The City Assessment.

In your issue of this date I read a letter signed "Several Workingmen." I don't know anything about the case referred to, viz., the Carling Brewing Company, but this I do know: That the system of assessment in this city is rotten to the core, and that many who are able to pay deliberately lie to the assessors and escape paying their proportion of the taxes that they are honestly entitled to pay, and saddle the amount on the workingmen of this city. For example: The assessor goes to Mr. A and asks him what is his income; he says \$500, while it is \$5,000 (ten times the amount). So he pays about \$10 taxes, where he should in all fairness pay \$100. Thus he escapes \$90, which is and must be collected from the workingman and property-owners. In the same way personal property is assessed most unfairly. I know of cases where some escape and others pay more than they are entitled to but dare not "squeal" for fear of injuring their credit. Something must be done and soon too. It is a wonder to me that workingmen and property-owners have stood the opression so long. I have lists of the assessment roll for 1892 that would make any man cry shame. Some assessed on income for less than they pay for their board, they having pledged their words to the assessment roll for Rey to the assessor that the amount was their income, and I regret to say that some of them call themselves Christians and shining lights in our fashionable churches. I expect there will be a real estate association formed in the near future in this city, when the lists I have referred to will be open to public inspection, and they will all be appealed. A NEW VERSION OF THE FLOOD.

The most interesting scientific article in

The most interesting scientific article in the quarterlies is the first paper in the Edinburgh for April on the "Ice Age in North America." The writer tells in a vivid and graphie way the story of a great catastrophe, the nearness of which to our present time is not realized by the majority of ordinary men.

AN ICE FLOOD.

It is not more than 10,000 years ago since the whole of North America and Northern Europe emerged from beneath a deluge of ice, which seems to have slain out the aboriginal inhabitants as remoreelessly as Noah's flood. The Edinburgh reviewer says:

Nonh's flood. The Edinburgh reviewer says:

'The chipped flint implement-makers perished with their contemporaries, the mammoth, the woolly rhinoceros, and the sable-toothed tiger, and left the globe to be repeopled by the polished stone-working or Neolithic progenitors of its actual inhabitants. The gap between the two races is conspicuous, and has not yet been archæologically bridged. A catastrophe is indicated; and a catastrophe by water. This is the conclusion of science; how singularly it harmonizes with the biblical narrative is almost superfluous to point out."

The Antedlluvian World.

The destruction of the Antediluvians who lived before the Ice Age set in was accomplished much further back; the date 6000 B. C. represents the end of the Ice Age, not its beginning. How it was that ice submerged the world no one seems to be exactly able to say, but a great deal of valuable information has been obtained by the geological research of the present century. Before the devastating deluge of ice set in—

Palms and cycads then sprang up in the room of oaks and beeches in England; turtles and crocodiles haunted English rivers and estuaries; lions, elephants and hyenas roamed at large over English dry land. Anthropoid apes lived in Germany and France; fig and cinnamon trees flourished in Dantzie; in Greenland, up to 70° of latitude, magnolias bloomed, and vines ripened their fruits; while in Spitzbergen, and even in Grinnell Land, within little more than eiglt degrees of the pole, swamp-cypresses and walnuts, cedars, limes, planes and poplars grew freely."

THE DEVASTATING CLACIER.

For some reason or other the temperature gradually fell and great glaciers forming in the northern regions, the highlands of Canada and hall of the United States to the present condition of Greenland. Those who see glaciers to-day can form little idea of the enomous possibilities of semi-fluid ice. Only in Alaska, where the Muir glacier empties itself into the Muir inlet at the rate of 70 feet a day, can we form any idea of the glacier as a destructive agency. This glacier empties 20,000,000 cubic feet of ice into the sea every day, that is to say 45,000 tons of ice fall into the water every minute in avalanches with detonations which sound like the booming of a canonnade. The very earth seems to tremble, and the sea boils

"And the whole of this enormous mass being extracted from the ocean, its differential effect in producing change of ever was doubled. The ice-cumbered land accordingly went down, like an overladen ship, until it was awash with the waves, and sea shells were deposited along coast fringes above the drift. Then, as the lee melted, recovery ensued."

The whole article is full of interesting and suggestive reading, and is no excellent example of a popular presentation of the results of scientific research.

Australian Reptiles.

"Australia is a great reptile country," remarked John Barciay, of Edinburgh, at the Southern yesterday. "I have traveled in almost every country, and I have never found a land that went ahead of Australia for snakes, lizards and frogs. There are some 65 species of snakes in that country, of which 42 are venomous and twelve positively dangerous. There are 40 or 50 different kinds of frogs, embracing every variety, from the common tree frog to a large green variety with blue eyes and a gold back, making a wonderful showing of color as he hops about. There are probably 40 kinds of lizards, of which twenty belong to a class known as night-lizards, many of which hibernate. The species can utter a cry when hurt or alarmed, and another kind, the frilled lizard, can lift its fore legs and hop about like a kangaroo. The monitor or fork-tongued lizard, burrows in kind, the frilled lizard, can lift its fore legs and hop about like a kangaroo. The monitor of fork-tongued lizard, burrows in the earth, climbs and swims, and grows to alength of nine or ten feet. The crocodiles of Queensland, however, grow to a length sometimes of 40 feet. Some of the Australian species of lizards can change their color not only from light to dark, but from gray to red. All kinds of turtles are caught. I saw one caught there that was ten feet in length."

A PERSONAL MATTER

Occupies Most of the Council's Time Last Night.

Ald. Judd Rises to Refute Certain Assertions-So Does Ald. Parnell-The Street Railway Company's Proposition Plays Second Fiddle and Is Laid Over.

Before the City Council last night took up the question which it had met to consider, namely, the street railway proposition, Ald. Judd rose to a question of privilege. He had a right to do so as it was a matter affecting his reputation. He referred to an anonymous communication in the evening ADVERTISER. He was not personally aggrieved as the more the ADVERTISER tried to stir up his character the more it increased his popularity and any person whose character was attacked. The first article referred to, which was purported to be signed by several workingmen, commented on the reduction of the Carling Brewing and Malting Company's assessment by the Court of Revision, and asked: "Was it legal for the chairman, Ald. Judd, to act as counsel, judge and jury in the case, as it was his firm, represented by Mr. Ed Meredith, that prosecuted the appeal?" The first statement, he said, was utterly untrue. He had had nothing to do for the Carling Company in his life. When the appeal of the company was being considered he withdrew from the case. The judgment was given by Ald. Yates, Leonard and Dreaney. Ald. Parnell had shown him a letter to the same effect as the newspaper article which he (Ald. Parnell) claimed had been delivered to him anonymously. He had asked that the letter be brought before the last meeting of the council so that he might have vindicated himself, but Ald. Parnell did not do it. He did not charge Ald. Parnell with writing the letter to the paper or the letter purported to have been delivered to him, but it would have been just as well had he submitted it and allowed his (Ald. Judd's) explanation to go out to the public with it. That communication was invented and published for no other purpose than a political one.






