Legal Decisions.

1. Any person who takes a paper regularly from the Post Office—whether directed to his name or another or whether he has subscribed or not—is responsible for the payment.
2. If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay up all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken from the office or not.
3. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the Post Office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for a prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

Alice G. Blackadder, M. D.

It affords us much gratification this week to chronicle the fact that Miss Alice G. Blackadder, of Wolfville, was the recipient of the degree of M. D. from the N. Y. Eclectic Medical College, a few days ago.

Dr Blackadder is well known in our town, and her success will be heard of with much pleasure by her many friends here. Since her residence in New York she has had quite an hospital experience, taking the full course in one of the largest hospitals there to qualify herself as a nurse; and after acting in this capacity for some time she resolved to go a step higher and become an M. D. The graduating exercises of her college took place in Chickering Hall, Fifth Avenue, and the building was packed with friends of the college and of those who were graduating. Our Wolfville lady took third place among the graduates and received on Commencement Day many beautiful bouquets--roses, lilies, etc., from her admiring friends.

Dr Blackadder intends to open an office in New York, but before doing so she will take more or less of a post-graduate course, part of which will be spent in Germany. She has made many friends in New York; her duties as a private nurse bringing her in contact with leading physicians, etc., every day. We expect to hear that Dr B. will meet with much success as she has all the requirements necessary for a brilliant professional career.

An Acadia Student's Success. The fashionable Warren Avenue church, the leading Baptist society in Boston, has extended a unanimous call to Rev. Robert Macdonald of Methuen, to become its pastor. The call was received by Mr Macdonald yesterday. The amount of salary is not stated, but as the church once extended an invitation to Dr Lorimer of Chicago at a salary of \$10,000, the financial consideration will not be small.

The Warren Avenue Baptist church is a noted Boston Society, and has a membership of over 700, comprising many of the leading families of Boston. Rev. O. P. Gifford was a former pastor, but since his resignation the pulpit of the church has had no regular occupant.

He is an earnest preacher, clear and forcible. Many of his sermons on practical questions have been published in the Lawrence and Methuen papers, and attracted wide reading for their intelligent expression and application. Mr Macdonald was recently married to a Methuen lady, and he enjoys the esteem of every resident of the town, irrespective of religious affiliation, for the good work he has been instrumental in performing in their midst.

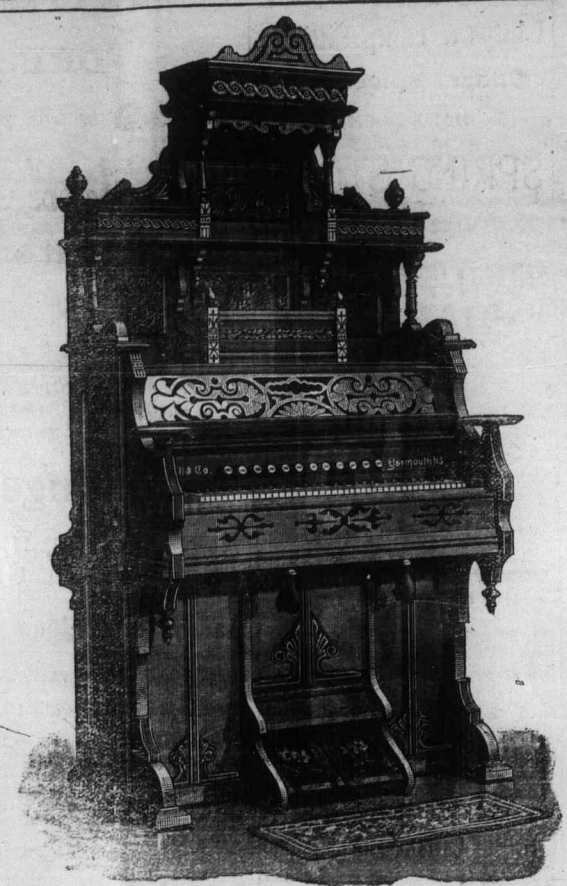
