
"I think it's mean of you to talk like that, father," said Esther, her eyes flashing. "It's mean of you, and unkind to my poor mother, who was a lady born."

Besides his patriotic poems, our author has tuned his harp to classic and philosophic themes. Of the former, the principal ones are, "Odisseus," "Adriano," and the one entitled, "Of Pelorus."

"Two mighty arms of thunder-cloven rock Stretched ever westward toward the setting sun, And took into their ancient scarred embraces,

The description here is magnificent and the lines have an elaborate rhythmic movement and great strength and beauty.

The best of his philosophical poems, is, in my mind, the one entitled "The Marvellous Work." In this piece, he accepts the doctrine of Evolution, not by a mechanical force working through a necessity, but by the intelligence and will of an ever-supervising God.

Professor Roberts has written many fine sonnets; but sometimes therein his descriptions of rural life, are so minutely realistic that they forget to be poetical.

The finest poem, in my estimation, which he has written, is the ode called "Ave," in commemoration of Shelley.

Thine own Alister on an endless quest Of unimagined loveliness didst range; Urged ever by the soul's divine unrest, Of that high quest and that unrest divine.

From these specimens of his poetry, we find that Roberts has a clear, direct style, and a forcible one; seldom epigrammatic but never loose or inexact.
