicatory sermon, in which he set forth some of the principles for which the building stands. A summary of some of the fundamentals essential to Christianity as taught by the Adventists was then given by Mr. Campbell.

They believe there is one God, a personal, spiritual being, unchangeable and everywhere present by His representative, the Holy Spirit. That there is one Lord, Jesus Christ, the Son of the Eternal Father. That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments contain a full revelation of God's will to man, and as such are the only infallible rule of faith and practice. That baptism is an ordinance of the Christian Church to follow faith and repentance, showing faith in the burial and resurrection of Christ, thus commemorating the resurrection rather than first-day observance, which is nowhere enjoined in Scripture. That the New Birth comprises the entire change necessary to fit us for the Kingdom of God. That the prophecy is a part of God's revelation to man occupying about one-fourth of the Bible. That the law of God is unchangeable and eternal because of which Adventists keep the Seventh Day in harmony with the fourth commandment. That the second coming of Christ will be in person and in the near future, to which fourteen distinct lines of prophecy agree, the present European war being a decisive step toward that event. They believe that when a man dies he is dead and will not live until the resurrection. That God will destroy the wicked, root and branch, reducing them to ashes. Mr. Campbell predicted there would never be a notice given of a chicken-pie supper at the Adventist Church, because they appeal to the heart rather than to the stomach. 'Yes,' said he, 'Millions of dollars are raised by the Adventist denomination for the cause of God according to God's standard of tithes and offerings.'

Adventists are strictly a temperance people, advocating health reform in diet and dress and every phase of life. They do not fellowship one addicted to the use of liquor or tobacco.

Following the sermon, Mr. Hubley rendered a financial statement, the estimated value of the building being \$1,000, all of which has been covered, so that the church was dedicated free of debt according to the custom with that denomination. In behalf of the church, Mr. Hubley expressed the deep appreciation felt for the kind cooperation of the many friends who aided them in securing such a comfortable place of worship, and extended to all a cordial invitation to its services. Elder W. C. Young offered the dedicatory prayer.

## WAR NEWS

Aug. 20.—Latest despatches say big battle is now on between Germans and the allied forces in Belgium. The Germans advanced desperately but were driven back by French and Belgians.

An anti German sentiment is being shown by crowds in various Italian cities.

The Russian mobilization is complete. The Austrian troops are in mutiny because war is unpopular.

The German attack started at Tirlemont, 29 miles E.S.E. of Brussels. A fierce hand-to-hand conflict ensued, and the Germans were hurled back.

Some of the exploits of the French are nothing short of amazing.

A Russian statesman says the war will not last more than 3 months.

Two hundred German ships have been captured at sea by the British, French and Russian warships. They are valued at \$300,000,000.

## Latest

The Germans have occupied Brussels, the capital of Belgium, and the Belgian army have withdrawn to Antwerp. A clash should occur soon between the Germans and the British troops. There is no big battle yet.

The French report successes in Alsace, but advance checked in Lorraine.

The German fleet is bottled up and their commerce paralyzed. British trade is normal.

## News in a Line

The French are driving the Germans back through Alsace and Lorraine.

Misses D. Dowden and R. Ellis were in town this week; the guests of Mrs. P. J. Fitzpatrick.

Meigle reports—Foggy weather since leaving made every port of call in the Straits; no improvement in the codfishery.

In a naval engagement reported as having occurred off the Canary Islands, the British sunk a German warship. The British also captured a German ship containing war munitions.

The News says that the N. S. Co. at Bell Island look on some extra help to water a couple cargoes of ore for the United States. The D. I. S. have only No. 2 slope and the steam shovel working.

Without taking Japan into account the Triple Entente has a naval strength of 944 vessels, while the force of the Triple Alliance comprises 320 vessels, considerably less than the strength of Great Britain's navy alone.

