FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF TORONTO.

The Directors are pleased to be able to lay before the Stockholders a satisfactory report of the business of the Company for the past year.

The judgment of the Court of Appeal in favor of the Company, in the suit brought by a gas consumer, has been appealed by him to the Privy Council and the case has not yet been argued.

The Company's appeal to the Supreme Court against the assessment of its street mains was partially successful, it having been decided that the Company was liable only for the taxes on mains laid in the ward in which the assessment was made, the whole of the mains having been assessed in one ward. The taxes on the mains so illegally assessed, which had been paid under protest, are therefore returnable to the Company, and amount to a considerable sum.

Notwithstanding the general depression in trade, the consumption of gas has materially increased.

This, is to be attributed partly to the great reduction in the price of gas, partly to the introduction
of improved burners, and partly to the growing recognition of its economy and convenience as a
fuel and for mechanical purposes.

During the year, 1,065 services have been put in, and over 64 miles of mains have been laid, making the total mileage now over 236.

The Company's works are in a satisfactory condition, and no opportunity has been lost in introducing and adopting the latest improvements in every department of the business.

The Directors have much pleasure in again testifying to the faithful and valuable services of their Manager, assisted by his able and efficient staff.

CONSUMERS' GAS COMPANY.

The Forty-Ninth Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders of the Consumers' Gas Company of Toronto, was held at the Company's Office, 19 Toronto Street, on Monday, 25th October, 1897, at noon.

Present:—Dr. Larratt W. Smith, Hon. Sir Frank Smith, Samuel Alcorn, Thomas Long, T. R. Wood, I. C. Gilmor, Walter S. Lee, Morgan Baldwin, Henry Cawthra, W. H. Pearson, A. J. Somerville, George Gooderham, C. C. Baines, D. B. Dick, E. A. Scadding, W. H. Evans, G. R. R. Cockburn,

Dr. F. L. Grasett, D. F. Jessop, B. E. Bull, J. L. Blaikie and James Henderson.

The President occupied the chair and read the Report of the Board of Directors. In moving its adoption, he took occasion to refer to the excellent condition of the Company's works and the assiduous efforts of the Manager to keep everything "up to date." He spoke of the various extensions of the Company's mains, and informed the Stockholders that gas was now being supplied by the Company to residents of Toronto Junction, East Toronto Village and Eglinton, and that a request had been received from the City Corporation for a supply of gas to the Island. He alluded in kindly terms to the valuable services which had been rendered to the Company by its late President, Mr. James Austin, and the great loss which the Company had sustained in his death.

The motion for the adoption of the Report, being seconded by Hon. Sir Frank Smith, was carried unanimously, as was also a resolution of thanks to the President, Vice-President and Directors for

their efficient services during the past year.

A resolution of thanks to the General Manager and the other officers and employés of the Company, moved by Mr J. L. Blaikie and seconded by Mr. Walter S. Lee, was unanimously carried.

After thanking the Shareholders, on behalf of himself and those associated with him, the Manager made reference to the effect of the reduction in the price of gas upon the profits of the Company, the profits realized after meeting the cost of repairs and renewals, having been a little more than sufficient for the dividends. The increase in the consumption of gas during the year over the previous one, was one per cent. greater than the increase in 1896 over 1895, which in view of the strenuous efforts being made by rival lighting companies he considered very gratifying. He referred in feeling language to the death of the late President, with whom he had been personally associated in the Company for the past thirty-seven years.

Messrs, Walter S. Lee and C. C. Baines having been appointed scrutineers, a ballot was taken and the following gentlemen were declared to have been unanimously elected Directors for the

ensuing year :-

At a Board Meeting held subsequently, Dr. Larratt W. Smith was unanimously elected President; and Hon. Sir Frank Smith Vice-President for the ensuing year.
