## A FIRST WORD TO ALL NEW BRUNSWICKERS.

It is exactly what would happen and it is the reason why the welfare of every New Brunswick family, every New Brunswick citizen is bound up in the success of this year's loan. Self interest calls for aid to the utmost limit of our ability in keeping the machinery of prosperity humming. The factory chimneys must be kept smoking. The ocean and lake ports must continue to bustle with activity that the products of Canadian farms and factories may go to foreign lands.

SELF INTEREST should inspire the enthusiasm and hard work which means success.

CONFIDENTLY we look for the support of the New Brunswick people, but thorough organization is the essential of success and thorough organization is possible only through every good citizen taking his full share of the work.

PUBLIC SPIRITED men in every county of the province are now at work perfecting their county organization. Place yourself at their service, help them in their efforts and make New Brunswick's last war effort the greatest of New Brunswick's war successes.

## Victory Loan Meeting In Public Square

A public meeting in the interest of the Victory Loan Campaign which opened yesterday, was held in the Public Square at 3 o'clock p. m. Monday Oct. 27th.

A small assembly of citizens were present who listened attentively to the speeches delivered. The Fire Bell and Whistle were sounded which was the sign for the opening of the big campaign.

Mayor Doyle opened the meeting with a few remarks, and called on Hon. P. J. Veniot minister of Public Works to address the meeting.

The Hon. Mr. Veniot stated that he was pleased to accept the invitation to address a Newcastle audience for the first time but was sorry that the gathering was not larger. He understood that all the men were working during the day and it was a difficult proposition to get a large gathering and he thought that those in charge of the Victory Loan had chosen a bad time of the year for Northern New Brunswick to launch the Campaign.

He reviewed the years during the war, when the citizens of Canada had given themselves, their time and money which had been done generously by everyone. While it was necessary for the citizens of Canada to do this during the war, it was just as necessary now to take the same interest in the Victory Loan which was now being launched. The money was wanted for the demobilization of the armies, the re-establishing of the soldiers again, and also to help carry along the business of Canada.

The British Empire wanted credit from Canada for their exports such as lumber, wheat etc. and Canada must provide the money to finance this undertaking. Belgium and France are also asking for Canadian Exports and we must finance them as well as the British Empire.

Mr. Veniot emphasized the necessity of contributing to the Victory Loan for the business reasons of Canada, and also along the lines of a safe investment for the people. He appealed strongly to the man or woman who could contribute \$50 or \$100 up to \$500, to place their money in the Victory Loan as the common people were the back bone of the country, as was demonstrated by the last Victory Loan. The last Victory Loan provided \$610,000,000. This Loan asks for \$300,000,000, and it is expected that a large amount will be oversubscribed and he hoped New Brunswick would do its share. He asked the farmers to do all they could to help the Loan as it meant protection for them in their products.

He also went into detail regarding the method of taking out a loan on the installment plan. Mr. Veniot announced that the war trophies commission had offered eight or ten large German guns as prizes in the Victory Loan campaign, and that one of these captured cannons had been secured for the Province, and would be donated to the county making the greatest percentage of increase over their objective. He hoped Northumberland County would be the County to win this gun.

He also announced that Rogersville had won its Victory Flag, today at 12 o'clock and he hoped that Northumberland would win theirs. Northumberland won their flag the last time and he felt positive they would do so again. All the money loaned would be spent in Canada and it behooved every citizen to subscribe as much as they could.

Today England owes Canada, and Canada has shown the world that she can finance herself and today holds an honorable position in the world. He was strongly in favor of the Victory Loan and he hoped that every one would do their share to make this campaign a success.

Hon. J. P. Burchill was the next speaker, and he spoke along similar lines as the Hon. Mr. Veniot. Mr. Burchill said there were two outstanding features which he wished to impress upon his hearers viz:—Production and Thrift.

The people of our country should produce as much as they possibly could and in this way would greatly relieve the situation in our country as regards high prices and would enable us to export more of our products. He was inclined to believe that during

war days a great many people had become extravagant and he strongly urged all to save. He stated that there was no better way to save than to purchase a Victory Bond, and by so doing would be helping his country as well as himself and would also be a good lesson in thrift. Mr. Burchill said that if Canada did not float this Victory Loan the United States would and they would be in a much better position than we, as the interest on the bonds would be spent in the United States instead of in Canada. In conclusion he invited everyone to do their utmost in purchasing Victory Bonds and if this was done he had no doubt, but that the Loan would be a success.

