LUMINOUS PAINT. An Interesting Chemical Compound With Strange Peculiarities. Nearly every one has heard of luminous paint—the sulphide of calcium—but it is probable that comparatively few persons know much about the behavior of this interesting compound.

MINING TAX REVENUE. From the mining tax it is said the revenue of the province last year was between \$20,000 and \$30,000. QUEER PLACE FOR GOLD. Fungoid Growths Have Fondness for the Yellow Metal. Several years ago Dr. Berin, of Goettingen, observed that gold could be removed from solution and suspended by fungoid growth, and has since made further investigation. The gold was held in suspension in distilled water that had been prepared at different times, the gold being reduced from a weak solution of the chloride by means of phosphorus dissolved in ether. A complete precipitation usually takes place.

POWER OF RADIUM. Force of the Substance Described in Vivid Way. Professor Sir William Ramsay, in London the other day, delivered a deeply interesting lecture, illustrated by many beautiful experiments, at a meeting of the Society of Arts, on "Radio-Active Gas." The lecture was necessarily highly technical, but there was one passage in which Sir William gave some forcible illustrations in power of the wonderful substance called radium. Twelve grains of radium, he said, emitted enough heat to evaporate a ton of water every hour. A ton would boil away 200 pounds of water every hour, and would serve as efficient fuel to warm a house, do all the cooking, and afford plenty of hot baths for a large family not only during their own lives, but would continue to perform these useful functions for about twenty generations without failing off.

ment will be gained for the use of intelligent settlers.
Important documents and reports relating to the distribution of electric power under the statute will be laid before you.

At the request of my Ministers, the Honorable Mr. Willoughby, Dr. Clark, Superintendent of the Asylum for the Insane, Toronto, and Dr. Ryan, Superintendent of the Asylum for the Insane at Kingston, proceeded during the recess to investigate modern methods of caring for and treating the insane.

A bill to rearrange the constituencies of the Province, in order, as far as possible, to equalize representation, will be laid before you.

Mr. J. Campbell White, of New York, was the next speaker, and while his subject was the missionary problem, it was totally different in style from Mr. Ellis' address.

WAIT TO HEAR FROM CO.

Board of Works Will Take Up Road Scheme Then.

The Aldermen Seem to Favor Local Improvement.

Manager Hawkins Promises to Install Nernst Lamps.

Until the Street Railway Company submits the proposition announcing the terms under which it will install a new system the Board of Works declined to take action on the suggestion to introduce local improvement or submit a by-law to provide the necessary amount for going into a scheme of good roads improvement on a large scale.

The committee was a unit in agreeing that something had to be done about the roads, and they seemed to favor local improvement. The Mayor expressed himself strongly in favor of this as against submitting a by-law.

The council can go into the local improvement scheme without submitting a by-law to the people. If a large sum of money is to be expended it will be necessary to submit a by-law for the issuing of debentures.
