## Bill Already Being Dra led and Important Changes Are Likely in London, Hamilton and Toronto.

Toronto, Ont., Dec. 6. - It was stated at the Parliament Buildings today that a redistribution bill is to be one of the features of the session to open in February. It is in charge of Dr. Pyne, and many important changes are already decided upon. One important effect of the new measure will be to give four more members to Toronto. This is to be effected by doubling up the representation from the present Toronto constituencies. Even at this increase, Toronto will only have one member for over 30,000 inhabitants, which is not greater than Hamilton and Ottawa's representations.

More members for Ottawa, Hamilton and London may be effected by a rearrangement affecting the various counties adjoining.

County boundaries are still to be the basis of representation, and no very radical changes are likely. Nipissing is to get three members, instead of







NOVEMBER IN ONTARIO

An Official Report of Last Month's Meteorological Conditions.

Under date of Dec. 4, the Government's meteorological office at Toronto makes the following report of the weather conditions that prevailed in Ontario during November: The first week was for the most part

fair throughout the Province with comparatively warm days and frosty nights. A heavy rain occurred near Lake Superior on the 7th, and by the 9th the weather had become unsettled and showery in all districts.

On the 12th a snowfall was almost general, accompanied by high northerly winds, and the three following days were quite cold but fair.

On the night of the 16th an exceedingly heavy easterly gale prevailed on Lake Superior and next day milder, showery weather with high winds extended to the eastward of Lake Huron.

During the 21st a storm of great energy moved towards the Great Lakes from the southward and very severe easterly gales with rain were followed on the 22nd by equally severe westerly

Another storm of lesser energy moved to the Great Lakes on the 26th, causing showers and high winds in Ontario for two or three days, after which the weather cleared up.

The mean temperature of the month differed very little from averages and extremes were not very pronounced, the warmest weather occurring during the first few days and the coldest about the middle of the month. The precipitation, which was part rain and part snow, was somewhat deficient in most ricts and especially so in the Otta-


