

Newfoundland Football League.

REPORT FOR SEASON 1910.

Your officers congratulate the League upon the successful conclusion of our fifteenth year, and beg to submit the following report for the past season:

The championship games were participated in by the teams of the year previous, with the exception of the Casuals replacing the Total Abstinence representatives, and the order in the table of points at the conclusion was: Star, St. Bon's, Collegians, Fieldians, Casuals, C.E.I. and B.I.S.

The Star team thus for the second successive season secured possession of the championship cup and so are well on the road to a repetition of their success in former years, of becoming the absolute owners of the emblem of first place honours. As in the past their conspicuous hard play marked them out as well deserving the position they have secured.

The St. Bon's are to be complimented upon the marked advance in their play from the season previous, and upon their securing such a fine place on their second year in the League.

The Collegians and B. I. S. moved towards the reverse end of the table, and the last mentioned for the first time became the spoonholders. The Fieldians and C. E. I. improved the positions from the year previous, whilst the Casuals for their first appearance are deserving of congratulation. Their games were well fought and it was only the breaking up of their team by the loss of some of their most prominent players that prevented even better results.

Altogether, however, the games did not show the vim and enthusiasm that we would desire, due we think in a large measure to the lack of practice by the various teams. It is to be earnestly hoped that during the coming season this feature will be remedied, and that the members of the various clubs will make some attempt to revert to the old time appreciation of the value of sufficient practice before entering into the fixtures.

In the Brigade Division the Church Lads' Brigade again led the way; the Catholic Cadet Corps, Methodist Guards and Nfld. Highlanders following, thus merely repeating the order of the year previous. The champions in this division well merited their win, their play being consistently good throughout the series.

Financially the season worked out about equal to 1909. The receipts from champion competition were \$672.32 as compared with \$756.85 for the former year. The Brigade Division receipts were \$460.39 as compared with \$567.27; whilst the total receipts from all sources were \$1,393.94, and disbursements, \$1,398.65, as compared with receipts of \$1,455.31, and disbursements of \$1,447.75 for 1909. The total funds now to the credit of the League amount to \$2,771.99.

The annual games with the naval teams took the form last year of three contests with H. M. S. Cornwall. We regret that the local teams in the games were none the less enjoyed. It is only fair to state that one of the city losses might be attributed to the lateness of the season preventing a number of the selected players from taking part.

Recently the matter of the taking over of St. George's Field by the St. John's Cricket Association has been under discussion. As you are aware it has been the desire of this League to assist in the revival of the sister game so far as possible, and to that end we have made certain proposals to those interested in the cricket proposition. Nothing definite has yet been done, but if arrangements are finalized we feel that the new condition of things would tend to the general increase of interest in both games.

The new regulation confining players to separate divisions in the League came into effect for the first time last season, and whilst of course it is somewhat early to judge anything as to results, we confidently predict that the wisdom of this alteration will be amply borne out in the very near future by the creation of a good supply of new material for the various teams in both sections of the League.

The matter of endeavouring to secure a visit from an English team has again been considered, and it is earnestly hoped that the steps which have been recently taken will result in our having our wishes in this respect gratified. With this possibility before us we trust that the various clubs will make an especial effort to elevate the standard of the game to as high a plane as possible during the approaching season.

To the members of the League we again express our sincere thanks for their kind co-operation during our term of office.

Vital Statistics.

The Vital Statistics for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1910, show that the campaign for a more sanitary life is meeting with a modicum of success, that should spur citizens on to continued effort. The death rate of the Colony is the lowest for the past ten years. In 1910 it was 15.20 per 1,000 of the population. Although this is the best showing for a decade it is not by any means as good as that of the Province of Nova Scotia which shows a death rate of 13.8 per 1,000. There is a marked improvement in the electoral districts of St. John's. For the first time for ten years these districts can show a death-rate below 20 per 1,000. The actual rate for 1910 is 19.74. In 1906 it reached the abnormal height of 25.25. As usual the death-rate of the city is higher than that of the suburbs the latter showing 15.57, while the city death-rate for last year is 21.19. This is the first year since 1901 the city death-rate has been in the 21's. In that year it was 21.70. In 1908 it soared to 27.06. Halifax last year had a death-rate of 16.6. Why should the City of St. John's be satisfied with 21.70? If London with nearly five million people can reduce its death-rate to less than 14 per 1,000, why cannot St. John's city do it? If Hornsey with its 30,000 people can keep its death-rate in the vicinity of 7 to 8 per 1,000, why cannot the City of St. John's get below 20 per 1,000. There is work to be done which will save lives, prevent sickness and lead to healthier living and greater earning power by attention to sanitation. Two hundred years ago the death-rate of London was 50 per 1,000. In 1908 it was 12.0 per 1,000. Public and private cleanliness effected the change.

Is This British Law?
 Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Sir,—I would like to call the attention of the Government and those who make our laws respecting our fishery, to the following infringement of our lawful rights.

A few years ago the people of this place drew up a petition saying that no traps or anything for the holding of a trap berth should be placed in the water before the 25th day of May in any year. It was sanctioned by the Governor and made law. Yet in spite of this, some individuals in defiance of the law made by the people of this place, took their trap-moorings and outfit and placed it in the water where it suited them best.

Can those who make our laws tolerate such work? If so then it is no use making a law to protect our fishery.

Again, I would ask the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, if it is possible for one or two individuals to have a law cancelled from the Fishery Act, that has been made by a harbor of refuge. If so then we are going back to the days of the Stuarts, and if one or two can have a law cancelled from the Fishery Act to suit their own purpose, certainly it can be plainly seen that the same individuals can have a law made for a Harbour of refuge. I trust that the authorities will take this matter in hands and put a stop to it at once.

