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

Dust Carries It.


Under the above headline the New fork Sun publishes an interesting acount of a paper read by Dr. Marcus Neustaedter before the neurological livision of the Academy of Medicine. which he explains a series of exeriments conducted in conjunction with Dr. William Thro, of the Cornell Medical College for the purpose of determing the manner of the spread of

As a basis for his experiments which were made on six monkeys, Dr. Neustaedter adopted the hypothesis that infantile paralysis, like so many other dangerous affections, is a dust lisease, contracted by children coming in contact with or breathing in the dust of any room infected with paralyic germs. During March Dr. Neusacdter and Dr. Thro collected the sweepings from rooms in which there were nineteen different cases of inantile paralysis of from three to

six months standing. These collecions of dust were taken from the walls, floors and wooden trimmings of he different rooms, and were then dried, sifted, macerated and dissolved in a normal salt solution. The resulting solution was injected into the brains of six monkeys reserved for

Five of the monkeys showed prominent symptoms of paresis, in some cases paralysis being complete. Sterephysicians present agreed that the monkeys were undoubtedly paralytic and that an important chapter had been added to the medical knowledge

DUBLIN, To-day. In connection with the resistance of Home Rule, the Primate of the Church of Ireland (Anglican), after consulting with the Archbishop of Dublin and other bishops has resolved to call a special meeting of the General Synod of the Church of Ireland at Dublin on March 21st to consider the crisis. The general belief prevails that before this date the Government will have presented the Home Rule bill to Parliament, so that its outlines will be in the hands of the Synod. The Primate said the prospect of another Home Rule bill was doing incalculable injury, had practically divided Ireland into two hostile camps, and had also accentuated religious differences to an extent un-

The Passing of Dr. Chaplin.

The death of Dr. Herbert L. S. haplin which occurred at the resice of his father. Mark Chaplin, this morning, though not unexpected, has occasioned profound sadness in the city amongst a large circle of acquaintances and friends with whom he was a deserveedly popular figure. For the past four months he ligifant internal ailment, yet in spite of he knowledge that no cure could be effected, he has constantly exhibited a bravery under affliction and suffering, as well as a thoughtful unselfishness that was as inspiring as it was marvellous to those who ministered to him Not until late in the past mer was there any marked physical ailment, but early during September he proceeded to Montreal where it was hoped the trip and consultation with physicians there might restore him to health again. An operation followed his entry to the Victoria General Hospital from which satisfactory results did not ensue. Later a second operation revealed the fact that a malignant growth of his liver was present and that death was only a question of a short space. He returned soon after the last operation to die in his own home, and during all the intervening weeks he has been a constant sufferer, unable to partake of any nourishment worth while, yet cheerful and buoyant. He had the benefit of unceasing professional attendances from his friends, Drs. Mitchell and Cowperthwaite, as well as the fond attention of parents and loved ones of the family. For two days preceding death he was practically unnscious, and passed away peacefully ust after eight o'clock this morning.

Dr. Chaplin was born in this city in June 1880. He was educated at the Methodist College, afterwards serving some time with McMurdo & Co.. Subsequently he attended McGill University, graduating in 1903.