Three cheers were given Hon. Mr. Veniot and Hon. Mr. Burchill at the conclusion of their addresses.

## Young Store Thieves Receive Long Terms

The October sitting of the County Court was in session, in the Court House, here, last Tuesday and Wednesday. Judge McLatchey presided. A number of the civil cases which were to come before this sitting were left over until the January term. The criminal charges against John Gallah and Thos. Fallon, who were sent up for trial by Magistrate J. R. Lawlor, for breaking, entering and stealing from the stores of Mrs. S. A. Demers and Mr. John Ferguson were taken up, and the jury returned a verdict of guilty in both cases.

His Worship Judge McLatchey sentenced Gallah, who had a suspended sentence of two years against him to ten years in the Dorchester penitentiary and Fallon was given three years.

The criminal charges against Francis O'Brien and John Hall, who pleaded guilty were taken up in the Police Court last Friday morning before Police Magistrate Lawlor. O'Brien and Hall were each sentenced to one month in the common goal, with a suspended sentence of 2 years in the Dorchester penitentiary for future good conduct.

His Honor in charging the prisoners, emphasized the fact, that if at any time, either of them were brought before him for the most trivial offence they would at once be given the suspended sentence which he was giving them.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon Oct. 18th. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Weaver. The remains were taken to the Baptist cemetery at Lytleton.

2237 British War Medal, 1914—1919

"Wearing of the Riband by troops who, while serving in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces (Siberian) proceeded to Siberia after November 11th, 1919, is authorized.

It is distinctly understood that this authority, and subsequent issue of the Riband (when available) will not be admitted as a claim for the medal if it is ascertained that the individual making the claim is not entitled to it. REFERENCE H.Q.C. 2179"

### Over A Billion Saved By People

The bank statement for August supplies encouraging evidence of the promising manner in which Canada is tackling her problem of economic adjustment. It shows that deposits in savings banks have gone up \$181,921,066 compared with August last year, and this notwithstanding the fact that a considerable portion of the \$600,000,000 raised by the Victory Loan last year represented savings deposits.

The figures for August show a total of \$1,196,622,931 and the depositors in savings banks are thus in the happy position of being able to subscribe the \$300,000,000 asked for during the present Victory Loan campaign almost four times over.

With such gratifying evidence of prosperity as these figures furnish the success of the new and final Victory Loan should be outstanding.

### Business Grows Across Country

Indicating the growth of business in all parts of Canada, September bank clearings this year show an increase of 39.9 per cent. over September of last year. The total of September this year was \$1,361,897,712, with an increase of \$383,974,272.

Bank clearings are considered a good index of general conditions, for they may be taken as representing turnover in trade.

Winnipeg, in September, showed an increase of 92 per cent. Toronto, 37 per cent., Montreal 28 per cent., Windsor 124 per cent. Léthbridge, which is in a district suffering from a local drought was the only city to make an unfavorable showing.

The considerable increase in clearings is considered a very good token of success for the Victory Loan. Such a noteworthy improvement in business is worth maintaining, and a bumper Victory Loan would accomplish that end.

### Seed Grain Distribution

The annual free distribution of samples of seed grain is being conducted at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, by the Dominion Cerealist.

The following kinds of seed grain will be sent out this season:—

Spring Wheat (in about 5 lb. samples), White Oats (about 4 lb.), Barley (about 5 lb.), field peas (not garden peas) (about 5 lb.), field beans early ripening, only for districts where the season is short (about 2 lb.), flax for seed (about 2 lb.), and flax for fibre (about 2 lb.).

Only one sample can be sent to each applicant.

Applications must be on printed forms which may be obtained from the Dominion Cerealist at any time after Sept. 1st.

As the stock of seed is limited, farmers are advised to apply early to avoid disappointment. No applications forms will be furnished after Feb. 1st, 1920.

### Harvesting Roots for Seed Growing

The last few years' experience has taught us that field root seed raised in Canada compares very favourably with imported root seed and under the circumstances it would be to the interest of farming, were more root seed produced in Canada than there is at present.

It should be clearly understood, though, that the value of root seed produced in this country depends to a very great extent on the quality of roots from which the seed is to be raised. The roots set aside for seed production should represent a uniform type, that is to say they should be of the same general shape and of the same colour. If they are of mixed types, as far as shape and colour are concerned, they are liable to produce a class of seed which, when sown, will in turn give rise to a crop of a mixed, and on that ground inferior, quality. It is therefore of paramount importance that roots which are to be used for seed production be as uniform as possible. They should of course also be perfectly sound and free from diseases.

