- "The Revisal, Amendment, and necessary Continuation of ex-
- " piring Laws together with the Confideration of the weighty Mat-
- " ters I have already mentioned to you, will require your Unanimity
- " and Dispatch.
- "Those Papers which shall be requisite for your Information, will be laid before you by the Public Officers.

- "My earnest Wish is the Happiness of this Province, which is a Duty incumbent on me to promote. And I rely on your Efforts,

Report of felect Committee relative to Naval Office. Mr. Schwartz made a Report from the select Committee to whom the Petitions relative to the Naval-Office were refered; which Report was read and is as followeth;

"That the Committee have examined the Laws relative to the Naval-Office, and find, that it is founded on an Act passed in the Fifteenth Year of King CHARLES the Second, intitled, an Act for the Encouragement of Trade; by which it appears, that it was the wish and Intention of Great-Britain to keep the Plantation Trade entirely to herself, and the better to effect that Purpose, It is Enacted by the eight Sestion of the aforesaid Ast, "That all Persons importing any Goods into any of the Colonies or Plantations, shall make report to the Governor thereof, or to some Person (7. 8. William III. called Naval-Officer) by him appointed, and shew to him, that the Vessel in which fuch Goods are imported is an English built Vessel, belonging to England, Wales or the Town of Berwick, and navigated with an English Master, and three fourths of the Mariners Englishmen, and at the same Time deliver to the said Governor or to some Person by him appointed an Inventory or Invoice of such Goods, under the Pain of the Loss of the Ship, and all such Goods, as were not laden and taken in, in England, Wales, or the Town of Berwick."

That Vessels belonging to any of his Majesty's Subjects in his American Provinces, and trading from one Province to another, are not within the intent Meaning or Letter of that Act.

That Vessels belonging to his Majesty's Subjects in this Province, and navigated according to the late Acts of Parliament, and which bring from the *United States* of America, such Articles as are within his Excellency the Governor's Proclamation, are by no Means compellable to make Report to the Naval-Office; but to the Custom-House only; as such Vessels do not come within the Meaning or Letter of the aforesaid Act of King Charles the Second.

That the Naval Officer or Person appointed by his Excellency the Governor under the aforesaid Act of King Charles the Second, has no Power or Authority to appoint Deputies at the several Ports or Harbours of this Province, where there is no Cnstom-House: But that the Appointment of Naval Officer, is confined to the Governor by the aforesaid Act, and to him only.

That Fees are allowable to Naval Officers by the 10th Geo. 3. Cap. 37. But as this Act does not with sufficient Certainty define what those Fees are, whereby Owners of Vessels are made liable to Imposition. The Committee therefore recommend, that an Act be made giving to the Naval Officer such Fees, as shall appear to this House to be a sufficient Compensation for his Services.

15 Car. 2. Sec: 8. That the Committee can find no other Acts of Parliament, that give greater or other Powers to the Naval Officers than those in the said Act of King Charles the Second mentioned.

That it appears that the Naval Officer and his Deputies have exacted very high and burthensome Fees from the Owners of small Vessels, coasting from one Port or Harbour to another in this Province, to the great Interruption and Detriment of its internal Commerce, and to the Oppression of the Subject, and contrary to the Spirit and Letter of all the aforesaid Acts, relative to the Naval Office.

Address to his Ex-

ment of the Public accounts, that an augmentation of the Revenue was at the present conjuncture necessary, proceeded to adopt the only expedient they conceived in their power, for the accomplishment of fo important a purpose; which was, the re-enacting the former Revenue Laws. A fystem which by experience they had found to be the least burthensome, and most productive of any that they could devise; and subjecting certain additional articles to such an Impost and Excise as they conceived would be sufficiently productive to make that necesfary augmentation to the Revenue, which the public exigencies seemed to require. In doing of this, we conceived w had fully complied with your Excellency's wishes, and with the expectations of the Public: And had no doubt the Bill for that purpose, would have met with the Chearful and ready Concurrence of His Majesty's Council; but to our great furprise, many unimportant objections were made, when the Bill was fent up to them for their concurrence; a Committee of conference from both Houses was appointed, the result of which Conference was, that the House of Assembly were confirmed in the Opinion of the propriety and good policy of their own Measures; and of course determined to adhere to their Bill, conceiving at the same time, that it was one of their inherent privileges, that all money Bills should originate with them, and that no interference of the Council, by attempting to make any alterations in them, should be admitted; this inherent priding vilege, the House of Assembly are determined to maintain, as essential to their very existence; they are nevertheless, extremely concerned that this struggle for an undoubted priviledge, should be the means of throwing the Public into Confusion, and of depriving His Majesty of an annual and efficient Revenue of near Ten Thousand Pounds.

