European Intelligence.

From papers to the 5th August.

IMPORTANT FROM IRELAND! FIRST ENGAGEMENT BETWEEN THE AUTHORITIES AND THE REBELS.

KILKENNY, July 30.—I suppose you have already received some account of the affray which took place yesterday near Ballingarry, on the borders of this county, between the police and the rebels. I now send you the details, which, so far as I have been able to learn them, I have reason to believe to be correct. Proclamations having been posted up yesterday morning, offering a reward of £300 for the apprehension of Meagher, Doherty, and Dillon, and of £500 for that of Smith O'Brien, Sub-inspector Trant proceeded from Callan, with a police force of between 40 and 50 men, in the hope of capturing some of the proclaimed rebels. When they had arrived within a short distance of Ballingarry, they were encountered by Smith O'Brien, at the head of a body of insurgents, which is estimated variously as consisting of from 400 to 1,000 men. The police then took possession of a house close at hand, when the rebel leader addressing one of the police, summoned the party to surrender. The policeman instead of showing Mr. O'Brien, which he might easily have done, went to the part of the building where Mr. Trant was at the time, to report the matter to his commander. Mr. Trant immediately hastened to the spot, but Mr. O'Brien had taken his departure. Mr. Trant forthwith directed his men to fire; the engagement then commenced, and speedily terminated with the defeat of the rebels, of whom about eight or ten were killed and several wounded. During the conflict two shots were fired at O'Brien, but neither took effect. One of the shots hit a rebel who was standing by O'Brien's side brandishing a pike. He was killed on the spot. Another party of police, under the command of Mr. Cox, and accompanied by Mr. French, the stipendiary magistrate, came up at the instant, and fired at the rebels with considerable effect—after which the insurgents fled in the greatest disorder. Eighteen were killed altogether, and a vast number wounded. The police ultimately retired upon Callan, without suffering any loss whatever.

Information reached this town about ten o'clock last night of the collision, upon which a large detachment of the 83rd, and about 150 police, with Inspector Blake, repaired to the scene of action, supposing that the Callan police were still beset by the rebels. These troops remained out all night without meeting either the enemy or, of course, the Callan police, who had previously reached their barracks; they have since returned here sufficiently jaded, and in very bad humour with the insurgents. I have ascertained that a sergeant of the police from this town, had been previously in the rebel camp yesterday, having been caught by them in coloured clothes, when they were about to kill him, believing that he was one of the detectives; however, by the interference of O'Brien he was spared, but his horse was taken from him, on which O'Brien mounted, and rode about amongst his troops, in a general's uniform—the horse was ultimately returned to the man, who has since arrived here in safety. He describes the state and appearance of O'Brien to be very miserable, but it is said he expressed his determination never to surrender, as he feels his fate would then be certain. I had forgotten to say that Mr. Blake did not return here with the troops this morning, nor is it known where he now is. Probably, as he is a resolute and adventurous fellow, and well armed, he is on the trail of the traitor, in the hope of capturing him, and winning the reward. This is a perilous service, and which anxiety is felt about him. All with whom I have spoken concur in the necessity of a simultaneous and speedy movement of the troops from the various posts which sur-

rounded the districts of Slievenamon and the colleries, about which all the traitors are lurking. If this be done, a collision will be forced on, and the affair terminated. It is said that Devin Reilly passed through this town last night.—Everything here is as yet tranquil, but you can easily perceive by the groups of people of all classes which you meet in every street, and the anxious inquisitiveness apparent on every face, that much excitement, not unmixed with alarm, pervades the town. It is thought, and I think not without reason, that this city, or its immediate vicinity is likely to be the point on which the rebels will make their first attempt—if, indeed, they will at all dare the fortune of an open outbreak—as it is rumoured that they have many friends within the walls, as well as in the country from this to the borders of Tipperary. I shall leave my letter open to the last moment, and communicate anything further which I may hear upon these all-engrossing topics.

P.S. O'Brien is in the colliery district, near Slievenamon, and General Macdonald close at his heels.—Correspondence of the Dublin Evening Mail.

THE ESCAPE OF SMITH O'BRIEN.

The following is from a gentleman resident near the place where the late escapade with Mr. Smith O'Brien and the police party took place:

"You will have heard of our little 'skrimmage,' with Smith O'Brien and his followers, at Ballingarry, on Saturday night. Trant and his men behaved famously, and I consider it has put down the rebellion—for, though insignificant, as to the loss the rebels sustained, its moral effect will be great—they had conceived, that from their numbers all the troops in Ireland could not stand before them and now to be worsted by 'forty peelers' has crushed all their presumptuous hopes. Contrary to expectation, Smith O'Brien behaved like a great poltroon.—Having summoned the police to give up their arms, he said to his people, 'Now, boys, blaze away at them,' and then crept on his hands and knees round a wall, and ran away. I should hardly be surprised if they gave him up to the authorities. One of the leaders has been badly wounded." It was generally rumoured; that O'Brien, Meagher, and Reilly, had succeeded in embarking on board a vessel, in Galway, which was on the point of sailing for America.