L.O.A. at Channel.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—Royal William Lodge, No. 20, Loyal Orange Association, held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday evening, 4th inst. A goodly number of members were in attendance and the session was presided over by W. Bro. W. A. Morgan, Worshipful Master, assisted by Bro. Henry Brass, Deputy Master, and the regular official staff. Routine business was quickly disposed of as there were not any candidates for initiation. W. Bro. Rev. J. T. Beagrie, Chaplain of Lodge, on the invitation of the Worshipful Master, ascended the platform, and for the space of forty minutes lectured the meeting on the phases of the recent promulgation of the Papal Decree of "Ne Temere" and the effects it would have on the Protestants of the Province of Quebec. In calm, dispassionate language the lecturer traced the origin and intention of this decree and its probable consequences. At the conclusion of Rev. Beagrie's remarks, Bro. C. T. James spoke for a similar period, pointing out to the members their duty in the premises. An organized Protestantism the duty of the Orange Association was to protest against the enforcement of this decree in any British Possession. The decree itself was subversive of all ideas of British Justice, and contrary to the spirit of British law. The Courts of the British Provinces should never yield to such a pernicious Ecclesiastical pronouncement. The civil and religious status of the citizens was rendered nugatory if this decree was upheld by any British Court of Justice.

Both speakers received acclamatory votes of thanks from the Lodge, (with honors) for their exceedingly explicit interpretations of the "Ne Temere" decree. At the subsequent monthly meetings other lectures will be delivered on historical events in connection with the Empire, and Royal William Lodge has mapped out a programme which will be both instructive and entertaining for the balance of 1911. Lansdowne's Plans.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, May 9. Lord Lansdowne, Leader of the Opposition in the House of Lords, introduced a bill for the reform of the Upper House, before a great audience, to-day. Unionists, he said, were convinced that an amendment to the constitution of the House of Lords should proceed simultaneously with the reform of the relations of the two Houses. There was a desire to demonstrate to the country they could provide an efficient second chamber which could be trusted to use its powers fairly between great political parties; to faithfully serve democracy and at the same time be strong enough to resist gusts of passion and prejudice with which all democracies were familiar. The proposed House would consist of 350 Lords of Parliament. No peer should hold his seat for more than twelve years, but would be eligible for re-election. The Peers themselves would elect 100 members possessing statutory qualifications such as present or former Viceroy, Governors, Privy Councillors, members of the House of Commons, diplomats, naval and military officials, civil servants, lord mayors, provosts, etc. The 2nd contingent would consist of 120 members to be elected from outside the House of Lords by an Electoral College, composed of members of the Lower House, representing constituencies comprised of electoral districts into which the country would be divided by specially appointed commissioners. The third section of the House, numbering 100 members, would be appointed by the Crown, on recommendation of the Cabinet. Princes of Royal Blood would retain their seats, as also would the Archbishops, while five bishops would be elected, including the Lord Chancellor and ex-Chancellor, there would be sixteen law lords. The Bill also provides that Peers, who are Lords of Parliament, should be elected by the House of Commons. Lansdowne concluded by expressing the belief that there could be no permanent party majority in the House as re-constructed in the manner the bill proposes. The power of the Crown to appoint hereditary peers would be limited to 5 appointments each year. The Bill was read a first time. Viscount Morley who followed the Marquis of Lansdowne threw cold water on the plan. He admitted the author of the Bill had taken a bold, frank course and possibly a helpful course, but he said the Government should not accept the proposals as a solution of the difficulty.

Items of Interest From Montreal.

Montreal has been experiencing a very cold wave all this week. Up to Sunday last the weather was as warm as in any day in summer, there being a temperature of 70 deg. Fahr. Since then the winds have been big and cold and the sun has literally as well as figuratively hidden his face. One would imagine oneself in November. A meeting of the Newfoundland Society of this city will take place on Tuesday next at 7.45 p.m. The meeting will be held in the Society rooms on Lagache Street. St. Major Johnson will give a lecture illustrated with limelight views. The subject will be "Through Canada." On the morning of Thursday, the 27th ult., a very large fire occurred in an apartment house on Mount Royal Avenue was completely gutted by fire. No less than sixteen families were thrown homeless on the street in the early morning. Happily no lives were lost. The building was five storeys high with a basement. This fire has given rise to much discussion as to the condition of public buildings in regard to their being fireproof and built according to regulations. The building in question was not according to regulations, as it was a storey too high and its four walls only were fireproof. Chief Tremblay of the fire department has been ordered to inspect every apartment house in the city. The first conference between the City Board of Control and the Street Railway Committee was held on the 1st inst. Four companies have amalgamated to form one Street Railway Co. and this of course necessitates the drawing up of a new contract, which is the object of this conference.

50,000 People Witness Race for English Sculling Championship. London, May 2.—Ernest Barry, England's champion sculler, retained his title yesterday in a match with Wm. Albany, of River Lea, defeating the latter in a well rowed race over a 4 1/2 mile course from Putney to Mortlake. Barry owed his victory to superior condition. He won the toss and chose the Surrey side of the river, which gave him a big advantage. Despite this, however, Albany was in the lead by two to three lengths to Hammer Smith, halfway point on course. Here Barry drew up on even terms, but Albany quickly resumed the lead. Challenger rowed himself



out within the next mile and Barry soon drew away, winning by five lengths. His time was 23 minutes and 2 seconds. More than 50,000 persons lined the course and much betting, with Barry heavy favorite, was indulged in. Weather was perfect but river was rough in spots.



SOLIGNUM.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this was suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wood Piles or any other wood work.



- 6th—If black spots appear before the eyes or seem floating around them.