It is of less importance of what size they are, but, generally, medium-sized roots are to be preferred because, as a rule, they keep better in storage during the winter and therefore are apt to produce healthier and more vigorous seed plants.

The roots which are selected for seed production should be handled very carefully and all bruised roots should be rejected. In the first place, roots that are bruised, or cut, or broken in harvesting, may not during the winter and, in doing so, may cause damage to the sound roots stored with them. And, besides, even should they come through the winter, they will most likely produce weak seed plants, unable to form and ripen seed of best quality. Roots selected for seed production must, therefore, be stored away intact; that is to say, their lower ends and rootlets must not be cut off, as is done when roots are harvested for feed.

Roots that are expected to develop seed bearing stalks after having been stored during the winter must not be topped too closely. Remember that the seed stalks sprout from the crown of the roots. It follows, then, that if the roots are topped so closely that their crowns are cut off or injured, there will be no chance of any seed stalks developing. Consequently, roots selected for seed production must have their crowns perfectly intact. And for this reason it is recommended that all roots selected for seed production be topped well above the crown, say anywhere from half an inch to two inches, so that their ability to develop vigorous seed stalks may not be impaired.

The roots selected should of course be stored in the best manner possible so that losses through rotting during the winter may be avoided. The storage methods are many and vary with the winter conditions. In case there is any doubt as to the best manner of carrying the roots through the winter in a satisfactory condition, the undersigned will be pleased to render advice based upon years of experience.

### Canada Must Rely On own Resources

The necessity of Canada relying upon her own resources in meeting the problems of the period of reconstruction, now that the money markets to which the Dominion has had resort in the past are closed, is emphasized by Sir Robert Borden in a letter he has written to Sir Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance, in connection with the Victory Loan 1919. The Premier gives unqualified endorsement to the new loan.

His letter follows:

Ottawa, Ont.,  
18th September, 1919.

My dear Sir Henry Drayton:—

I hope the people of Canada will fully realize the extreme importance of making the present Victory Loan a complete success.

The necessities of the country involve a very heavy expenditure in demobilization, in the payment of the liberal war gratuity authorized last December, in carrying out the arrangements for the Civil reestablishment of returned soldiers and in providing for settlement upon the land. As Sir Thomas White pointed out in his Budget speech, the present fiscal year, for this season, is a year so far as expenditure is concerned. The exportation of our surplus food products and other staple commodities must be maintained and, pending the return of normal financial conditions, the Government is called upon to establish necessary credits for this purpose.

The money markets of the world to which we have had resort in the past are closed and it is entirely necessary to rely upon our own resources. They are ample for the purpose of providing the country with the amounts necessary to carry on its affairs. The security offered by a Canadian loan is second to none in the world; and every citizen who contributes his quota aids in stabilizing and maintaining the credit of his country.

I send you my best wishes that the loan may be highly successful.

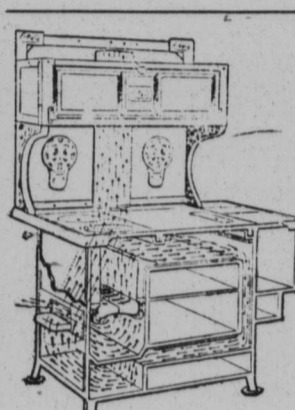

**Latest Type Of Tourist Cars**

One of the Features in Canadian National Railways' Daily Service Toronto-Winnipeg-Vancouver

The Canadian National daily transcontinental train, Toronto-Winnipeg-Vancouver made its initial trip from Toronto, with one of the very latest type of steel tourist cars as part of its equipment, the first of an order of twenty such cars in whose construction every point has been considered for the safety and comfort of passengers. This modern type of tourist car, with antitelescopic device is of similar design to the standard sleeping coach, the exception being they are upholstered in leather instead of plush.

Electrically lighted throughout, all berths, upper and lower, are provided with berth lamps. A new feature for this class of car is that lamps have been installed under the seats in the aisles of the car, so that when the ceiling lamps are turned out for the night light may be provided under berth curtains, a great convenience for passengers when going through the car.

Phosphoric push buttons can be readily seen in the dark, should the passenger require to switch on the light or ring the bell, when the berth is in darkness.

A safety feature introduced is a device for holding down the upper berth which precludes any possibility of the upper berth closing when in use. Separate berth curtains are provided so that passengers in the upper berths will not disturb passengers in the lower.