Public Feeling in Limerick.—Since Saturday the greatest anxiety and excitement agitate the public mind. No adequate idea can be formed of the reality. A great damp is thrown on every department of business, and the thoughts of every one are engrossed with concern for the patriot sons of Ireland, and the present condition of things. Groups appear in various quarters of the city engaged in conversation, and discussing the consequences of the government's last act. At the arrival of each train, crowds attend with anxious inquiry, but various and conflicting are the accounts, as detailed elsewhere. The proclamations offering the rewards for the apprehension of Smith O'Brien and the other parties, were scarcely posted upon the various parts of the city on Saturday when they were either torn or defaced. Go where you will, meet whom you will, you hear nothing talked of but the English minister, and his conduct to this country. The pensioners who have been lately called into service, were paraded in single file, to the amount of four hundred, on Sunday afternoon, fully accoutred, to the new barracks, as if with a view to intimidate. The police in the different small detached stations throughout the country have been ordered to concentrate in various places—viz. Limerick, Castleconnell, Birrill, Newport, Rathkale, Kilfinnan, &c. **Limerick Reporter.**

Arrival of the Birkenhead Steamer with 400 Marines.—The Birkenhead war steamer arrived in Kingstown harbour yesterday from Portsmouth, having on board 400 marines.

The vessel is stationed at Kingstown for the present.

SUPPRESSION OF THE REBEL NEWSPAPER.—On Friday the offices of the *Nation* and *Felon* were taken possession of by the police, and all the copies of those newspapers, together with the types, &c. employed in printing them, were seized, and conveyed into the police commissioners' office.

DISSOLUTION OF THE UNITED IRISHMAN'S CLUB.—On Monday at a special meeting of the committee a resolution to dissolve this club was adopted.—*Galway Vindicator.*

New Proclamations.—The following Proclamation was issued by the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council, on yesterday. It is founded on the act under which Frewen was convicted at the Special Commission in Limerick, for harbouring criminals. It will doubtless, supposing the above statement to be untrue, embarrass the movements of S. O'Brien and colleagues very much:—"CAUTION.—Whereas, William S. O'Brien, Thomas F. Meagher, John B. Dillon, Michael Doheny, and divers other persons, stand charged as being engaged in rebellion against her Majesty.—Now, this is to give notice to, and warn all persons, that all those who shall protect against their pursuers any of the above named persons, or others whom they shall know to be engaged in similar treasonable practices, or who shall afford them the means to escape, or who shall aid in their disguise, or who shall mislead those who are in search of them, or who shall harbour or shelter them, by receiving them into their dwellings, or otherwise, are themselves guilty of the crime of high treason, and will be dealt with accordingly. COMMERCIAL.

The fears which were entertained on this day week of a formidable rebellion in Ireland have, we rejoice to say, been considerably relieved within the past few days, and the danger of any outbreak in this town or in the manufacturing districts for the present, at least, are very remote.

The prospect for the approaching harvest have not varied since our last, and the weather continues only moderately favourable for ripening the crops. Nearly everything depends on the weather for a few weeks to come. With regard to the important question of the Potatoe crop it may be some time before anything of a decided character can be determined; in the mean time the general accounts of the crop are much more favourable than ten days ago, and in consequence Indian Corn has declined 2s. to 3s. per quarter; sweet Flour is worth 29s. 6d. to 30s. per barrel; sour 28s.; Indian Corn 32s. to 34s. per quarter; Indian Corn Meal 15s. 6d. to 15s. 9d. per barrel; Wheat 6s. 9d. to 8s. 3d. per 70lb. with stock.

The Manchester markets have been quiet during the week, but as manufacturers have been working to order, and as stocks have not yet been replenished, the prices of cloths have not been materially affected; yarns are however easier to purchase. Yesterday, under the influence of the news from Ireland there was a more cheerful feeling.

European Intelligence.

LIVERPOOL, August 6.

The fears which were entertained on this day week of a formidable rebellion in Ireland have, we rejoice to say, been considerably relieved within the past few days, and the danger of any outbreak in this town or in the manufacturing districts for the present, at least, is very remote.

