MRS. A.'S CREAM PIES Six eggs, two cups sugar, two cups flour, two teaspoons cream-tartar, one teaspoon soda dissolved in two teaspoons cold milk. Rub the cream-tartar in the flour; stir the eggs, sugar, and flour a minute, and add the sods when it is ready to bake. This makes three pies. Split them when cold, and put in the following cream :-

CREAM FOR PIES .- One pint milk, one cup sugar, one-half cup flour, two eggs. Beat eggs, sugar, and flour together, and pour into the boiling milk. Flavour with lemon or vanilla.

To Dye Yellow on Cotton.—For one pound of cotton use Sugar of Lead 2 oz., Bichromate of Potass 1 oz. Dissolve each separately in a sufficient quantity of soft water to cover the goods, which must first be immersed in the lead solution and kept at a moderate heat for twenty minutes ; wring out and put into the Bichromate for ten minutes; repeat the operation and a fine Yellow will be the result.

If an Orange color is required put the dyed goods through lime water.

Boil the Annatto and Soda in a sufficient quantity of water till dissolved, then put in the goods and keep at boiling heat until the right shade is acquired: take out and scald in the Alum water half an hour, wring out and dry.

Lemon Pies. Take three good lemons, roll them until soft, take the juice ont into a dish, pick out the seed, chop the peel very fine, chop one teacupful of raisins; add the whole together, with one and a half cup of molasses; stir it well, put in a little water and flour: do not hurry the baking, as it will run

TO DYE EROWE.—For every pound of wool take two ounces of cream of tartar and a quarter of a pound of alum, boil them together half an hour; take half a pound of cam wood, a quarter of a pound of fustic, and two ounces of logwood, soak these at night in shough water to cover the wood; soak the wool in the alum water for half an hour, then boil with the woods for half an hour, if a dark brown is required, and a tablespoonful of copperas.

TO CLEAN MARBLE.—Spanish whiting, made into a paste by being moistened with water in which a piece of washing soda is dissolved, spread on a piece of dannel, and well rubbed upon marble, the process being repeated two or three times, is very good as a cleanser. It should be washed off with soap and water, and the marble afterward polished with a soft duster.

Stir it wall, and put it by till next day, and then stir it, about well with a piece of stick, and let, it stand for another day, and it, will be quite fit for use if the becswax has been glavel fine. Keep the stick in the bottle to take a little out with when you want to use it, as you must use only a very little at a time. It must, on no account, be melted over the fire, as it is so inflammable it would burst into a flame, and perhaps set fire to the house.

GREEN.—For every pound of yarn or cloth, add three and a half ounces of alum and one pound of fustic; steep to get the strength, but not bolk 1856k the cloth until it acquires a good yellow colour; then throw out the chips, and add the indige paste slowly, until you have the desired shade of green.

An ounce or there of the compound is required for the above quantity, varied according to the depth of shade. A deeper and richer green may be had by using tuneric instead of fustic, and proceeding in the same mainer.

When the cement is wanted, take one part of this and twenty parts of clean iron filings or borings, grind them together in a mortar, mix them with water to a proper consistence, and apply them between the joints.

TO MARE APPLE JELLY.—Take your apples, wash, and cut them into halves, to be sure that there are no worms in them; place them in a brass or porcelain kettle, without removing the seeds or rinds; cover them with water, and let them boil till perfectly soft; then take them off, strain them through a coarse towel, and put the juice back into the kettle; let it boil to the consistency of molasses; then for every gallon of syrup add two pounds of sugar and an ounce of cinnamon; bring it to's boil, skim it, and it is done.

RIPE CUCUMBER PICKLE, OR RUSSIAN REAR.—Take large and ripe cucumbers before they become soft; out in rings, pare, divide in smaller pieces, and remove the seeds; cook the pieces very slightly in water salted just enough to flavour well; drain and put in a stone jar. Prepare a vinegar as follows: Two pounds of sugar to two quarts of vinegar, a few slices of onion, some cayenne pepper, whole allspice, whole cloves, cinnamon according to one's judgment and taste. Much cooking injures the pickle very much; the pieces should be firm, and admit a silver fork with difficulty, when taken from the fire.