The kitchen has the latest steel range, facilities for washing dishes, and lockers enable passengers to store their food. Lavatories have received special attention, and provide greater conveniences than the older type. An electric thermostatic heating control can be so adjusted as to regulate the temperature of the car, thus preventing overheating.

Thus with the introduction of the daily service of the Canadian National lines between Toronto-Winnipeg-Vancouver, is the added convenience of the second-class passengers who can enjoy a transcontinental trip in every comfort at minimum expense.

**Licenses Under Prohibition Act**

FREDERICTON, Oct. 23—While all wholesale and retail vendors licenses under the N. B. Prohibition Act will expire on Oct. 31, it will be impossible to have new licenses ready to become effective on Nov. 1, and Rev. W. D. Wilson has gone to St. John to try and reach some conclusion in the situation.

The new licenses will be issued with the regulations governing the vendors and stating the prices at which liquors are to be sold, but these regulations cannot be made effective until approved by the lieutenant governor in council, and the government will not meet before Nov. 4 or 5.

Meanwhile, the chief inspector has sent a circular letter to the present holders of licenses asking them whether they are preparing to accept renewals under the new regulations, which include the fixing of the wholesale profit by an account, placing the retail vendor's profit at 33 1/3 per cent, on cost and allowing retailers to buy from the St. John wholesalers only.

**Many Prizes For School Children**

Every school child in New Brunswick has an interest in the Victory Loan Campaign because every school child has a chance to win one of the many prizes offered for the school essay competition on Why We Should Buy Victory Bonds. Prizes will be given as outlined for the two best essays in each class from each county, and the general prize will go to the best essay of all for the whole province.

The Central Committee, St. John, is sending to each school in the province a supply of three illustrated blotters containing valuable information about the loan. There is a sufficient supply of these to give each scholar two, and so create a home interest in the loan. The central committee is also selecting essay judges. All essays in this competition must be mailed to Miss Helen Sydney Smith, 147 Prince William street, so as to reach her by November 14.

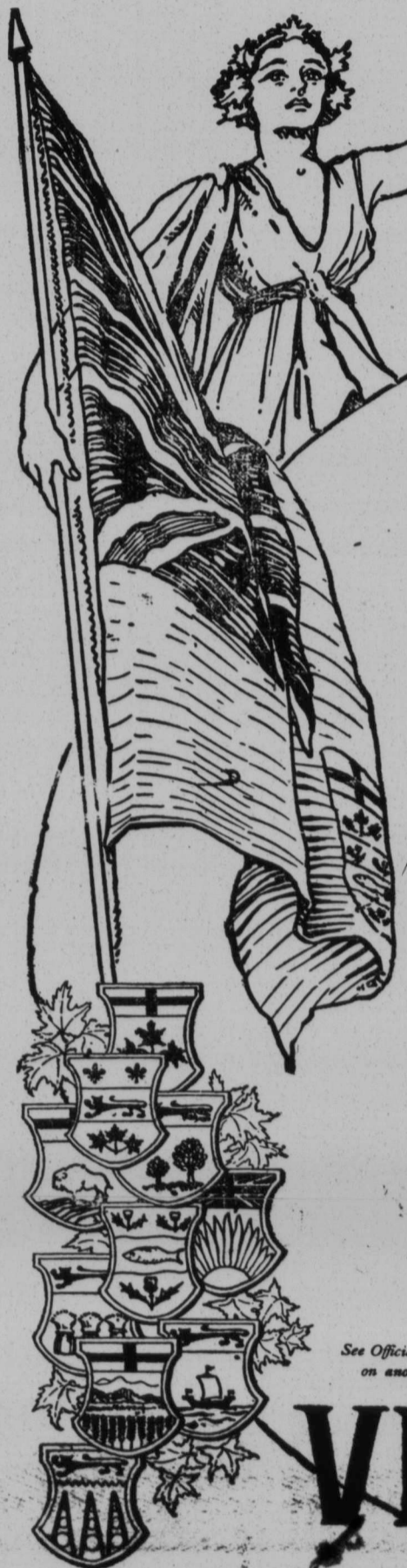

**Lord Beaverbrook Advocates Tax On War Profits**

Lord Beaverbrook contributes an article in the Daily Express advocating strongly a tax on war profits. He writes:

"The Labor Party are in favor of the scheme to a man; their only difficulty is that, while cooler heads would prefer a tax which they feel certain they can get, some of them are more anxious for a capital levy on the whole community—a more uncertain prospect—and some division of purpose is therefore discernible in their minds. And here let me drop a hint to the wise. The motto of the Romans, I am told by Cabinet Ministers, was 'divide and rule.' If the rulers will not have the war profits tax they will get a capital levy."