Waterford, Aug. 1.—At Carrick a great change in the tone of the people is manifest within the last two days. The Rev. Dr. Connolly, Roman Catholic pastor, has denounced the leaders, and cautioned all under his care against breaking the peace. At Cahir the Dean denounced the movement on Sunday; at Cashel the parish priest pronounced against it; at Clogheen, the Rev. Mr. Kelly lent his voice to its suppression; and Archdeacon Laffan, at Fethard, gave his powerful assistance from the altar in withdrawing his parishioners from being led away.

From the strong opposition given to the confederates by the greater portion of the Roman Catholic clergy, and the Old Irelanders being disinclined to fraternise, I think I may assure you of peace, at least in the districts I have mentioned in this report.

Mr. Halpin, secretary to the Irish League, was arrested on Saturday at the League Rooms, Dale Street, under a warrant authorised by the Habeas Corpus Suspension Act. Mr. Rea, of Belfast, who was in company with Halpin at the time, was also taken into custody, and both sent to Kilmainham prison. The police afterwards seized all the books and papers in the League Rooms.

The Confederate or rebel clubs in the cities and throughout the country are all being dissolved.

Seizure of Gunpowder bound for Ireland.

PLYMOUTH, Aug. 2.—Yesterday, a gentleman residing in Stonehouse received information that a vessel named the Emerald Isle, Captain Buck, had left London bound for Ireland, with a quantity of gunpowder on board, which she had entered on her papers as flour. We have also heard that the gunpowder was taken on board at Yarmouth. When the information was received here it was immediately communicated to the pilots and officers connected with the coast service, in order that they might keep a look-out. Yesterday the Emerald Isle put in the Sound, in consequence of adverse winds. She was immediately boarded, and the captain was asked what he had on board. He replied that he had flour, and was bound for Dublin. Mr. Rea, the tide surveyor, asked to look at some of the flour, and directed that some of the barrels should be handed up to him; on this being done, they were found to contain gunpowder. The whole of the other barrels are also believed to contain gunpowder, and it was bound for Ireland for the benefit of the insurgents.

There were 300 barrels on board. The vessel and all parties connected with it are in care of the authorities.

Double Guards on the Mails.—Yesterday evening the different mails leaving the Post Office had double guards mounted on them, as if the authorities were apprehensive of an attack.

At Nenagh the police have been strengthened and furnished with muskets and ammunition. A squadron of dragoons and the 59th from Templemore, were ordered to occupy the town.

Arrests in Drogheda.—On Thursday evening, about three o'clock, Mr. Marron, editor of the *Drogheda Argus*, with Messrs Hart and Drew, were arrested on a charge of "training and drilling." They were brought before Captain Derinzy, S. M. in the Tholsel, and, after a lengthened investigation, the charge against our respected and popular townsman, Mr. Drew, was dismissed. Messrs Hart and Marron were held to bail to appear at the next Month-assizes. On leaving the Tholsel office, a large crowd of respectable traders and others cheered Mr. Marron and his friends most enthusiastically to the *Argus* office, in West Street, concluding with one deafening cheer for—"the Queen and Repeal!"—*Freeman*.

The last accounts from Ireland report the continuance of tranquillity. There is no intelligence of the movements of the rebel leaders.

CONTINENTAL NEWS.

The news from the Continent is important, and not by any means favourable to peace. All hope of amicably arranging the Danish question has been abandoned, and consequently hostilities, with all the attendant pressure of blockade, seizure, and embargo, will be, or are already renewed. On every hand the note of preparation for the prosecution of energetic measures is heard. The German ship-owners have been officially warned by the Government of Berlin, of the renewed risk of capture by the Danes.—The German Parliament has declared an intention to wrest Limburg from Holland.—The speech of the Archduke John, in opening the Austrian Diet, breathed amity and peace towards all the states of the Empire, and all foreign countries. Even of Italy, he averred that the war "is not directed against the liberties of the people of that country," and that the task of the army is "to conquer an honorable peace."—Accounts from Bologna state that four of the legations have risen against the authority of the Pope, and a committee of war has been appointed, charged to take such measures as they may think necessary, without reference to the central government of Rome. The principal adopted as the basis of action with this committee is, not only the defence of the Pontifical states, but the total expulsion of the Austrians between the Alps.

