# MR. POTTS COMBATS THEATRE TAX BILL ABLY, BUT LOSES

Opposition to a Man Backs Up St. John Member in His Brave Fight Conducted in Interests of the Working People who Are Grossly Discriminated Against in the Foster Tax Measure Reported to the House —Government Supporters Again Display Palpable Lack of Manners and Frequently Interrupt.

Fredericton, April 24-Frank L. Potts, member for the city of St. John, put up a good fight tonight against the bill to levy a tax upon patrons of motion picture theatres and other places of amusement, but the government put the measure through despite the strenuous opposition of the junior opposition member for St. John.

Mr. Potts did not fight so much against the principle of the bill as on its methods. He claimed that it was discriminatory inasmuch as it imposed a larger proportionate tax up on houses where the lower prices of admission were charged. He offered two amendments, both of which were defeated by a straight party vote in each case, every member of the opposition standing solidly behind Mr. Potts in the course

As the bill was reported to the committee of the whole house the tax which is to be paid by patrons who will buy additional tax tickets in the lobby of the theatre is graduated as follows: On all theatres or picture houses where the admission is under 25 cents, a tax of one cent per admission; 25 cents to 50 cents, two cents; 50 to 75 cents, 5 cents; 75 cents to \$1.00, 10 cents; \$1 to \$1.50, 15 cents; \$1.50 to \$2, 20 cents, and over \$2, ten per cent of the price of admission.

# The Teutons Make Some Progress East of Amiens, Announces Marshal Haig

London, April 24—Field Marshal Haig announces that the enemy has taken Villers-Bretonneux. The text of the statement reads:

"About 6.30 this morning, after a violent bombardment, the enemy attacked our whole front south of the Somme and the French on our

"Later in the morning an attack on our positions in this sector was renewed in strength, and, although repulsed with loss of the southern and northern positions of the front, made progress at Villers-Bretonneux, where the fighting has been severe throughout the day. By evening the enemy had gained possession of the village, and the fighting was

"Other attacks by the enemy this morning on the north bank of the Somme and north of Albert were repulsed; we secured a few prisoners.

"By a successful local operation carried out this morning northwest of Festubert, a post, captured by the enemy on the 22nd, was regained. The hostile garrison offered strong resistance and lost heavily. We captured a few prisoners and four machine guns.

"Early in the morning the enemy delivered a strong local attack, without success, against our new positions east of Robert. Our line was maintained intact and eighty-four prisoners were left in our hands. Additional prisoners were secured in successful minor enterprises in the Forest of Nieppe and in the neighborhood of Meteren."

Ludendorff Resumes His Efforts to take Big City and Junction Point and split British and French Armies in Twain— Great Guns Roar on Moonlit plains of Picardy and Terrific battle Now Rages on 15 Mile Front.

Enemy Repulsed with loss on Southern and Northern Positions of Front, but Makes Progress at Villers-Bretonneux, where the Fighting has been Most Severe Throughout Wednesday -Attacks by Germans North of Somme and Albert Beaten Back.

London, April 24.—The gigantic show is on again. After a pause of three weeks the Germans have resumed their efforts to uncover Amiens and to split the British and French armies. All through the moonlit night the great guns boomed along the wide Picardy battlefront and at daybreak today the enemy hordes began their attack between Albert and the Avre, a distance of some fifteen miles. Villers-Bretonneux, eleven miles from Amiens, was captured.

Simultaneously an onslaught on the British right wing between Givenchy and Robecq was made. Diversions also took place southwest of Mount Kemmel.

Since April 3 the Somme front has been concentrating huge forces of men and guns behind the front at Amiens. MANY VESSELS HAVE MET THEIR DOOM AT CAPE RACE

washington readed by mariners for it has been dreaded by mariners for it has proved to be a veritable sea graveyard, and many a vessel has gone down in the treacherous waters s gone down in the treacherous waters or round about it. Cape Race is a binn, lagged bit of coast, with hardly any strand and with a multitude of submerged rocks from the breaking waters at the foot of the cliffs as far to see as the Virgin rocks, ninety miles tout. The polar current, which runs like a river past the gray cape, is so variable in the direction of its law that it may race southwest at one time and, run northeast at another. The fogs are almost continuous.

At a rough calculation, an average of at least \$500,000 worth of ships and a cargoes have been lost yearly off Cape Race every year for more than half a century.

Mr. Powell and Committee Decline to Take Part in Proceedings-Are Told that Finance Board Has No Authority to Consider Suggested Reforms-More Evidence Heard as to the Efficiency of Mr. and Mrs. Wood.

The continued hearing before the nance committee of the Municipal puncil into the methods of administration of the Municipal Home ended a fizzle. After the first hearin governe the finance committee that body thing on supposed full authority rejected the assistance of a representive committee of men and women preparing suggested reforms intative committee of men and women in preparing suggested reforms intended to overcome the evils known to exist. This committee prepared its recommendations and presented them yesterday only to be told that they were not desired and that this finance committee had no authority to consider any such recommendations. The committee also decided to continue taking evidence into imaginary charges which were never made. In this continued hearing neither the Standard nor the large body of men and women it represents have any interest and consequently these representatives withdrew. Whatever further is done is up to the Board of Commissioners and the Finance Committee but the recommendations made on evidence originally produced are now published for general information.

In the absence of Councillor Wigmore, chairman of the fluance committee annd Warden Golding, Councillor O'Brien was elected to the chair.

On Councillor O'Brien calling the
meeting to order Father Young asked
whether it was a public or private
meeting and if a public meeting how
the public had been notified of the
fact it was being held. He was informed that it was an adjourned public meeting of the finance committee
but there was no reply forthcoming

(A) the first class shall consist of inmates who contribute, or on whose behalf others contribute financially to their support; (B) the second class shall consist of inmates over...years of age, the entire cost of whose maintenance and support shall be borne by the county; (C) the third class shall consist of children under the age of...years, the entire cost of whose maintenance and support shall be borne by the county.

7. Each class shall be provided with board in a separate boarding

whose maintenance and support shall be borne by the county.

7. Each class shall be provided with board in a separate boarding hail, but the male and female inmates in each class shall have separate domorties except in the case of husband and wife, who, if convenience will permit that such may be done may occupy a sleeping room in common.

8. Every inmate of the Home who has been pronounced by the physician in attendance to be of unsound mind shall, as soon as practicable after being so pronounced, be removed to the Provincial Hospital at Lancaster unless such physician certify that there is no objection to his continuing an inmate of the Home.

Every chamber or room used as a place of punishment for inmates who are disorderly or violate the rules and regulations soverning the Home, shall be properly heated, lighted and ventilated, and shall be supplied with a reasonable comfortable chair and bed and bedding, and no inmate shall be confined in no such room or chamber for a longer period than eight hours without the authority of the attending physician, and no inmate shall be confined to such chamber or room for a longer period than twelve hours without the authority of the attending physician, and no inmate shall be confined to such chamber or room for a longer period than twelve hours without the authority of both the attending physician and the secretary, or the attending physician and the secretary. 