We trust your Excellency will do us the Justice to believe, that every measure consistent with our Duty, has been taken on our parts, to prevent so great a Calamity. And we have no doubt, when your Excellency shall have perused the Minutes of our Proceedings, which we now beg leave to lay before your Excellency for that purpose, the House of Assembly will stand fully acquitted of every degree of Culpability, in this respect.

We cannot help subjoining, that as the Council have as yet, never rejected the Bill in the *usual form*, it still remains in their power to wardoff an Evil, which in a few hours (by the expiration of the present Revenue Laws) may have a very serious and alarming effect.

They are conscious that no blame can be laid to their Charge, on that account.—They are much concerned, however to find, that while they have been attentive to their own Rights, they have been accused of intruding upon the Rights of others;—a charge which they intirely disavow, and from which they are, on this occasion, anxious to vindicate themselves.

The Council have, in their Address to your Excellency of Yesterday, asserted that we had presumed "to dictate to them the Mode in "which they should transact their own Business," and had treated their Messenger in an improper Manner—As to the first of these, we can only say, that, we do not recollect a single Instance, in which we have so far deviated from the Rule of Right Conduct, as in any Degree to merit so severe a Censure—and as to the latter, we hesitate not to assert, that the Dignity of the House of Representatives shall never be degraded, while we have the honor to compose that Body, by an unworthy Submission to the Rudeness or Insolence of any Messenger, under whatsoever Authority he may think proper to shelter himself.—We beg leave to assure your Excellency, that we shall always hold sacred the Rights of others, and have no doubt we shall ever meet with your Approbation and Support, while we pay a steady and due Attention to the Preservation of our own.

- "Bills tending to raise a Revenue for the Support of his Majesty's
- "Government in this Province ought to orginate with them, and that

"Agree generally. This may it please your Excellency was all the Right we ever afferted in such Bilis, and those were controuling Powers we ever acknowledged as constitutionally vested in his Maighty's Council.

To our Astonishment however, during the present Session repeated Attempts have been made by his Majesty's Council, not
only to amend such Bills, but also to originate, and create new
Ones. As the Representatives of the People, we conceive, we are
the best and sole Judges of the Quantum of Taxes and Impositions
they are able to bear, and also what may be necessary for the Exigencies of Government for the ensuing Year; we have therefore
in Conformity to your Excellency's wishes, and from a full Conviction of the Necessity of the Measure increased the Revenue in
fuch a Manner, as we hoped most conducive to the public Weal,
and at the same Time least burthensome to the Subject.

" We perfectly concur with your Excellency in the Idea, that the " most simple is the most eligible Mode of conducting the public "Bufiness of the Province, and we beg leave to affure your Excel-66 lency, that we have in framing the Revenue Bill passed this House " during the present Session, and sent up for the Concurrence of his " Majesty's Council been peculiarly Attentive, to that object, and " that we conceive a seperate A& for laying the additional Duties, " of Impost and Excise, so necessary for the Support of his Majesty's " Government; and the Credit of this Province would have render-" ed the System of Revenue Laws double voluminous and complex, " without any one public Benefit to compensate for those Inconveni-" encies. Had the Object of Taxation this Year, been new or dis-" fimilar to each other, either in the mode of levying or collecting " them, we should have thought it highly expedient to have imposed " the Taxes seperately, but that not being the case, we have adopted " the Mode fanctioned by the almost uninterrupted Usage of this " House, and ever heretofore agreed to by his Majesty's Council.

The House having resolved to depute two of their Members to act as their Agents in Great-Britain for the Year ensuing in Conjunction with Richard Cumberland, Esqr; the Agent of this Province, and you being nominated and chosen for that Purpose; the following are the Objects to which they think proper to direct your particular Attention.

In the First place you are to assure in the strongest and most respectful Terms our most Gracious Sovereign and his Ministers of the Loyalty and sincere Attachment of this House and the Province they represent to his Royal Person and Government, and of our warmest Gratitude to the parent State for the Protection and Support we have invariably experienced from its Liberality and Favor.

