



The McGill Daily was the first to arrive with the sentence across the top, "Requirements Are Cut Down After Two Years Service." The Dalhousie Gazette stated, "To Reduce University Training Hours." The Western Ontario Gazette appeared with "Military Training Hours Officially Smashed Here," and togeher for mutual benefit. It is the Toronto Varsity said, "C. O. T. C. Training Parades Cut, 60 Hour Minimum Required.'