Lord Beaverbrook's proposal is as follows:

"There should be a valuation of the total increase, if any, in the wealth of an individual between August, 1914 and the present year, and the difference, as being due directly or indirectly to a state of war, should in justice accrue to the Exchequer."

After careful consideration of all the evidence Lord Beaverbrook ventures to predict that the War Profits Tax would produce for the Treasury more than a billion pounds.

**Weekly Agricultural Report**

Excellent weather has prevailed for harvesting the fall crops. Good progress has been made in getting these crops under cover. The potato crop is practically all harvested. Reports of rot in the late potatoes have come in from all sections of the province. The percentage of rot given varies from five per cent to as high as seventy-five per cent. Those who dug their crop early seem to have escaped loss from rot. The reduction in the total quantity of potatoes produced in the Province, as a result of the rot, will be quite considerable.

The Department of Agriculture Clover Seed Huller has been operating for the past two weeks. The seed is turning out well. There will be quite a quantity produced in the province this year. Prospects are that the supply of seed in Canada will be scarce and the price high.

The turnip crop is being harvested and the yield is well up to the average. Dairy cattle are reported in demand and selling at a good price, grade cows bringing from \$75.00 to \$90.00. The demand for young pigs is poor. The high price of feed is the reason given for this.

**BRITISH STEAMER GOES AGROUND AT POINT DU CHENE**  
Moncton, N. B., Oct. 26—The British steamer, The Hornsee, two thousand tons, is aground in Point Du Chene Harbour, and all efforts to get her off today were unavailing. The Hornsee arrived at Point Du Chene yesterday morning from Manchester to take part of a cargo of coals, and then proceeded to Fairbore to finish loading. She ran aground while avoiding a collision with two schooners. The Hornsee is commanded by Captain Munroe and carries a crew of thirty. She is one of the steamers taken over from the Germans by the British government. Efforts to float her tomorrow are not successful; the ballast will be removed. She has five hundred tons of coal in her bunkers. Only the bow is aground and the ship is not thought to have suffered any damage.

### A RECORD THAT IS A PROMISE.

Canada has hardly come yet to consider the period after the war as a distinct and separate problem, capable of visualization apart from present conditions and activities. Lacking the experience of Great Britain or Germany in such matters she is incapable of the nice discriminations that in those countries have resulted in the creation and adjustment of elaborate machinery to fit each possible phase of the economic situation which their respective leaders believe will arise. Nor is she merely blundering into the future, but in her case the things she feels she must do now and the things she feels she may do hereafter are so interwoven and the absorption of her energies is so great that for the most part programs give way to performances and the country grows into economic power before creating the formulas for attaining it. Her hopes for the future are measured by the disproportion between what she has done and what it was thought she was capable of doing less than four years ago. Canada's record is a summary of her promise.

Standing out instructively in this record is the financial achievement of 2,000,000 people, various in nationality, scattered over a territory of nearly 4,000,000 square miles. It is the more noteworthy in view of the effect of the declaration of war by the United States. Before that declaration there was a very restricted market for Dominion Government bonds in Canada and municipals sold better in England and the United States than at home, so that every year Canada paid out not less than \$125,000,000 to British and \$50,000,000 to American investors for interest charges. In the first year of the war a bond issue of even \$50,000,000 would have been regarded as an impossibility except for the existence of surplus funds in this country. With the aid of American investors a loan of \$100,000,000 was actually floated in 1915, and another of similar amount was floated a year later. In March, 1917, before the United States entered the war, and when it still appeared possible she would not do so, a third war loan totalling \$150,000,000 was determined upon. Each of these loans was issued below par and with interest at 5 per cent. Now most financial observers saw that a declaration of war by the United States would mean loans and heavy taxation and undoubted curtailment of the market here for foreign securities. Exactly that happened, and yet in November, 1917, the Canadian people subscribed for \$418,000,000 of the Victory Loan issued at 100. Meanwhile loans totalling more than \$158,000,000 has been made from Great Britain and the United States, and War Savings Certificates to the amount of \$12,000,000 had been disposed of. In other words the patriotic fervor of Canada was equal to an aggravated demand, and without thinking of it in that way her people suddenly discovered themselves financially competent.

