Standard Sends a Representative to Commission Cities

The Standard takes pleasure in announcing that Mr. Hedley V. Government by commission is being advocated for this city, but opinions differ as to its adaptability to our special needs and requirements. The Standard has taken the ground that changing the entire system of government is toq radical a move and that commission rule has some disadvantages. Support has rather been given to a reform movement to reduce the number of aldermen, provide for more frequent meetings and make such necessary changes in the management of the departments as experience may suggest. These measures properly carried out will, we believe, meet the case.

On the other hand, the advocates of commission, who have asked for a plebiscite on the question, are satisfied that their plan is the best and the only form of government St. John should adopt.

Much additional information seems to be necessary before the citizens should be asked to decide. Mr. Mackinnon's intimate knowledge of conditions in St. John, his training and experience as a newspaper man and his well known capabilities as a writer, render him peculiarly well fitted to report on all phases of the question. For the past week he spent much time at City Hall, obtaining facts and figures which will be useful for comparison, and as far as is possible, at this distance, the line of investigation which he will follow has been marked out.
