

Excellent weather has prevailed for harvesting the fall crops. Good progress has been made in gettling these crops under cover. The potato crop is practically all harvested. Reports of rot in the late potatoes have come in from all sections of the province. The percentage of rot given varies from five per cent to as high as seventy-five per cent. Those who dug their crop early seem to have escaped loss from rot. The reduction in the total quantity of potatoes produced in the Province, as a result of tho rot, will be quite considerable.

The Department of Arriculture Clover Seed Huller has been operating for the past two weeks. The seed is turning out well. There will be quite a quantity produced in the province this year. Prospects are that the supply of seed in Canada will be carce and the price high. 




