Acadia Men From Kings Co. Who Have Enlisted For the Empire.

(From Acadia Bulletin)

Rev. John Howard McDonald, B. A., 1891, Acadia, D. D. 1911. St. John, N. B. Enlisted at St. John on Nov. 23, 1914, and was appointed chaplain of the Divisional Ammunition Column. He sailed from Canada on June 18, 1915, and spent three months at Otterpoole, England. He was transferred as chaplain to the 5th Field Ambulance, 2nd Canadian Division on September 14, 1915. His present rank is captain and he is serving "somewhere in Belgium." His only son is a lieutenant at the front.

Henry Joseph Starrat, B. A., Acadia 1893, Paradise, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax in October, 1914, in the 2nd Divisional Cycle Corps, with the rank of captain. He recruited the corps to full strength and sailed from Halifax on June 15, 1915. He is now in active service "somewhere in Belgium."

Norval Henry Parsons, Acadia, October, 1889—June 1890, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax on September 21, 1915, in the 85th Battalion Nova Scotia Highlanders. He is second in command of the battalion with the rank of lieutenant-colonel, and is in Halifax with his battalion. For seven years Colonel Parsons commanded the 14th Kings Canadian Hussars (Canada Militia) and since the war broke out has been a recruiting officer. His two sons have also enlisted.

Rev. Omer Edwin Steeves, Acadia, October 1891—June 1893, Nictaux, N. S. Enlisted at Middleton in October, 1915, in the Medical Corps of the 85th Battalion Nova Scotia Highlanders, C. E. F. Rejected. Unable to pass physical examination.

Stanley Livingstone Jones, B. A., Acadia, 1897, Calgary, Alberta. Enlisted at Calgary in October 1914, as lieutenant in the Princess Patricia C. L. I., his service in the South African War 1899-1901 fitting him well for this rank. He sailed from Canada in November, 1914. He was promoted from lieutenant to captain. He has been twice wounded. His first

wound was received in the hand while sniping a sniper. He was treated in Woolwich hospital, convalescing in Scotland. He joined his regiment and fought at Ypres and Langemarck. In the latter engagement he was wounded in the foot and taken to a hospital in the English Lake district. He is again in active service "somewhere in France."

Fred William Wickwire, Acadia October 1894—June 1895, Kentville N. S. Enlisted at Halifax in October 1914, as captain No. 5 Company Canadian Army Service Corps, 2nd Divisional Train. He sailed from St. John in April 1915, and spent five months at Shorncliffe, England. He took part in the taking of Loos in September, 1915, and is now in service "somewhere in France." Captain Wickwire was officer commanding No. 8 Company C. A. S. C. (Militia) from which he was transferred to the 2nd C. A. S. C., C. E. F. His efficiency and popularity with his men have been referred to in press.

Barry Wentworth Roscoe, B. A., Acadia 1902, L.L.B. Dalhousie, 1904, Kentville, N. S. He was actively associated with the militia being a captain in the 14th Kings Canadian Hussars. He enlisted at Kentville in February, 1915, as captain adjutant in the 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles. He trained at Amherst and sailed from Canada on July 17, 1915. He spent three months in England during which he took additional military courses and sailed for France, October 20, 1915, where he is now in active service.

Rev. Chas. Knowlton Morse, B. A., Acadia, 1903, Winnipeg, Manitoba, Enlisted at Winnipeg on August 12, 1915, as a private in Company C, 61st Battalion, C. E. F., and trained at Seewell Camp from Aug. 23 to November 5. Now training in Winnipeg.

Allison H. Borden, Acadia October 1900—June 1901, Enlisted October 24, 1904, at Stanley Barracks, in the Royal Canadian Regiment, Toronto. He spent one year at the Staff

College, Camberley, England in 1913. He is at present commanding the 85th Battalion, Nova Scotia Highlanders, C. E. F., now training at Halifax. His present rank is lieutenant colonel.

Joseph Willis Margeson, M. L. A., Acadia October 1904—June 1905, Bridgewater, N. S. Enlisted at Bridgewater, December 9, 1914, as paymaster and assistant adjutant of the 25th Battalion, 2nd Division, C. E. F. He sailed from Canada on May 21, 1915, and spent four months at Sandling Camp, Hythe, England. He went to France about the first of October and is now home on duty. His present rank is captain.

Arthur Hunt Chute, B. A., Acadia, 1910, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Val Cartier, August 20, 1914, in No. 1 Casualty Clearing Station, and sailed with the First Contingent, C. E. F., October 1, 1914. He went to Salisbury Plains, where he remained until February 3, 1915, and then crossed to France. He is now paymaster of his unit with the rank of captain and is serving "some-

where in France." He has recently been transferred to the artillery.