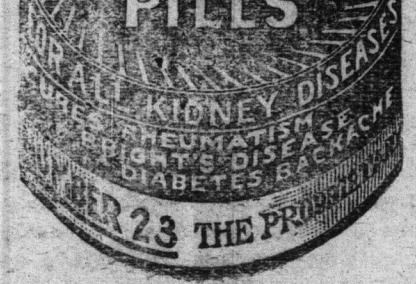

### Cost of This War

Military experts regard the probable cost of the conflict in Europe so vast as to be beyond reckoning. They assert it is quite impossible to make even a guess as to the aggregate expenses. The American Civil War expenditure is ordinarily calculated to have been about a million dollars a day for 500,000 men in the field. Another estimate is that it will cost \$1,000 a year per man in the field. Assuming that a general conflict will last into the field a maximum of 20,000,000 soldiers, this basis would bring the total military expenditure alone up to twenty billion a year, or about \$50,000,000 a day.

Army officers point out that the military expense of such a conflict is only a portion of the actual cost. The shrinkage in security values, the stoppage of agriculture, the diminution of manufacturing and other industries and the interference with trade and foreign commerce must all be reckoned with in order to arrive at any approximate estimate of the vast cost of war in Europe.

### Two More British Dreadnaughts

#### Acquisition From Turkey.

We are officially informed that the Government have taken over the two battleships, one completed and the other shortly due for completion, which had been ordered in this country by the Turkish Government, and the two destroyer leaders ordered by the Government of Chile.

The two battleships will receive the names Agincourt and Erin, and the destroyer leaders will be called Faulkner and Broke, after two famous naval officers.

The two Dreadnaught battleships are:

1. The Sultan Osman I. Built by Messrs. Armstrong. She is the largest battleship yet completed, being of 27,500 tons displacement. She has seven turrets, each carrying two 12 inch guns. The vessel was laid down to the order of the Brazilian Government, but was taken over by Turkey for £2,725,000.
2. The Reshadieh. Built by Messrs. Vickers. Displacement 23,000 tons. She has ten 13.5 inch guns mounted on twin turrets on the centre line as in the King George class.—Daily Mail, August 5th, 1914.

### Important Cable

#### From Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor.

The accompanying message is a reply to one sent by His Excellency the Governor at the request of the Prime Minister on behalf of the Board of Trade who were anxious to know if the arrangements made by the British Government in relation to War risk insurance, whereby the British Government guaranteed 90 per cent, applied to Colonial ships. With reference to your telegram of the 14th of August Board of Trade states that a number of Colonial Registered vessels have been already entered in one or other of the three approved Associations and it is therefore possible that Newfoundland steamships referred to in your telegram have not applied to all three. If owners failed to obtain admission to all three and particulars are furnished to the Board of Trade, the Board will institute enquiries to see if a solution can be found.

### Encouraging Reports from Labrador

While the S. S. Prospero was at Battle Pt. she communicated with the S. S. Baleine which is running on the Labrador service from Hopedale north, she having arrived there for bunker coal. The Baleine reported according to a message from Captain Kean, that there is a splendid fishery from Long Is. to Winsor's Pt. and that all the crafts are doing well. From Long Is. to Winsor's Pt. is a long stretch of coast, and if the 'floaters' are doing as well as reported, there is every reason to believe that the shoremen are also making good.—News.

### A Struggle for Freedom

The war with Germany is just another stage—let us hope the last—of the struggle for freedom which has been going on all through the centuries.

It is the old conflict between Democracy and Despotism, which the British people have waged unceasingly since the days of William the Conqueror, and the Democratic Institutions were established in Great Britain through civil war. And Britain has fought nearly every nation in Europe at some time to defend those principles in some way.

It was a long and painful pathway the British people trod from William, the Norman Conqueror, to the day of William of Orange, the Dutch Deliverer. But it took them seven centuries to fix the principles of government by the people in the British constitution.

That was the service which the Prince of Orange gave to Britain. It was a mighty contribution to the civilization of the world. It gave to Britain the power to expand into an Empire, the size and strength of which is the envy of the despots of the world.