That the net debt of the country has increased from \$335,996,850 in March, 1914, to \$1,010,780,470 in March, 1918, is no small matter, but that 75 per cent. of this indebtedness represents the savings of men and women who believe in Canada's ability to pay is, in the case of a country that hesitated at a \$50,000,000 loan at the beginning of the war, an indication of reserve strength that overshadows every liability.

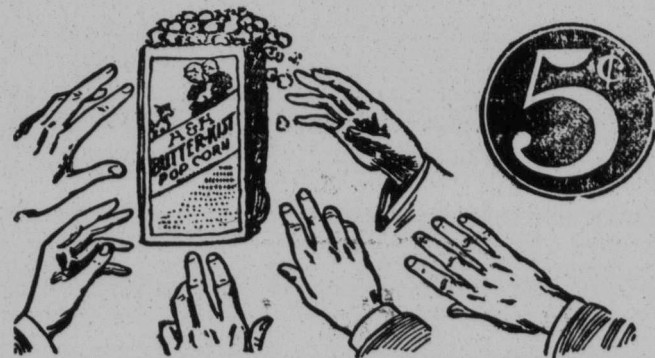

Today its business covers the whole of Canada and it has offices in New York, London and Paris. It has 615 branches and 43 sub-branches, the largest number of any Canadian bank. The capital of the bank has increased to \$16,163,000, reserve fund to \$16,406,000; total deposits to \$381,307,000; total loans to \$272,115,000 and total assets to \$470,870,000.  
From 1909 to 1919 the Royal Bank carried through four mergers. In 1910 it purchased the Union Bank of Halifax; in 1912 it absorbed the Traders' Bank of Canada, thus obtaining a very strong chain of branches through Ontario. In 1917 it took over the Quebec Bank securing a valuable connection in Quebec Province, and in 1918 it took over the Northern Crown Bank, thus extending its connections through Western Canada.

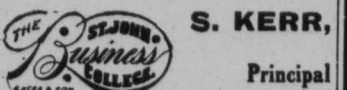

**Woods Phone Line Construction**

Col. T. G. Loggie Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines announces that the construction of the telephone line up the Nepisiquit River from Bathurst which has been delayed by the non-arrival of the wire until a few days ago, has now been commenced and several miles of line has already been strung. This line will penetrate about 70 miles from Bathurst into the very centre of the province and is part of the policy of constructing woods telephone lines and lookouts in the interest of better fire-protection in New Brunswick. The construction is being carried out by the Bathurst Lumber Company according to a standard agreed on and the cost is equally divided between the Forest Service and the Bathurst Lumber Company. The actual work is under the supervision of Mr. Mathies Cloutier, of St. Eugene, Que., who has had extensive experience in the construction of tree telephone lines, and who has been loaned to New Brunswick for this purpose. No 3 galvanized wire is being used with 2500 ohm 5 bar telephones, which are especially suited for this work. Mr. H. C. Kinghorn of the Forest Service and Mr. D. R. Morrison an experienced lineman from St. John, left Tuesday to work on the line a few days to familiarize themselves with the method of construction. They will then start the construction of a 40 mile line in the centre of Northumberland County which is designed to connect with a new lookout to be constructed on Bald Mountain. This is expected to be one of the best lookouts in the Province a very extensive area being visible from it. It is hoped to finish this line and also a line in Victoria County to connect with a new lookout to be placed on Blue Mountain.

**RATIFIED TREATY EX-CHANGES WILL OCCUR NEXT WEEK**

Paris, Oct. 16—The exchange of German peace treaty ratifications, putting the convention into effect, is expected to take place early next week, according to semi-official French sources today.  
The British and Italian ratified copies of the treaties were deposited with the peace conference secretariat yesterday.

It is explained that the delay in the formal exchange of ratifications was caused by the amount of mechanical work necessary in preparing the documents to be issued and to take effect immediately upon the coming into force of the treaty. A staff of clerks is now engaged in the work of drawing up the documents, and it is expected that this task will be completed on Sunday.

It is certainly a very rare opportunity to get a crack at these cunning black fellows and to get two such privileges was something to give all hands a jolly celebration.

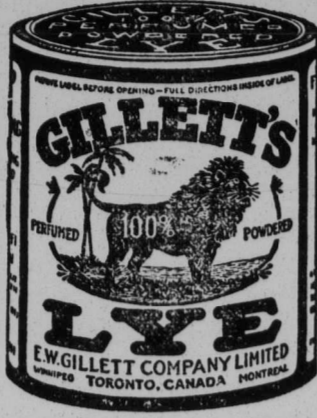