Arthur Cyril March, B. A., Acadia 1910, Berwick, N. S. Enlisted in Montreal in October 19, 1914, as a private in the 2nd Universities Company Reinforcements for Princess Patricia C. L. I., and sailed from Canada on June 29, 1915. After a few days at Shorncliffe he sailed for France on July 17th, 1915. He has since been in active service "somewhere in France." He met a "slight accident" on October 20, 1915, but is again in the trenches.

Leon Archibald, Acadia October 1906—June 1908, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted on August 10, 1914, at Regina, Sask. as a scout in the Corps of Guides. He sailed from Canada on October 4, 1914, and spent five months at Salisbury Plains, England. In February he became a Battalion Scout and on November 4, 1915, received the appointment of lieutenant in the Royal Highlanders 63rd Field Co. He was in the Ypres, engagement of April 22-24, and was wounded. He was a patient

at the 2nd Canadian General Hospital at La Trepout, until October 6, and since that time has been engaged in light hospital duty at the same hospital. He will now go with his regiment to the front.

Joseph Ernest Barss, B. A., Acadia 1912, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted May 1, 1915, at Montreal as a private in the 2nd Universities Co. Reinforcements for Princess Patricia C. L. I. and sailed from Canada on June 29, 1915. He remained at Shorncliffe for about six weeks when he was transferred to France. On June 28 he was promoted to Lance Corporal, and on July 12, to Sergeant. He was offered a commission in the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, which would entail a six months' stay in England. He concluded to remain with his regiment and he is now engaged in trench fighting "somewhere in France."

Ralph Wilfred Donaldson, B. A., Acadia 1912, Church Street, N. S. Enlisted in April 1915, as a private in the 1st Universities Co. Reinforcements for Princess Patricia C. L. I. and sailed (Continued on Page Three)

from Canada on June 9, 1915. After spending four weeks at Shorncliffe he was transferred to France. He went into the trenches August 2, and to the front line of trenches on September 24, where he now is "somewhere in France."

Henry Hoyt Pineo, B. A., Acadia 1912, L.L.B., Dalhousie 1914. Waterville, N. S. Enlisted at Amherst in February 1915 as first lieutenant of the 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles. He sailed from Canada on July 16, 1915, and spent three months at Shorncliffe, England. He took a staff course at Napier Barracks, leading his class of 47 men, which gave him a first class field officer's certificate, qualifying him for the rank of major. In the final inspection of troops before leaving for France he was congratulated before the regiment by Col. Shaw, on having the finest troop in the regiment. Now on duty "somewhere in France."

Harvey Todd Reid, B. A., Acadia 1912, Rhodes scholar, Trinity college, Oxford, England. Shortly after entering Oxford he joined the King Edward Horse and trained two weeks in July 1915. He was training in July 1914, when he was called back to London. In December, 1914 he joined Kitchener's Army as second lieutenant in the Royal Field Artillery, training at Aldershot. In February and March, 1915, he took an officer's course at Shoeburyness, England, and on May 1, sailed for France. He was promoted to 1st lieutenant. He has been on active service since May 8, and his division took part in the September drive. A particularly interesting and vivid description of this drive from his pen appeared in the Maritime papers.

William Charles Archibald, B. A. Acadia 1913, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted April, 1914, at Montreal as a member of A. M. Y. Medical Corps, C. E. F., organized by McGill University. Sailed from Canada on May 6, and spent one month at Shorncliffe, England. He is now assistant surgeon in Field Hospital in France.

Frank Foster Chute, B. A. Acadia 1913, Berwick, N. S. A teacher at Acadia Collegiate Academy, he enlisted in No. 1 Overseas Stationary Hospital, C. E. F. Now in training in Halifax.

Henry Cyril D'Almaine, Acadia October 1910—June 1913, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Wolfville November 1, 1914, as a member of the 2nd Divisional Cycle Corps and sailed from Canada on June 15, 1915. He spent three months at Shorncliffe and was then transferred to Belgium where he is now in active service. Before leaving he was promoted to senior corporal of the battalion.

Frank Chapman Higgins, B. A. Acadia 1914, Wolfville, N. S. He trained at Toronto and later at Halifax, taking lieutenant's, captain's, machine gun, and field officer's courses. Enlisted at Montreal on September 25, 1915, as lieutenant in the 4th Universities Company, reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. and sailed from Halifax on November 27, 1915.

