No Canadian can beast of his acquaintance with the history of his country, unless he has mastered Lord Durham's report. In advocating the legisada, Lord Durham erred in assuming an intolerable situation. It grew intolerable in its turn, but it paved the admirable type of citizen. way for Confederation. The report, however, is imperishable, as the great charter of colonial freedom. It promulgated the doctrine of responsible government, which Lord Elgin confirmed and applied.

The United States Beef Trust.

A judgment of vast importance ha been handed down by the United States Supreme Court. The court decides that the combination of packers known as the Beef Trust is illegal and can be dissolved. The United States Government, which brought the action, is sustained on every count of the indictment. The court rules against the packers in three particulars:

1. They are prohibited from combining to suppress competition in the purchase of cattle for slaughter.