Let the whole drain three days, then add some sliced beetroot, and place the whole in a jar, over which pour boiling vinegar. The purple red cabbage is the finest. Mace, bruised ginger, whole pepper, and cloves, may be boiled with the vinegar, and will make a great improvement.

TO DYE A RICH SCARLET.—For every pound of wool or yarn take 1 ez. cochineal, 1 oz. of cream of tartar, 11 ounces solution of tin. Powder the cochineal very fine and put into enough water to cover the yarn; when it is a fiftle warm add the cream of tartar, and simmer; then add the solution of tin, wet the goods with clean water, wring out, and put into the dye till done. Dry your goods before you wash them.

Boil and skim it till very thick, smooth, and clear. When cold put it in jars.

PRESERVED PEACHES. Take tipe free-stone peaches; pare, stone, and quarter-them. To sik pounds of the cut peaches allow three pounds of the best brown adjan. Strew the sugar among the peaches, and set them away in a covered vessel. Next morning put the whole into a preserving kettle, and boil it slowly about an hour and three-quarters, or two hours, skimming it well.

WALL SAUSAGES. Take two pounds of lean real, and one pound of salt fat pork; skip or grand as you would sausage meat; add salt, pepper, sage, &c., and you will have delicious sausages, a thousand-fold preferable to pork or veal cooked separately.

CHICARN FIR. Take two full grown chickens (or more if they are small), disjoint them, and cut the back-bone, &ct., as small as convenient. Boil them, with a few alloes of salt park, in water enough to cover them; I let them boil quite tender; then take out the breast-bone. After they boil, and the seum is taken off, pat in a little onion, cut very fine, not enough to taste distinctly, but just enough to flawour a little; rub some paraley very fine when dry, or cut fine when green; this gives a pleasant flavour. Season well with perper and salt, and a few dunces of good fresh butter. When all is cooked well, have liquid enough to cover the chicken; then beat up two eggs and stir in, also some sweet cream. Line a five-quart pan with a crust made like soda bisquit, only more shortening; put in the chicken and liquid; then cover with a crust the same as the lining. Bake till, the crust, is done, and you will have a good chicken-pie.

PRESED HEAD.—Boil the several parts of the entire head, and the feet, in the same way as for souse. All must be boiled so perfectly tender as to have the meat easily separate from the bones. After neatly separated, chop the meat fine while warm, seasoning with salt, pepper, and other spices to taste. Put it in a strong beg, and, placing a weight on it, let, it remain till cold; or put it in any convenient dish, placing a plate with a weight on it to press the meat. Cut it in slices, roll in flour, and fry in lard.

A MINUTE FUDDING OF POTATO STARCH.—Four heaped tablespoonsful of starch, one quart of milk, three eggs, and a little salt.—Boil the milk, reserving a little to moisten the starch.—Stir the starch to a smooth paste with the reserved milk, and put it into the boiling milk. Add the eggs, well beaten; stir, and let it boil till very hick, which will be in two or three minutes; then pour into a dish, and serve with a liquid sance.

To Dye Blue—On Wool.—For each pound of Wool, take one ounce of Indigo Compound and half an ounce of Alum, dissolve them in, a sufficient quantity of het water, and min, thoroughly; immerse the goods in the dye for ten minutes, stirring well, that it may be evenly coloured; take out and rinse in cold water. If a deep blue is required, use more compound.

Buttermilk Cakes.—Two cups of buttermilk or sour milk, one cup of sugar, one piece of butter the size of a walnut, a teaspoonful of salaratus. Spice to your taste, with as much flour as will make a thin better, and bake.

"CORN PREPARES. —One teacupful of milk, three eggs, one pint of green corn grated, a little safe, and as much flour as will form a better. Beat the eggs, the yolks and whites separate. To the yolks of the eggs, add the corn, sait, milk, and flour enough to form a batter; beat the whole very hard; then stir, in the whites and drop the batter, a spoonful at a time, into hot lard, and fry them on both sides of a light-brown colour.
