200 CROWD SEES

Twenty-Foot Snake Could Not & It Pays Shed His Skin and Keepers Had to Help.

New York, Oct. 3. - Battling with 0-foot python, two men were watched by a breathless crowd at New York Zoological Park, in Bronx Park. The spectators were astonished by the fearessness of the men as they worked inside the cage of the most dangerous reptile in the park collection.

The keeper's perilous task was made necessary by the condition of the python, one of the largest in captivity, and the especial pride of Curator Ditmars. About this time of the year these reptiles shed their skin. This they accomplish easily when not in captivity. When caged, however, asbecomes necessary, and the keepers face grave peril, for if the py-thon should swing its huge coils around one of the men no human arms could




