For Good Roads.

At the recent meeting of the Kings County Board of Trade, held at Kentville, called for the purpose of considering the matter of good roads, the following resolution was passed: "Whereas, the welfare of a county depends largely upon its roads, and whereas the population of our county is practically all farmers, and whereas, agricultural operations come in such a time as to interfere with the best time for road making and repairing; therefore, resolved, that this Board favors a direct money road tax and a system of road construction and up keep whereby men are appointed to construct roads and maintain them similar to that adopted by railroads in keeping the road-beds in condition. The policy of the meeting, we understand, was to obtain, as early as possible, a permanent highway through the county from east to west. As the first step an effort will be made to induce the local millers to employ local labor, raise a fund by subscription, ask the government to supplement this and construct some kind of a permanent highway between the two towns, the construction and maintenance of such highway to be under the supervision of the provincial road department.

Recent Deaths.

In the death of Capt. James E. Eagles, which took place on Monday of this week, Wolfville loses one of its oldest and best known citizens. He was 90 years of age and until within the last year was remarkably hale and hearty and in full possession of all his powers. The deceased was a native of Gasperon but for nearly all his life he made Wolfville his home. For many years he followed the sea and was a successful and respected skipper. As a citizen he was held in high esteem and his familiar figure will be much missed. His wife predeceased him a short time ago, and three sons, Capt. J. Clarence, of Oakland, California; E. F., of Dorchester, Mass.; Ernest, of Wolfville; and one daughter, Mrs. Wyman, of Waltham, Mass., survive him. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Mr. England, of the Methodist church, of which the deceased was a valued member, conducting the service. The interment was in Willow Bank.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Angus, this town, has been saddened by the death of their oldest son, Frank, which took place at Amherst on Tuesday of this week. He was a promising young man of 32 years. Some time ago he was taken ill with typhoid fever and was visited by his parents at Amherst where he had been working for some time. It was thought that he was on the way to recovery when the sad news of his death came. The parents and family have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. The remains arrived here on Wednesday evening and the funeral was held yesterday afternoon.

The death of Miss Eisle, daughter of Mr. Owen Nowlin, of Newtonville, took place on Wednesday, after a long illness. She was 22 years of age and was a very bright and attractive young lady. She took high rank in the school of her native village and, having finished the Normal School course, had taught successfully for some time in Hants county, when she suffered a nervous breakdown from which she never recovered. Her father and other members of the family have much sympathy in their bereavement.

On Monday evening there passed peacefully away at his home in Lakeville of one of the best known residents of Kings county, Dr. J. N. Pith. He was a physician of no mean qualifications, and served faithfully a large practice in the valley and in sections of the North Mountain until compelled by loss of sight some ten years ago and give up active work.

News has been received here of the death of Miss Mary Cramp, at Montreal. Miss Cramp was a daughter of the late Dr. Cramp and during her residence in Wolfville was very popular. She was a lady very highly esteemed. Miss Cramp was a niece of Mrs. (Rev.) M. F. Freeman, of Wolfville.

Just as we go to press the news comes to us of the death on Wednesday at her home at Lawrence town of Mrs. (Rev.) Leah Wallace. The remains will be brought to Wolfville by Saturday afternoon's express and the interment take place on arrival.

Why Canada Should Mill Her Own Wheat.

A despatch from Ottawa last week reported that a delegation of the great milling companies of Canada had been to see the Minister of Trade and Commerce regarding the discrimination which at present exists between the ocean freights on wheat and the ocean freights on flour exported from Canada. We doubt very much whether any question under discussion at Ottawa in the last two weeks is of more importance to the Maritime people than this one. Our readers may recall that some time since we had an article based on information carefully obtained with regard to 'Maritime Consumption of Feeds.' We showed in that article that the feed bill of our farmers during the Spring months is a very large one indeed and that in some cases it has been known to represent the difference between a profitable year and an unprofitable one to our farmers. When we have a long, backward spring in the Provinces our bill for imported feeds runs high. It is one of the greatest handicaps of the Provinces particularly with regard to farming, that we should have these feeds shipped in which vegetable seems to stand still, while in other parts of Canada, it is progressing. We refer to these facts because they have an indirect connection with our present subject. Being large consumers of feeds we are naturally interested in obtaining them at the lowest possible price, and it seems to us, if, as the millers make out, the transportation companies are discriminating against the manufacturers of flour in Canada, then the injury is not solely confined to the milling industry. If the making of more flour in Canada means a greater supply of bran and middlings, and it certainly does, then the Maritime Provinces should spare no effort to have the present condition corrected. Of course it may happen that even with a larger production in Canada the present price will be maintained, because, since the reduction in the American tariff, it is quite possible that we shall find a big market across the border. But we shall have to take our chances at that. There is one thing sure, though, which is that the more wheat we grind in Canada, the more middlings we have to sell to somebody, whereas, if we send our wheat to England, and it is ground there, there is scarcely one chance in a thousand that we in the Maritime Provinces will ever have an opportunity to buy a pound of the by-products in this market. There is something, too, to be said about the labor employed in the milling industry. The men that are working in the flour mills and barrel factories are just as valuable to the country as any other wage earners we have, and while it is the policy of the country to protect Canadian industries, it seems inconsistent that it should tolerate the condition of affairs described by the Ottawa delegates, if it can do anything to remedy it. We fancy that it might do something so far as the Canadian railways and the subsidized steamship lines are concerned, but how far an interference with them would be effective in removing the discrimination is very hard indeed to say. Our reference to the matter is with the view of urging our readers to endorse the efforts which the Canadian millers have made at Ottawa. Whatever agreements they may have with them on other points there is no doubt whatever that they should be very glad to see them double their output of mill feeds. They will never be able to do this unless there is an increase of the wheat milled in this country.—The Maritime Merchant.