Charles Preston Hilsley, Acadia, October 1910—June 1915, Berwick, N. S. Enlisted at Ottawa on March 28, 1915, as a sapper in the 6th Field Co. Canadian Engineers, 2nd contingent, and sailed from Halifax on April 18, 1915. Remained at Shorncliffe May 1 to September 16, and was "somewhere in France" only two weeks when he experienced an acute attack of appendicitis. He remained in a base hospital until attack subsided, then was taken to Cambridge hospital, Aldershot, and operated upon October 5. Now in Edinburgh on sick leave.

Eric Whidden McDonald, Acadia October 1910—June 1911, St. John, N. B. Enlisted on August 5, 1914, in the 12th Battalion, 4th Brigade C. E. F. as

lieutenant and sailed from Canada in October, 1914. He spent eight months at Salisbury Plains and has since been in active service as reconnaissance officer in his battalion, concerning which he has received commendation. In June, 1915, he was transferred to the 10th Battalion, 2nd Brigade. He has been in a number of local engagements and under heavy fire but he has not been wounded. In September 1915, he was injured while on duty and is still in the hospital. His father, Captain J. H. McDonald, '91, is also at the front.

William Elliott Mellor, Acadia, October 1910—June 1912, Kentville, N. S. Enlisted at Strassford, Ont., on August 8, 1914, as a sapper in the Canadian Engineers and sailed with the first contingent C. E. F. in October, 1914. He trained at Salisbury Plains sailing for France in February, 1915, where he has been in constant service since in the trenches. He was slightly wounded but not incapacitated.

William Mather Young, Acadia, January 1911—June 1912, Kentville, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax in May, 1915, as a private in the 2nd Divisional Cycle Corps, and sailed from Canada in June, 1915. He spent eleven weeks at Shorncliffe, England, after which he was transferred to Belgium, where he now is in active service.

Paul Roy Tingley, Acadia, October 1912—November 1915, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax in November 1915, as private in No. 7 "Overseas" Stationary Hospital. Now training in Halifax.

Carl Douglas Woodman, Acadia, October 1913—June 1915, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Wolfville, October 3, 1915, as a private in 8th Battalion Nova Scotia Highlanders. Now training at Halifax.

John Inglis Mosher, Acadia, October 1914, Aylesford, Nova Scotia. Enlisted at Wolfville Oct. 19, 1915, as a private in the 4th Universities Company Reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. Trained at Montreal and sailed from Canada November 27, 1915.

Randolph Winston Churchill, Hantsport, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax in October 1914 as a lieutenant in the Canadian Garrison Artillery. After serving one year he was transferred to the 6th Battalion C. E. F., as signalling officer. He was promoted to captain and is now second in command of his company in the 112th Battalion. Now stationed at Shelburne as recruiting officer and commanding the Shelburne detachment of the 112th.

Roland Chesley Cox, Kingsport, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax in February 1915 as a private in the Cycle Corps and trained at Halifax. Sailed from Canada January 13, 1915, and spent three months at Shorncliffe. He was then transferred to Belgium. He has been wounded twice.

Eric C. D'Almaine, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Wolfville on February 1, 1915, as a private in the Cycle Corps and trained at Halifax. Sailed from Canada June 15, 1915, and spent three months at Shorncliffe, where he was transferred to Belgium and is now there in active service.

William Elderkin, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Saskatoon on July 28, 1915, as a private in 3rd Universities Company Reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. and sailed from Canada on September 3, 1915. He trained at Shorncliffe, England.

Ralph Arthur Harris, B. A., 1915, Sheffield Mills, N. S. Enlisted at Sussex, September 29, 1915, as Field Secretary of Battalion Y. M. C. A. of the 64th Battalion. On November 2nd, was transferred to Halifax with his battalion. Transferred to Truro, N. S., Jan. 1916, with the 106th Battalion.

Eldon Rainsford Lovely Henshaw, Acadia, October 1911—June 1914, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at St. John in November 1914, as a private in the 26th Battalion, C. E. F. and trained in St. John. Sailed from St. John on June 13, 1915,

and trained further at Sandling Camp, Hythe, England. In September 1915, he was injured in a motor accident, but was discharged from the hospital although not yet ready to go to the front.

Roy Joseph Millett, Acadia, October 1911—February 1, 1912, Gaspareau, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax, November 4, 1915, as a private in No. 7 Overseas Stationary Hospital, C. E. F., now training at Halifax.

Alfred Douglas Borden, Acadia, October 1912—November 1915, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax on October 27, 1915, as a private in the 85th Battalion Nova Scotia Highlanders, now training at Halifax. Promoted in November 1915.

William Henry Chase, Acadia, October 1912—November 1915, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Halifax on November 9, 1915, as a private in No. 7 "Overseas" Stationary Hospital, now training at Halifax.

