

These parliament acts, so far as I am able to judge, were ill-considered and practically useless in relation to crimes committed in the wild western territory. No attempt was made to apply their provisions when the parties were Indians. Murder is almost the only crime which the Indian public specially notices, and redress or revenge is usually left to the nearest relatives of the victim. The immense distances of the Canadian courts and the physical obstructions to reach them, prevented recourse; also in a case of an Indian killing a white man. To some extent, as between white nen, during the never ending conflicts of the two rival fur companies, the jurisdiction of the Canadian courts were sought, but, speaking generally, of the whole country, there was no regular administration of prescribed



Vienna, Nov. 25 .- Austria will continu o take part in the international action against Turkey so long as the powers ac ananimously, but if any power desires to withdraw, and does withdraw, Austria vill withdraw also. The possibilities of serious complice

ions are not ignored here, and the government still hopes and expects that the Sultan will accede to the demands of the powers. Austria is not moving troops toward

the southern frontier, despite report to the contrary. The statement that she contemplates a movement on Salonica is categorically denied.

There is practically no doubt that the note of warning to the Balkan states will have the desired effect. Russia initiated this action with Austria in behalf of the powers.

Will Seize Customs Paris, Nov. 25 .- It was learned at the

foreign office to-day that Austria and Russia, in behalf of the powers, have addressed a strong note to Bulgaria, Servis and Greece, warning them that the naval demonstrations against Turkey should not be made a pretext for revolutionary movements on the part of these countries against Turkey. 
