RADIO IS AID TO FARMERS Speaker Says It Will Keep the Young

Detroit, May 3.—That radio will work wonders in keeping the young folks down on the farm was a theory expounded in the General Motors' building, where a record crowd of more than 5,000 persons turned out for Detroit's first radio show. The speaker was Prof. T. E. Reynolds, of the University of Detroit.

Prof. Reynolds, speaking before an audience that packed the assembly hall, painted a graphic picture of what the radio will do on a farm. He showed the glamour and entertainment that can be brought into the uneventful existence of farmers through the radio. He also told of the benefit the radio will be to the farmer in bringing to his door the

larmer in bringing to his door the latest stock and market quotations. Following his remarks on the radio and the farmer, he explained in a manner intelligible to the layman how to get the best results from the ordinary radio outfit.

Young folks leave the farm, according to Prof. Reynolds, because there is no opportunity for amusement and entertainment. With the radio in a farmhouse, he said, the old and young may listen to the best the world of amusement affords. They also may provide themselves with a liberal education on almost any conceivable subject, he added. He predicted the time will come when aerials will be as common on farmers' houses as lightning rods used to be on their barns.



Then they drop to the ground and form little cases in which they pupate, a new brood of dies emerge, lay their eggs, and from these there comes a second brood of larvae which may be seen on the plants at the time when the currants are ripe. When these larvae are full grown they enter the soil, form little cases or occoons, and remain there till the next year, when they pupate, and emerge as adults.

Method of Control.

Method of Control. These are easy insects to kill. All currant bushes and gooseberries should be sprayed with from two to three pounds arsenate of lead paste, or half that amount of the powder or half that amount of the powder form, in forty gallons of water as soon as the leaves have become well expanded. Particular care should be taken to spray thoroughly the inner parts of the bush. This will kill all the first brood. If a second brood appears hellebore should be used instead of arsenate of lead, in the proportion of one ounce to one gallon of water. Arsenate of lead would be dangerous on the ripe fruit. The insect occurs everywhere in the Province, and everyone should prevent his plants being weakened and sertiously injured by it, especially as it is so easy to control.



Every now and then we hear of earthquake that has taken ace in some parts of the world. As a matter of fact, the earthquakes of which we do not hear outnumber the

Not a single day passes withou parthquake shocks occurring in some part of the globe. Japan averages something ike three every twenty-four hours. Most of them are comparative ly small affairs—just a rumble, shight shaking, and aff is over. whether they are great or small, all

Place an iron ball in the fire until it is red hot; then allow it to cool in the air, and you will find that as it grows colder it emits sharp cracking noises. Even a saucepan will produce the same effect. The cracking is due to the fact that all substances grow smaller as they cool. The inside cools more slowly than the outside; hence, as the exterior contracts, it presses hard against the inside—so bard, in fact, that something must

give way.

The earth has been cooling for millions of years, and all the time the contracting outer crust has been squeezing the inner parts and giving way under the strain. Whenever there is a slight crack, millions of tons of rock, earth, or water move a considerable distance. The sudden crack causes the trembline that we call an able distance. The studen crack causes the trembling that we call an earthquake, whilst the movements of solid matter or water give rise to the rumbling noise that always accom-panies one of the earth's sideslips.




