NEW YORK, Jan. 26—"The market is dead, agitation against high prices did it," was the declaration today of a wholesale meat dealer. The action of the local markets, both wholesale and retail confirmed the dealer's assertion. It was said today that wholesale dealers were stocked with thousands of unsold cuts of dressed beef with supplies still steadily flowing in. John Bright was once excluded from office because he differed from his chief on the question of the House of Lords. This famous man was one of the earliest opponents of the Lords, and when Lord Palmerston was forming a Cabinet Lord John Hussell urged the claims of Cobden and Bright. The former could not see his way to accept, while Palmerston would not offer a portfolio to Bright, as there was influential supporters who would have seceded had he been included; so the great Free Trader remained a private member for that Parliament.

Everyone will remember the cry against the last Administration of Lord Salisbury, which was dubbed the House of Ceell by disappointed men, and more than one prominent supporter of the Conservative party became estranged in consequence. Several former Prime Ministers have turned friends into life-long enemies because they have been left out of the Cabinet.
