





#### TEACHERS SALARIES

Premier Murray intends introduc ing into the Nova Scotia Legislature at the present session, for the amenent of the present Nova Scotia Educational Act, and in it prevision is to be made for the pensioning of teacher The old pedagogues will hale with joy the amendment, and the young recruits will go forward with a feeling of hone to the day when they may reach the age limit and receive the gratuitous reward for their faithful services from a grateful government.

The legislature of New Brunswick has been far less liberal in their treatment to teachers. They, too, are a bout to introduce a bill for the amend ment of the Educational Act but we are not aware that it will contain any inductive to teachers. And yet there is every need for such consideration. There is a continual cry about the scarcity of teachers and quite a number of schools have been closed on that account in other instances local Legislature might do much towards licenses have been issued.

The teachers of New Brunswick are very poorly paid for their services, Nova Scotia Legislature in the unes and instead of legislation adding to their wages, it has materially lessene it. When Provincial grants were first made to teachers in 1847 the allowance was the same as now, viz Male, first class, \$135; second class, \$108; third, \$81: Female, first class \$100; second class, \$81; third class follows: Male first class \$150; second class, \$120; third class, \$90; Female third class, \$70. In 1884 the rates were reduced to the original standard

During the past few years the price are everywhere clamoring for higher wages. In some parts of the province they have organized and at various flat rate schedule of wages, the object being to increase their salaries. Only a moderate success has been reached by this movement as the movement clude all the counties.

There are still some counties which whatever. The result is that schoolteachers get less pay and more abuse than any other the province.

The average second class male teacher in country districts get a salary from the people very much below starvation wages, and even the first class male teachers in many cases find their incomes too easily figured out at the end of the year. The average first class female teacher's salary is given at \$330,72 and the second class at \$248.23, but the teachers in country districts where the greatest hardships are endured, fall much below these figures.

The result is that many of our best teachers have gone Westward where their services are better appreciated, and remuneration is there double what it is in New Brunswick, while the cost of living is very little more. It is little wonder, then, that the demand for teachers in this province is rapidly increasing in spite of the large num ber training in the Provincial Normal School each year. Under the present state of affairs it will soon be found that there is not only a scarcety of teachers, but that the teachers are of an inferior quality in consequence of the cream having gone westward or engaged in other and more remunerative occupations here.

The granting of pensions for teachers will result in establishing a more experienced class of teachers than now exists. Teachers with ne greater objects in view will be induced to cor. tinue in the profession for a longer time with the hope of reward for their long services. During the past year no less than 1321 teachers, 344 of whom were beginners, have been in the profession less than seven yearand less than 25 per cent. hold licenses above the second dass

In commencing upon the scarcity of teachers the report of the Chief perintendent of education has the owing: "The scale of wages and

alaries paid to clerks, typewriters, tenographers, nurses, and all classe of employes in commercial and man facturing establishmente has advance while the salaries of teachers, except in the Western Provinces, has remain ed nearly stationary. There is no re asonable ground to hope that the widely-experienced stringency arising from the scarcity of teachers will relax until one of two things occurs. Either the rate of teacher's salaries must in some way be increased proportionately to that of other employments re quiring equal training and intelligence or we must wait until the busine pedulum swings in the opposite direction and a period of hard times takes place of the prosperous period which we have experienced for several years past. 


