



FAILURES IN CANADA

Dun-Wiman Reports Show an Increase During Last Year.

New York, July 3 .- Insolvency returns from the Dominion of Canada for the first half of 1907, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., show 573 failures, with liabilities of \$5,426,433. These figures compare with 632 failures last year, when liabilities were \$5,214,975. The number of failures is smaller than in any recent year, except 1903, and the amount of liabilities is below the average for recent years. The comparison as to Provinces shows that failures were more numerous than last year in Ontario and Nova Scotia, while there was noteworthy improvements in Manitoba and Quebec. This year the largest liabilities were reported by Quebec, but there still appears a decrease of over \$200,000 in comparison with the returns from the same province in 1905. The total for Ontario was within \$30,000 of the figures for Quebec this year, while that province showed the heaviest increase over last year's figures, the difference bein gabout \$600,000, and occurring chiefly in the manufacturing class. Manitoba and New Brunswick reported much smaller liabilities than a year ago, and there was some decrease in British Columbia and Prince Edward Island, while more failures in Nova Scotia supplied a larger amount


