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

### Fishermen Seek Work

Analys ed.

Almost every day fishermen are oming into the city from different parts of Conception Bay seeking employment to carn enough, if possible, to tide themselves and families over the winter. All these men have failed at the Labrador fishery, and are in bad straits. One man in speaking to the Telegram, and who came from Spotted Islands, said that for his trap and five men of a crew, he only had 6 quintals of fish for the season. It is a great hardship on these unfortunate men to be without means for the winter; but they are coming to a poor place to look for work when they come to St. John's where there is not employment enough for its own citizens. This time last year enough men could not be had to handle fish at the different wharves, but now their is very little fish coming to afford employment. One large mercantile house last year took in from 500 to 1,200 qtls of fish per day, but yesterday there was not a craft discharging at their premises. Many fishermen would go to Sydney, Grand Falls and other places to seek employment but they have not the money to pay their

Family's Narrow Escape. Mr. Rudderham and his family, who occupied the two upper stories of the building as a dwelling, narrowly escaped with their lives, as they were sleeping peacefully until just before sleeping peacefully until just before the firemen arrived. Their infant child's cries aroused them at that time, and when they awoke their room was filled with smoke. Mr. and Mrs. Rudderham had barely time to seize their three children and escape from the building in their night clothes when the whole structure became a seething mass of flame. Up to the time of Mr. Rudderham's escape the fire had been confined to the rear of the building but as soon as the doors were opened the flames spread to the front with great rapidity. The smoke was so dense and the heat so great that it was impossible to save anything, and all his personal effects, cusehold furniture and stock in the drug store on the ground floor consumed. The entire stock of cloths clothing, gents' furnishing, etc., in the western end of the building, occupied by McKenzie & Hickey, were



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