It was the Battle of the Boyne that decided the controversy as to whether kings reigned by divine right or by consent of the people. James II. defended his 'divine right' to rule Britain. William accepted his title from Parliament—that is, from the people. Therein lies the kernel of democracy.

How wonderfully human liberty has broadened since 1690! We have but to consider the position of Germany to day, as contrasted with that of Britain to realize the debt the nation—and the world—owes to that incomparable Prince who made the name of Orange imperishable.

He fought autocracy in the person of Louis XIV all his life, as his great progenitor, William the Silent, fought Philip II. of Spain and the Holy Roman Empire a century before. The legacy that William III. of England left to the world was the richest that any ruler ever bestowed upon his nation. It was more than that. It was a legacy to humanity the whole world over. It gave Britain the vision and the power to renew the universe. Through his efforts Britain has become a blessing to all nations, and kindreds and people. It is the most potent agency for the dissemination of Christian principles that has ever existed. More than that, it is an example of the application of the principles of Christianity in civil government that has made it a model for every nation as it has emerged from despotism to the broader light of democracy.

It is well to recall the mighty services of the noble Prince, whose memory is kept green by the society which bears his name. We do so with the hope that what he did for the British people more than two hundred years ago will be accomplished for the Germans by the aid of the descendants of the men who fought on the side of William in the glorious revolution of 1688-90.—Orange Sentinel.

### Canada's Gift

The Canadian Government, on behalf of the citizens, has made a gift of one million bags of flour to the people of Great Britain. The offer has been officially accepted by the Home Government, and the flour, which has already been purchased at \$2.80 a bag, will be afloat in a few days. A transatlantic telegraph line and probably also a trans-Atlantic cable will be leased by the Government for the use of Britain in war despatches.

Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Casco, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 55 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Islay. Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P.M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

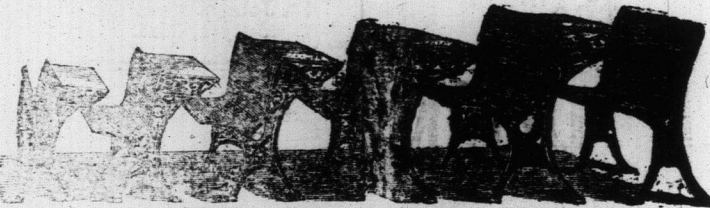

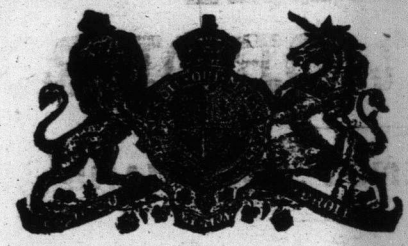

## Proclamation.

By His Excellency Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS by Section 2, Chapter 73, of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series), it is enacted that the Governor in Council, may, by Proclamation, in the Royal Gazette, prohibit the exportation of arms, gunpowder, military and naval stores, and munitions of war, explosives and ingredients used in the manufacture of explosive, marine engines, screw propellers, paddles, wheels, cylinders, cranks, shafts, boilers, tubes for boilers, boiler plates, fire bars, every article or any other component part of an engine or boiler, or any article whatever which is, can or may become applicable for the manufacture of marine machinery, torpedoes, torpedo boats fitted with apparatus to be used for projecting inflammable materials or firing torpedoes, pumps or other machinery intended to be used for projecting inflammable materials, and machinery intended to be used in the construction of torpedoes or torpedo boats from this Colony;

And whereas I, by and with the advice of my Council, judge it expedient to prohibit the exportation of the articles hereinafter mentioned, in order to prevent their being used as in the said Act stated:

Now, I, by and with the advice aforesaid, do hereby, from and after the date hereof, prohibit the exportation to all foreign ports in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Sea, with the exception of those of France, Russia (except the Baltic ports), Spain and Portugal, of the following articles, being articles which I have judged capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of arms, ammunition, or military or naval stores, that is to say:

- Aluminium.
- Aluminium Alloys.
- Armour plate, armour quality castings and similar protective materials.
- Asbestos.
- Cables, telegraph and telephones.
- Camp equipment—articles of, Cannon and other ordnance, and parts thereof.
- Carbolic acid.
- Carrriage and mountings for cannon and other ordnance and for machine guns, and parts thereof.
- Coal, steam—large.
- Compasses and parts thereof, including fittings such as binnacles, Cressel and nitro cressel.
- Engine and boiler packings.
- Explosives of all kinds.
- Fuel, manufactured.
- Implements and apparatus designed exclusively for the manufacture of the munitions of war, or for the manufacture or repair of arms, or of war material for use on land and sea.
- India-rubber sheet, vulcanized.
- Manganese.
- Mercury.
- Mica.
- Mineral jellies.
- Mines and parts thereof.
- Molybdenum.
- Nitrates of ammonia.
- Nitrates of potassium.
- Nitrates of sodium.
- Nitric acid.
- Nitro toluol.
- Nitro acid and its components.
- Rope finders and parts thereof.
- Rags, steel, wire and hawsers.
- Saltpetre.
- Sounding machines and gear.
- Steam vessels, lighters and barges of all descriptions.
- Sulphur.
- Sulphuric Acid.
- Swords, bayonets and other arms, not being fire-arms, and parts thereof.
- Tin.
- Tin plates.
- Tin tubes.
- Torpedoes and parts thereof.
- Tungsten.
- Vanadium.
- Four wheeled Waggon capable of carrying one ton and over.
- Two wheeled Cart capable of carrying fifteen cwt. and over.
- Harness and Saddle of all kinds.
- Barbed wire.
- Horse and Pony Shoes.
- Materials for Telegraphs, Wire-

less Telegraphs and Telephones. Field Glasses and Telescopes. Railway materials both fixed and rolling stock. Men's Marching and Shooting Boots. Heliographs. Portable Forges. Farriers', Carpenters', Wheelwrights' and Saddlers' Tools. Glycerin. Alcohol (as covering rectified Spirits).

Uniform Clothing and Military Equipment and Accoutrements. Walnut Wood of Scantling, which can be made into Rifle butts and fore ends.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at the Government House, St. John's, this seventh day of August, Anno Domini One Thousand Nine hundred and Fourteen.

## French Gallantry

London, Aug. 18.—A Brussels despatch says the French casualties in the fighting between Namur and Dinant were heavy. As the Germans were heavily entrenched their artillery from the outset played great havoc with the French. The French wing at Dinant had been badly cut up, and nearly routed, when suddenly the straits of the Marcelline resounded through the French lines. The men rallied and reformed and with splendid gallantry charged, hurling themselves on the German troops, breaking through their lines and putting them to flight.

London, Aug. 9.—Field Marshal Lord Kitchener had interviews yesterday with Sir Edward Carson, leader of the Ulster Unionists, and John E. Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, the latter accompanied by Joseph Devlin. It is supposed that the interviews had to do with the possible enlistment of Ulster and Nationalist volunteers.

## Labrador Fishery Shows Improvement

S. S. Sagona, Capt. N. Kennedy, returned from the Labrador Saturday afternoon. The captain reports considerable increase on the coast which have interfered with fishing operations. The fishery outlook is much brighter however, as the following shows: Ford's Harbor, Saturday, Aug. 8.—First sign of fish with jigger; no traps in water owing to ice.

Fanny Hr. and Double Hr.—Good sign with jigger; impossible to use traps.

Whinder Hr. and Hair Tackle—Several schooners there reported good sign with traps.

Turnavick, East and West—Good sign of fish with traps.

Alak—Settlers doing well with traps.

Mackovick—Thos. Dunn doing well, have 400 quintals on shore. Had to take up traps on Aug. 8th owing to ice. Trap was full of fish, but had to cast away the fish to save the trap.

Iron Bound Island—Very good sign of fish.

Ragged Island and Cape Harrison—Good sign with jigger. Traps had an average of 25 quintals per haul on Aug. 10th.

