Toronto. Oct. 15.-Five men were asphyxiated in the Occidental Hotel on Dundas street this morning. The men had come in after midnight and four of them had not even removed their clothing. When they were found this morning gas was escaping from the jet and from a small heater as well. The victims were: Samuel Eadle, aged 32; George H. Knowles, aged 40; George Williams, aged 45; William Downs, aged 41; William Allen, aged 60. Four were sleeping in one room where the open gas jet was found, and Ailen was in an adja-cent room. He was undressed and in bed, and beside him was a coal oil lamp which was still burning. The men were paid Friday afternoon and had not been seen about the hotel since.
