Ottawa, April 13.—The Dominion government has, it is understood, completed arrangements for an improved steamship service between Canada. and the West Indies. The arrangement is a temporary one, the contract being for a year. The old service was provided by the firm of Pickford and Black, with four boats salling from Halifax every twelve days and calling at St. John on the homeward voyage. The subsidy paid by the government for this service was \$100,000.

The new service will call for a subsidy of \$200,000. Pickford and Black will have other steamship interests associated with them, and two first class modern passenger vessels will be placed on the route. The ports of call will be the same as under the old contract, providing a service between Canada and all the islands which are