Hugh Allison Crawley, Acadia, October 1912—June 1914, Wolfville, N. S. Trained at Toronto and later at Halifax, taking lieutenant's, captain's and machine gun courses and volunteered for overseas service. Was given a commission in the 85th Battalion, C. E. F., as lieutenant. Now training at Halifax.

Henry Burton De Wolfe, Acadia, October 1912—October 1915, Wolfville, N. S. Took the "lieutenant's" and machine gun courses at Halifax. Enlisted at Wolfville on October 19, 1915, as a private in the 4th Universities Company Reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. Trained at Montreal and sailed from Halifax, November 27, 1915. Promoted to lance-corporal in November, 1915.

Graham Ross Parsons, Acadia, October 1912—June 1914, Wolfville, N. S. He was lieutenant in 14th Kings Canadian Hussars (militia) took lieutenant's, captain's and machine gun courses. Enlisted at Halifax, October 1, 1915, in the 85th Nova Scotia Highlanders as lieutenant. Now training at Halifax.

Harold Fletcher Bishop, Acadia, October 1913—June 1915, Auburn, N. S. Took lieutenant's course and enlisted at Halifax on October 11, 1915, as a private in the 4th Universities Company Reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. Trained at Montreal and sailed from Canada November 27, 1915.

Donald Bedford Chase, Acadia, October 1913—June 1915, Port Williams, N. S. Enlisted at Wolfville on September 23, 1915, as a private in the 4th Universities Company Reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. Trained at Montreal and sailed from Canada November 27, 1915. Promoted to lance-corporal.

Everett Clare Cox, Acadia, October 1913—June 1914, Middleton, N. S. Enlisted at Middleton on August 30, 1915, as a private in the 64th Battalion C. E. F. Trained at Sussex, now training at Halifax.

Leonard Eaton, Acadia, October 1913—February 1914, Wolfville. Enlisted at Kentville in February 1915, as a private in the 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles. Trained at Amherst. Sailed from Canada July 17, 1915. Spent three months at Shorncliffe and sailed for France October 22, 1915, where he is now in active service. Promoted to corporal in April and to sergeant in May.

Charles William Fitch, Acadia, October 1912—October 1915, Virren, Man. Enlisted at Wolfville on October 19, 1915, as private in the 4th Universities Company Reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. Trained at Montreal and sailed from Canada on November 27, 1915.

Edward Durlin Fletcher, Acadia, October 1913—June 1914, St. John, N. B. Enlisted at St. John on August 8, 1914, as private in No. 1 Field Ambulance and sailed from Canada September 25, 1914. Trained at Salisbury Plains until March 1915, when he went

to France, where he has since been in active service. At the battle of Ypres in April 2,000 wounded were handled by him.

Harold Temple Johnson, Acadia, October 1913—June 1915, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Wolfville on September 30, 1915, as a private in the 4th Universities Company Reinforcements Princess Patricia C. L. I. Rejected on account of inability to pass physical examination.

Clarke Kenneth McLeod, Acadia, October 1913—June 1914, Wolfville, N. S. Enlisted at Moncton, in September, 1914, as private in No. 1 Clearing Casualty Hospital. Sailed from Canada September 29, 1914, and trained in England at Salisbury Plains, Cliveden and Toplow. Sailed for France in February, 1915, where he has since been in active service, promoted to lance corporal January 1915.

Isalah Wallace, Annapolis, N. S. Enlisted at St. John in October 1914, as a private in the Army Service Corps. Trained in St. John and sailed from Canada on June 13, 1915. Spent six months at Shorncliffe after which he was transferred to France, where he is now serving as an orderly.

George Young, Kentville, N. S. Enlisted in Winnipeg as a private in the 90th Battalion, but was transferred to the 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles as sergeant. Trained at Amherst and sailed from Canada on May 20, 1915. He spent four months at East Sandling after which he was transferred to Belgium, where he now is in active service. On May 19th he became a lieutenant in the 25th Battalion C. E. F.

To Keep Our Men in the Trenches Warm.

Halifax, January 4—The public generally will be interested to know that the Field Comforts Committee forwarded from the Red Cross warehouse, Pier No. 2, over 1,150 pairs of socks, together with several hundred mufflers and wristlets, to the men of the Twenty-Fifth Battalion, the "comforts" being accomplished by a letter to Major Stanley Bauld, requesting him to distribute them wherever most needed. The supplies were sent in care of the War Contingent Association. The committee also sent a large box of socks, mufflers, and wristlets, to the Sixth Mounted Rifles, these to be distributed to the various Nova Scotia regiments as they are received.

