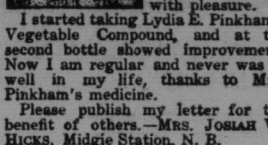

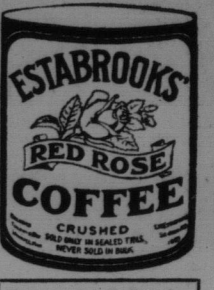

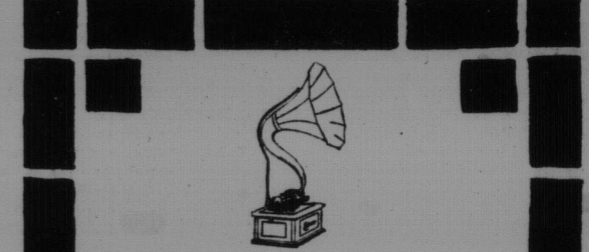

TWO SMALLPOX CASES IN ISOLATION HOSPITAL

Father and Son From Nova Scotia, Discharged Before They Were Cured, Taken in Charge by Health Board.

Two men from Westville, Nova Scotia, were committed to the Isolation Hospital yesterday by the officials of the Board of Health on the ground that they had not completely recovered from an attack of smallpox, and were liable to infect the public with the disease.

The proprietor of the boarding house notified that the older man was badly pitted, and still desiccating, and notified the health officials. They sent an officer to the boarding house who had a look at the men, and called in a medical expert to examine them.

The health officials here hold that the older man had been discharged from the hospital before he was completely cured, and that the Nova Scotia authorities should not have allowed him to come here, as he is still in a condition dangerous to the public health.

It is recalled that a few years ago the Nova Scotia authorities at Digby refused to allow the boat from St. John to land her passengers because she had a man aboard who had been discharged from the Isolation Hospital here after suffering from smallpox.

The health authorities here decline to make known the name of the boarding house from which the two men were taken yesterday, as they say that the public spirit shown by the proprietor in calling attention to the condition of the older man requires that they should protect him from any undesirable publicity.

CALLED HOME AFTER YEARS OF WANDERING

Well Preserved Englishman Who Has Seen Service in India Responds to Feeling That He Should Return.

"Something has been calling me home to Old England, calling me with such insistence that for days before I packed my grip I couldn't sleep or rest," said Mr. Oxford, of Tacoma when interviewed at the Royal west end.