From France the news is comparatively unimportant. The correspondent of the *Daily News* mentions a rumor that Lord Northampton is about to quit Paris, and that Lord Holland will succeed him, not as an ambassador, but as a minister, conformably to the usages of the republic, which only names ministers or charge d'affaires to the foreign courts, with the exception of the Holy See. Gen. Oudinot is ordered to form a division from the troops at Moulins, Lyons and Orenoble, and to march to Toulon, where orders are already sent to a division of our fleet. These troops with it is said, sail for the Adriatic, and occupy a city near the Po, in concert with the Pope. His Holiness seems, however, in want of assistance in re-against his own subjects, than against another power.—In Spain, the Monarchist insurrection continues; in Catalonia, bands of Carlists are beginning to be mischievously active.—The Porte is represented as about to take serious measures respecting the Danubian principalities. Troops and cannon are on their way to the Lower Danube, and the army at Baghdad has been ordered to hasten to Constantinople in forced marches. Meanwhile the Russian troops have entered Lower Wallachia without the slightest opposition.—The arrival of another Indian mail removes the anxiety created by the reports of serious plots at Lahore, corroborated by the summary execution of two natives of rank in the service of the Ranees. It now appears that the steps taken to punish treasonable intrigues have been successful in preventing the anticipated spread of dissatisfaction beyond the Beas and the Sutlej. The only actual movement has been that of Maharaj Singh, who raised the standard of sedition with about 300 followers. A pursuit was set on foot for the capture of this Eastern O'Brien, but had not succeeded at the date of the advices.

CANADA.—The Montreal Gazette gives the following "important if true" rumors, viz:—That His Excellency the Governor-General has tendered his resignation of the government of the Colony.

That His Excellency is recalled, and is to be succeeded by Sir George Grey.

That three regiments of militia are immediately to be ordered out and drilled.

That the Irish of the United States are about to make an irruption into Canada, for objects which no human being seems able to conjecture.

That in the event of Mr. Sullivan being made a judge, Mr. Cameron will be made Commissioner of Crown Lands.

From all we can learn, we believe the Potato disease will not be half so dangerous as was apprehended a week ago. We are led to this conclusion from the fact, that those vines which were first infected, yet retain a great portion of their growth and vigor. The blight indeed appears to be very capricious, as may be seen from several fields

in the vicinity of Fredericton, where a scattered spot here and there may be seen infected, and all the rest green around them.—*Fredericton Reporter*.

Pic Nic.—On Wednesday last the children belonging to the Roman Catholic Congregation in this city had a Pic Nic provided for them at the expense of their clergyman, the Rev. Mr. McEade, and the Teachers of the Sabbath School, which is said to have delighted the children, and afforded the highest satisfaction to their teachers and the numerous members of the Roman Catholic Church who took a share in the festivities of the day. The children left the city, for the opposite side of the River, about seven o'clock in the morning, and proceeded down the left bank until they came to the farm of Mr. Duffy, about two miles below the Ferry, where everything was prepared for their reception. During the day they were joined by numbers of young people of both sexes belonging to the same Church, and such of the parents as could, made it convenient to witness the fête given to the children; and we are informed that at one time there could not have been fewer than 500 men, women, and children, on the ground. The bulk of the children returned to the city about 9 o'clock in the evening, and having formed in procession at Lees Ferry, with the girls in front, they marched up Queen and Regent Streets, until they came to the Roman Catholic Chapel, which they entered, and after listening to a short address from Mr. McEade, they were dismissed with the blessing of their spiritual guide.—*Head Quarters*.

VISIT OF FATHER MATTHEW.—Intelligence has been received that Father Matthew will leave for New York in the packet ship *New World*, during the present month.

IMPORTANT DECISION.—Yesterday, Mr. Justice Day pronounced a very elaborate judgement in the case of *Cuvillier vs. Monro*.

Mr. George Monro was member for the Third Riding of York in the late Provincial Parliament, and having been arrested on a visit to Montreal, at the suit of Mr. Cuvillier, moved the Court to quash the writ, on the ground that a member of parliament is privileged from arrest. The decision was against the pretensions of Mr. Monro. We shall give a fuller report, as the case is very interesting, and involves some highly important points of constitutional law.—*Herald*.

A NEW SPECIES OF POTATO.—Mr. Elwin Bryant, in his tour to California, says that he was presented by one of the Kaness Indians with a root or tuber of an oval shape, about an inch and a half in length, and an inch in diameter. This root is called the prairie potato. Its composition is farinaceous and highly nutritious, and its flavour more agreeable than that of the finest Irish potato. "I have but little doubt," adds Mr. Bryant, "if this plant were cultivated in our gardens, it would be an excellent and useful vegetable for ordinary consumption, and very probably it would be so improved as to form a substitute for the potato.—*U. S. paper*."

GREAT FIRE AT ALBANY.—Our Boston papers, that we have seen, state that on Friday last, by which 5 boats, 10,000 barrels of stowed goods, and property to the value of \$100,000 were destroyed. It is also stated that several persons were drowned in the canal boats, and that many others were injured. The boats belonging to Boston were the first to be destroyed.

It is also stated, that several emigrants were drowned in attempting to escape from the canal boats. Two schooners belonging to Boston were burnt.

We learn from the Boston Advertiser, that the steamer Admiral is to be laid up for six weeks, to have new wheels and other repairs.