Amsterdam, Jan. 3—Russian warships have sunk two German submarines off the Bulgarian Black Sea port of Varna, according to reports reaching here today.

Asquith Keeps Faith

London, Jan. 5—The British government today definitely embarked upon the policy of compulsory service, when Premier Asquith submitted to the house of commons a bill drafting eligible unmarried men to military duty, and championed the measure in a stirring speech on the necessity of this step to meet the growing exigencies of the war.

The scene within the house of commons was one of the most notable in the history of that body, with the benches packed with members, all the ministerial seats occupied, and the galleries overflowing.

With the prospect of a keen duel between the prime minister and his former colleague, Sir John A. Simon, over the momentous issue which caused the late home secretary's resignation, the biggest assemblage of commons since the outbreak of the war faced Mr. Asquith when he introduced his Military Service Bill. Virtually the only absentees were those who were barred from attending by the military necessities. These to a man, favor compulsion.

There was a feeling of intense interest and anxiety over the culmination of the controversy, which has shaken the country as no other event since the war began.

Flocked to Colors At Lord Derby's Call.

London, Jan. 4—Lord Derby's recruiting figures for the period between October 23rd and December 15th, shows that 1,150,000 unmarried men and 1,679,263 married men presented themselves for service.

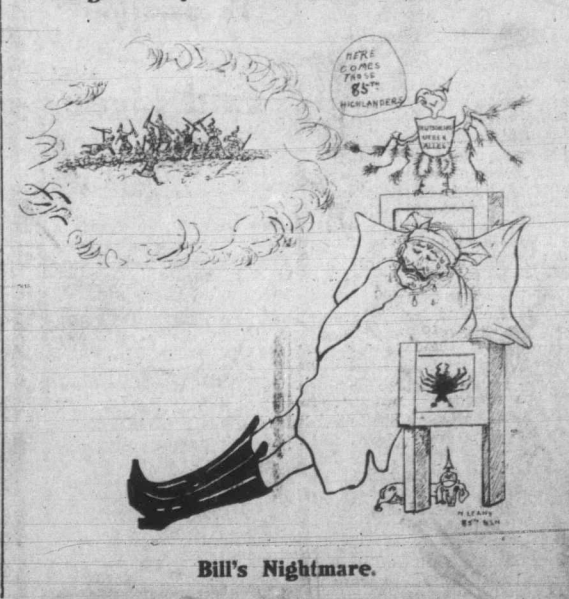
Of the grand total 2,829,268 married and single men, 103,000 unmarried and 112,431 married men enlisted immediately. Eight hundred and forty thousand single men and 1,344,979 married men registered. Of the single men 207,000 were rejected while 221,852 married men were not accepted by the recruiting officers.

Austria Decides Not to Break With the United States.

London, Dec. 31, 4 a. m.—The Austrian reply to the second American note on the Ancona states that the commander of the Austrian submarine has been punished for not sufficiently taking account of the panic aboard the Ancona, which rendered disembarkation more difficult.

London, Jan. 2—The Russians have captured the heights northeast of Czernowitz, Bukovina, according to a dispatch to Reuter's Telegram Company, from Petrograd. Eight hundred and seventy prisoners fell into the hands of the Russians.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

Acsettler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months out of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The acre of cultivation in subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or rocky land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Kaiser William Suffering With Cancer in Throat.

Paris, Jan. 4.—The Matin affirms, notwithstanding denials, that the German Emperor is suffering from cancer of the throat, and is no longer able to speak.

"In February, 1911," according to the Matin, "the Doctors were considering whether it was necessary to remove the entire larynx in order to stay the progress of the disease. That raised the question as to whether the emperor would be able to speak if such an operation were performed. The leading specialists of every capital in Europe were consulted. It was learned that an eminent surgeon of Paris had with an artificial larynx and a breathing tube opening into the trachea, restored the power of speech to cancerous patients who had undergone total ablation of the affected organs.

"This doctor, whose name the Matin withholds, for reasons of professional etiquette, was asked to go to Berlin by the German ambassador. He was offered 100,000 francs and all expenses, and was requested to bring with him a patient who had been fitted with the apparatus, so that the emperor himself might see if he was able to speak.

"Meanwhile, as a result of a minor operation with a bistoury and a few weeks absolute rest, the emperor's condition improved, as is often the case in this disease, the progress of which is ineluctable, but slow. It is another operation of this kind which has just been performed, but is it only palliative. The German emperor must either make his mind to complete removal of the larynx, or be stifled by the growth.

"This explains why the emperor went neither to Warsaw, Constantinople nor Brussels.