Horse Harbor—Good sign of fish. Emily Harbor—Good sign of fish. White Bear—Nothing doing.

Smoky—Doing fairly well.

Pack's Harbor, Independent and Smack Cove—Doing fairly well, but ice a great bother. Most all schooners gone north of Paul's Island.

From Grady South no improvement.

## Wines and Liquors Raised \$1 a Case

Importers at Montreal in Early with a Boost of Prices

Montreal, Aug. 4.—Local importers of wines and spirits to-day raise the prices of all wines and brands by \$1 a case. This general increase covers the various brands of champagne, brandies, burgundies, clarets, sherries, etc. Even the favorite mercurial quenchers, Holland gin, the familiar 'square face', has gone up \$1. This general rate does not apply to Scotch whiskies. Some of these have only been raised half a dollar a case, but the more expensive brands of whiskey are going up a dollar.

## Plenty of Sugar

Present Panic Declared to be Entirely Without Reason.

Toronto, August 8.—The present panic existing in the sugar trade because of the mad rush to buy is entirely without reason, according to Huntley Drummond, president of the Redpath Sugar Refinery, Ltd. C. C. Mann, local agent for the Redpath firm, last night received the following wire from Mr. Drummond: "There is no necessity whatever for alarm as to sugar supplies here, and anyone who orders a barrel of sugar for storage purposes, besides having his work for his pains, merely bids up the price for himself and others. There are sufficient stocks in Canada to supply the legitimate needs of the country, and the refineries do not propose to allow speculators to unduly enhance the price. It is the duty of every good citizen to keep his head at the present, as any other course invites suffering and costs. Let me repeat, there is sugar enough for everyone, no need whatever at present to pay increased prices, whatever the future may have in store for us."

The sugar panic has been raging in Toronto and Ontario. That there is no necessity for such madness is evident from the statement of Mr. Drummond and other prominent sugar refiners.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

The following sections of Chapter 28 of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) and the Act in Amendment thereof, are published for general information:—

Sec. 12.—When any death takes place in this Colony, information of the same shall be furnished as posted within 48 hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed under this chapter to receive the same in the form of Schedule A, under a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars for every neglect to do so. The obligation to furnish this information shall rest, in the first instance, on the medical attendant; secondly, on the undertaker; and failing these, on the next of kin to the deceased person.

Sec. 14.—No sexton or other person having charge of a cemetery or burial place shall permit the burial of any person in such cemetery or burial place without first having received a certificate signed by a MEDICAL ATTENDANT, an OBERGEMAN, or TWO RELIABLE PERSONS cognizant of the facts certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth as far as is known the cause of death; and all such certificates shall be forwarded monthly to the registering officers concerned.

This law does not apply to the City of Saint John's, where special and more strict regulations are enforced.

### Practical Help

In London, Eng., recently a crowded and enthusiastic meeting of representative business men took place, when it was decided to form an Employers' Patriotic Association. The Association will appeal to employers of labor to reduce wages rather than numbers. The objects of the association are:—1. Generally.—For the promotion of patriotic ideals and to secure the co-operation of all classes in helping one another at a time of national emergency and trial.

2. Stocks and Prices.—To discuss the question and as far as possible arrange for stocks of such commodities as may be required by the Forces, or necessary for the poor, being guarded against 'corners' or unduly inflated prices, and where practicable to regulate the disposal of same.

3. Recruiting.—To encourage recruiting and to give all possible facilities for employees to join one or other of the Volunteer or Regular Forces, and to take such steps as will enable such employees to carry out the duties required of them.

4. Self-Sacrifice.—To foster a spirit of and to organize methods for self-sacrifice amongst both sexes and all classes with a view to guarding against panic, waste, unemployment, poverty, and distress.

