THE GHETTO NOVELIST.

Israel Zangwill, Who Has Given Us Fine Stories Concerning Life Among the Jews.

Israel Zangwill, the novelist and journalist, was passenger on the Looanah, which sailed from New York about the beginning of the second half of August.

Israel Zangwill, who is now 85 years old, was born in one of the poorest hovels of a Ghetto. All of his childhood was passed in the narrow lanes of the Ghetto, which he has since obtained his education as a boy at the Jews' free school in the east end of London, and spent three years of his life as a teacher in that locality.

Mrs. Williams, cor. sec., reported one hundred auxiliaries in the eastern part with a membership of 2,068. Miss Percival gave an interesting report on systematic giving and a lively discussion followed.