Secondly. You will attend to and endeavour to promote the Success of the several Petitions and Applications made by this House to our most Gracious Sovereign during the present and former Sessions of the General-Assembly.

Thirdly. You will lay before his Majesty or his Ministers the several Proceedings of this House during the present Session with the Ground and Motives on which they were adopted.

Fourthly. You will endeavour to afcertain the Powers of the Naval-Officer, the Extent of his Commission, and procure specific Instruction to him for the direction of his Conduct.

Fifthly. You are particularly to attend to, and endeavour to obtain the several Matters recommended to the Agent of this Province by the present Speaker of the House in his Letter to him of the 4th May, 1789. A Copy of which will be delivered to you.

Sixthly. You are to take Copies of the Petition to his Majesty respecting the Justices of his Majesty's Supreme Court, the Articles of Impeachment against them, together with the Evidence taken by this House on that Subject, and endeavour to obtain the Adoption of such Measures as will bring the Parties accused to Justice; and in Case you find it necessary, you will faithfully state to his Majesty's Ministers

Instructions to Members deputed to act in behalf of the House in Great-

Britain, presented.

Ministers the whole Proceedings of this House on the subject from the Year 1787 to the present Session.

Seventhly. You are to correspond with the Speaker of this House, and from Time to Time give him such Information on the several Matters committed to your Charge as to you may appear material to be communicated for the Interest of this Province.

Lastly. Having full Confidence in your Disposition to promote the general Good of the Province, we rely on your Attention to every Circumstance, which may come within your Knowledge during the Continuance of this Trust, which may conduce to benefit the Province. And we do particularly enjoin you in all your Applications to his Majesty or his Ministers fully to express the sincere and steady Loyalty and Assection of his Majesty's faithful Subjects in Nova-Scotia, and that you by no Means urge any Measures, which do not fully meet the Approbation of his Majesty's Ministers.

A Message was received from his Majesty's Council with the Appropriation Bill sent down with Amendments, which were read, and thereupon

Resolved, That the Council have no right to amend or alter a Money Bill, and that said Bill so amended by them be thrown under the Table.

Major Barclay, moved for leave to bring in a new Bill for appropriating the Revenue, which the House agreed to.

Major Barclay pursuant to leave brought in a Bill, intitled, an Att for applying certain Monies therein mentioned for the Services of the Year 1790, and for appropriating such Parts of the Supplies granted in this Seffice of the General Assembly as are not already appropriated by the Laws of the Province, and also in Addition to, and Amendment of that part of an Ass passed in the Twenty ninth Year of his present Majesty's Reign for funding the Province Debt, which was read and passed.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to his Majely's Council, and defire their Concurrence to the same.

A Message was received from his Majesty's Council with the above Bill scut down with Amendments, and thereupon

Ordered, That Mr. Wallace, Mr. Beliber, and Mr. Dight, be a Committee to confer with the Council upon the same, and that the Council be informed thereof.

A Message was received from his Majesty's Council, informing the House they had appointed a Committee of Conference, and that they were ready to meet the Committee of the House immediately.

Ordered, That the Committee do attend accordingly.

Mr. Wallace, reported from the Committee, and stated the Substance of the Conference with the Committee of the Council, and thereupon

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry back the Bill to the Council, and inform them, the House adhere to the same as sent up for Concurrence, and therefore request the Council would either agree or disagree to the Bill in the usual Form.

A Message was received from his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, commanding the Attendance of the House in the Council-Chamber.

- A Bill, intitled, an Act in Amendment of an Act, intitled, an Aa relating to Wills, Legacies and Executors, and for the Settlement and Distribution of Estates of Intestates, and to enable Executors and Administrators the more speedily to settle the Estate of the Deceased.
- A Bill, intitled, an Act to amend an Act, intitled, an Act for appointing Firewards and ascertaining their Duty, and for punishing Thests and Disorders at the Time of Fire, also in Amendment of the several Acts made in Amendment or Addition to said recited Act, and to extend the several Provisions therein contained to the Town of Shelburne.
- A Bill, intitled, an Act to authorise certain Commissioners to dispose of the Building wherein the General-Assembly now sits, and also to adjust the Debt due from the Province to the Public School at Halifax.
