

There has been hope of prolonging the truce and adjourning the negotiations for an additional period of two months, but this hope has now receded.





NEAL-BRIDGE CASE DUE FOR HEARING

Bread Company Enters Action Against Former Manager.

Although it had been reported that the supreme court action of the Neal Baking Company against John Bridge, former manager of the London and St Thomas branches of the company, for \$14,282.84, had been settled, the case has been again set down for trial at the sittings to be held at the court house on Dec. 12, before Mr. Justice Masten.

The plaintiff company alleges that while Bridge was in its employ he purchased flour with the firm's money and resold it to the company at a

The company cites an instance where Bridge is alleged to have removed 2, 950 bags of flour from the company's warehouse and kept the proceeds of the sale, necessitating the purchase of cheaper grade of flour at a higher

Bridge bought 1,220 bags of flour, sold 835 bags, and kept the proceeds. The plaintiff company learned of the alleged actions of their manager in the fall of 1920, and asked for an explanation and accounting, which, it alelges, has yet to be received.

Makes Counter-Claim.

Mr. Bridge, in a counter-claim, states that he was to have received a salary of \$6,000 per annum from July 15, 1919. but that the actual salary received wa "Mrs. E B. Smith:
"Dear Madam,—On behalf of the executive committee and members of and as a further remuneration for his services he alleges that it was agreed between the parties that he was to be allowed to sell flour, sugar and othe commodities in the name of the plaintif and to take the profits upon certain transactions for himself. In pursuance of this arrangement, Mr Bridge states in his counter-claim that

In all, Mr. Bridge claims \$26,550.16.



The trustees also ask the court to appoint their successors and to authorize them to "transfer the trust property in their hands to such new trustees." They petition the court to

approve their accounts and discharge them from all further responsibility in connection with the trust. After the court had announced its decision that the directors had control over the trustees with power to remove them, the trustees announced that they were ready to co-operate with the directors in the choice of their suc-

essors.

The directors soon afterward made it known that they had submitted the name of a Christian Scientist to the trustees to succeed Rowlands.

The court today took under advisement motions by counsel for the direc-tors that decrees be issued putting the court's decision into effect and that the injunction restraining the directors from interfering with the business of the publishing society be dissolved.





Is The University Bylaw Good Business For London?

By the passage of the University Bylaw on Monday, December 5, next, London will obligate itself for \$250,000. In taxation that means 30c on every \$1,000 of assessment for 20 years. But that \$250,000 in the next two years grows into millions of dollars to be spent and circulated in London. If London helps herself by voting for this bylaw, others will help London.

It means \$800,000 immediately available, promised by the Ontario Government. It means \$100,000 promised by the county of Middlesex.

FIVE MILLIONS IN TWO YEARS

A total of not less than \$5,000,000 will be spent in the city during the next two years if this bylaw carries.

Is it worth 30c on a \$1,000 assessment?

If a great industrial corporation proposed to spend \$3,000,-000 in plant and to circulate for wages and materials another \$2,000,000 in two years, and could guarantee to keep on increas= ing its pay roll for years and years to come, on condition of a grant of \$250,000, costing the ratepayers only 30c per \$1,000 of assessment, WHO would hesitate to vote for it?

By carrying the bylaw and securing these sums there will be spent on now buildings for the Western University in the next two years \$2,000,000

By affiliated colleges which now have their own sites selected 1,000,000

By students and faculties now spending \$750,000 a year 1,500,000 For maintenance at \$300,000 a year 600,000

But this is not all. In two years with the buildings now planned, the student body and faculties would have grown from 750, as at present, spending \$750,000, to at least 1,000, spending \$1,= 000,000 a year; while the maintenance expenditure will grow from \$300,000 a year to at least \$400,000. And these expenditures in London by students and faculties and for maintenance will continue for practically all time and will grow three and fourfold in the next 10 or 15 years. In 10 years it is estimated Western University will have between 2,500 and 3,000 students.

Universities are among the world's longest-lived institutions, surviving governments, dynasties and empires. Oxford is 800 years old. Heidelberg is 535 years old, Harvard 282 years, and our own Canadian McGill has just celebrated its hundredth anni-

In consequence of this, the Racer carried a re-compression chamber for the pur-pose of treating cases of illness which the divers might contract in the course of their hazardous task.

The vessel engaged in salvaging the gold in the Laurentic is about all that remains of the splendid admiralty salvage section which was brought in being during the war. With this excep-tion, the section came to an end with the completion of the wreck-raising opera-tions on the Belgian coast.
