Address to be Presented at Grand Trunk Depot.



[By Special Wire to The Courier] NEW YORK, May o-For a second time, Charles Becker, former lieutenant of police, charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, for which four men already have paid the death penalty, to-day heard the state's story of the plot to have Rosenthal, gambler, assassinated and listened to his own name hurled at the jury as the

instigator of that plot. General District Attorney Charles Whitman deviated but little from the opening statement of the people's case in the first trial of Becker. He told of the breaking of the alleged gambling combination between Rosenthal and Becker, who as head of the strong arm squad of the police department, had charge of the gambing raids. He charged that Becker suddenly desired to be rid of his former associate and to that end retained hrough others gunmen to murder the gambler on the eve of his expected visit to the district attorney when it was reported he planned to expose the

head of the strong arm squad. The jury that is to decide on the fate of Becker was filed late vesterday afternoon, but Justice Seobury ordered that the twenty on the panel of talesmen at adjournment should return today. This order was to provide for a vacancy in the jury should

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

A family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within in emiles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupled by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.60 per acre. 



Only half of this pattern is given, so it must be duplicated to make the whole article. The scallops are padded and closely buttonholed. The flowers and leaves are worked solid, with the dots as eyelets and the stems in the outline stitch. The ribbon is closely buttonholed along the edge, with the purling brought to the inside. The crossbars are formed of strands of the cotton stretched from side to side and buttonholed across without catching the material, which is cut away underneath. The neck may be buttonholed or sewed into a band. Use mercerized

This motif makes a dainty decoration for a scarf end. The ribbon and leaves are worked solid. The small s are done as eyelets and the basket, flowers and stems are done in the outline stitch. Use colored mercerical otton No. 20 for ribbon, leaves, eyelets and stems, and No. 12 for basket and roses.
