Interesting Description of Mexican See ery—A Stronghold that Carries Bloody

From our Own Correspondent. We had travelled thirty-six miles in two days, and went into camp on the evening of the 19th, at the Ramarania ranch. Our arrival there our reception

by the natives you already know.

The first settlers here came from Mier, Mexico, or its vicinity before the Mexican war. There are now over a hundred people in the ranch, all related in some way; hence the name of their ranch "Ramarania," which means all related, or a settlement of relatives. The place is very quiet and orderly, more so than any other ranch on the river. Here drunkenness, is unknown, and a murder has never been committed since the massacre of some of the first settlers by the Carrizo Indians. The inhabitants tell many a horrible tale of iIndian eruelty, plunder and murder, remembered from their childhood. They tell how their fathers always carried their rifles br a 'long sword like knife called a "machete," whether out working in the field or just going to the river for water.

Although this land has been occupied

so long, it is very sparingly cultivated,

owing to its hilly, rocky barrenness.
Only here and there between the hills or near the river, where it can be easily irrigated, can even corn be grown. So chapparral covers nearly all this large ranch, some two miles wide river front, and running back many miles in the interior. They herd cattle goats and sheep in the chapparral, but have to drive them miles to water. In the summer the scorching sun burns up all the grass, and even the chaparral that for months and months does not receive a drop of rain. It is not an uncommon thing to see cattle literally starving to death, most any where en this river during the summer months. I myself have counted dozens either dead or dying in a single days march. Then during the wet winter the greatly needed rain. is too often accompanied by a cold norther, that proves fatal to many of the young ones and those already weak-ened by starvation. During the severe northerner we had last January (January 7-16) one herder near this post lost three hundred young lambs and goats, although he had them in a sheltered corral, and all over the country hundreds of cattle died, can we wonder then at the poverty and apparent lack of energy of these people, when all nature seems arrayed against them. In the summer months the hot blistering rays of an almost tropical sun makes it impossible to accomplish any thing like a hard day's work. Most of the natives lay off in the shade and smoke innumerable cigarettes, and knowing no better fare are contented with their "Fartillas and Frijoles" (corn cakes and beans.) Then when in winter the norther blows over these barren bills the poor inhabitant with his blanke: wrapped about limbs shiveringly crouchover the fire built on the dirt floor of his miserable mud hut, and tries to warm his poor benumbed foot, so poorly pro-



Why Presbyterians Cannot Vote for Tory Party.

The Rev. Mr Robertson, superintendent on Presbyterian missions, says :-



GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS.

The Government Convicted by its Own Witnesses.

Commissioner Irvine writes from Fort Walsh on 23rd Sept., 1882 :-

I have also to inform you that on my return from Qu'Appelle I found some 2,000 Indians here. They are all in a starving and wretched condition for want of clothing. . . . In the present starving condition of the Indians I fear, if no food is given them, that "they may hereafter commit depredations which will bring them into collision with the force. Inspector Norman writes from Fort

Walsh on 2nd October, 1882 :--There is at present three hundred lodges of Cree Indians camped here. These lodges average about eight souls, making a total of about 2,400. They are in an utter state of destitution, and are merely existing in a semi-state of starva

Comptroller White telegraphs, under date of October 19th, 1882 :-

Over two thousand Indians here almost naked and on the verge of starvation. Weather cold and snow on the ground. Have been among them for two days Am satisfied many will perish unless early assistance rendered.

Mr Herchemer, in his report of 1883, says,"A great deal of sickness has visited them lately, caused by the want of fresh meat." The Indians, under treaty 4, received in 1884-5, \$15,290.92 worth of pork, and \$1,288.45 worth of beef, although it is known that beef is life to NEATNESS the Indian of the plains, while salt pork is disease and death to him. For the salt pork the officials paid 20 to 25 cents per pound, and they could have procured all the fresh beef required for 84 to 15 cents per pound.

Reports of starvation among the Indians were made to the department by Agent McDonald, from Indian Head on February 20, 1884, also by W. Pocklington from the Stoney Indians, and by Commissioner McLeod.

Superintendent Walsh, in his report Hunger and suffering prevailed. In

some places persons became so reduced as to be unable to help themselves. The want of food followed by disease caused an epidemic, which marked its results by the many graves now to be seen in Wood Mountain.

The Dominton Senate.

To the Editor of the Toronto World. Your correspondent, "Common Sense. is wrong in assuming that neither of the political leaders has indicated how, in his opinion, the Senate should be reformed. Mr Blake in one of his recent speeches laid down the following posi-

tions, and amplified, illustrated, and enforced them with his usual skill.

1. The present Senate is a dismal failure, (1) because it has not protected provincial rights, and (2) because it has not deliberately revised hasty and imperfect

2. The present Senate is worse than useless, (1) because it is a needlessly costly body, (2) because it is permanently favorable to one position party,
(3) however much a senator may thwart the popular will he cannot be got rid of 3. A second chamber of some kind is under our present constitution a necessity, as it was part of the original bargain

between the provinces;
4. The Senate should be reduced in membership to make it less expensive, the proportion of members assigned to the different parts of the Dominion remaining unchanged;

be by direct popular vote;
6. The danger of a permanent deadlock between two chambers, both of which are chosen directly by the people, may be obviated in any one of a number of ways, well known to students of politi-cal science and referred to by Mr Blake: (1) the overriding vote, (2) the joint vote, (3) the vote of a specified majority, (4) the decisive vote after a session or after an election, (5) a declaration as to the constitutional function of the

Mr Blake added, in reply to a remark

from one of his hearers: I cannot forget that it was part of the original compact of Confederation, devised the in interests of the smaller pro-vinces, that there should be a second chamber, in which the smaller proportionate should have a larger proportionate representation than they would have in the for Quarter Thousand at same rate as for Thousand Lots. the lower chamber, where the number was based on population. Therefore I am not prepared to propose—still less am I prepared to propose, as a member coming from the largest province, one having great numerical weight in the lower House-that we should abrogate that pact and take away that supposed safeguard of the smaller provinces. Just so long as they conceive the possession of that supposed safeguard is of advantage to them our best course as states. men is to continue this portion of our legislative machinery on the principle on which it was originally introduced, making such changes as will add to its efficiency and guard against its obstructiveness, and such is the policy of the Liberal party as proclaimed in parliament and on the platform, and as we ask the peo-

ple to ratify it at the polls.

I would respectfully ask "Common Sense" to consider carefully Mr Blake's 7c. a pk. or 4 bks for 25c. scheme of Senate reform, and see whether it is not superior to his own We once had in Canada a nominated Legislative Council. We were gradually substitut-ing an elective one for it when Confederation threw the shadow on he dial backward. Let us replace ou present Senate by one elected by popular vote on some minority representation plan. No harm can ultimately come of "trust-ONLOOKER.