### Combines and Monopolies

The following is Sec. 2 of 'An Act to Provide for the Investigation of Combines and Monopolies,' which was passed at the last Session of the Legislature:—

2.—Whenever the Governor in Council deems it expedient to cause enquiry to be made into or concerning any matter of an alleged combine, the Governor may, by commission, confer upon commissioners or persons by whom such enquiry is, by the said commission, to be conducted, the power of summoning before them any party or witness, and of requiring them to give evidence on oath, orally or in writing, and to produce such documents or things as such commissioner may require in the investigation of the matters into which they are appointed to examine.

A message was received by Mr. John Shears Mercer Monday morning last conveying the sad news that his brother, Eugene Mercer, had met with a fatal drowning accident. It is thought he was hali but fishing when he met his death.

Various schemes are planned by the business men of the Old Country to assist England in the present great crisis. Some are agreeing to pay the difference between the Government pay and the regular pay of their employees who enlist in the army or navy. In addition they are encouraging recruiting amongst their employees. The Wholesale Textile Assn. will not advance the price of goods required by the forces. The employers also will find places for their employees at the expiration of their service.

# BRITISH FLEET UNDER ORDERS

## TO PROCEED AGAINST AUSTRIANS

London, Aug. 13.—Orders were to-day flashed to the British fleet in the Mediterranean to strike against the Austrians. The order as sent out from the admiralty announced that a state of war with Austria had existed since midnight. The British admiral commanding in the Mediterranean was therefore ordered to proceed against the Austrians at once. The Austrian fleet is believed to be lying off its naval base in the Adriatic.

While details of the present strength of the Mediterranean fleet are withheld for strategic reasons, it is known that when war broke out there were three of the first-class battle cruisers and several armored cruisers and accompanying destroyers at the Mediterranean naval base. They have been in pursuit of the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau and are now probably near the Austrian coast, where the French fleet is also understood to be.

The British foreign office handed the Austrian ambassador, Count Mensdorff, his passports at 11 o'clock to-day. The action follows a declaration of war, announced as effective against Austria from midnight.

Thronged of panic-stricken Austrians besieged the embassy pleading for protection, although English crowds took the announcement of war calmly and there were no demonstrations.

### A Bad Accident

Mr. John Bowering, of Coley's Point, came within an inch of losing his life when, on Friday last, in his mill at Ocean Pond while engaged making clapboard a piece of the board, which was slow in being pulled through the machine, was hurled with terrific force against the man's face, cutting a gash right through the flesh extending in a zig-zag way from the temple to the mouth.

He was knocked down by the force of the blow and rendered unconscious, while blood flowed in streams from the gaping wound. So bad was it that Mr. Bowering's teeth could be seen through the torn opening in the face.

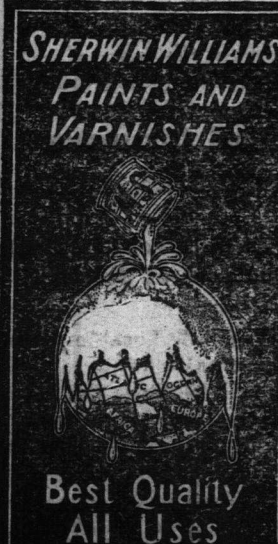
His son, Hayward, immediately got the horse and carriage ready and drove with all possible haste to Dr. Procurator at Clarke's Beach. By that time Mr. Bowering had lost a great quantity of blood and was very weak. The doctor put a number of stitches in the cut and subsequently the sufferer was driven home. His face is terribly swollen, and food has to be administered to him only in liquid form. He is being attended by Dr. McLeod and is now regaining his strength.

### Get Higher Prices

If those who manufacture or pack flour, beef, pork, and other articles of food in the United States and Canada have the power and do put up the price of these commodities, then the people in this section and elsewhere throughout Newfoundland who grow potatoes, turnips, cabbage, etc., and who catch and cure fish have a right to expect and to get a higher price for their products. Generally speaking, what's sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander.

When it is considered how much fish shrink out of the water the great need for haste is easily understood and fat fish shrink more rapidly than thin ones. Here is the table of shrinkage by an expert:
