Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-Day.

The Brooklyn Eagle's London correspondent writes as follows: "I am able to announce definitely that King George will visit Canada in 1914. Only some such unexpected event as a Eu ropean war involving England or a family bereavement will prevent this trip taking place. The King and his advisers are taking somewhat unne cessary pains to keep the proposed visit a secret. They are so afraid that Canadians will be disappointed that they dread the King's attention being announced at this distant date. The meeting of King George and President Wilson at Niagara Falls will likely be arranged within the near future. King George intimates his willingness to open the Toronto Exhibition in August 1914. Prepar ations for this event are already be ing made in English Court circles England has visited Canada, and it i oped the Queen will accompany the King; but nothing yet is definitely settled as regards to this. The Princ of Wales is quite likely to be with his father on this interesting trip. It is understood that the Duke of Connaught cordially endorsed the earnest solicitation of the Canadian Government and people, to which the

King has now accorded, so far as his plans can be arranged in advance, a welcome assent: As the yacht races for America's Cup takes place n September, 1914, there is just a chance the King on his return trip home may be a spectator of Sir Thomas Lipton's fourth attempt to lift the cup. It has been suggested that the warship in which the King makes his trip to Canada should be diverted to Sandy Hook so that King George can see in person what happens to the Four Leafed Shamrock. It is not likely the King would go ashore at New York, but if it can be suitably arranged, he would be gleat to see the second service of the second second service of the second second service of the second second service of the second second service of the second be glad to see one or two of the races for Amerca's cup. During the King's absence from England the Royal pre-regatives will be invested in a commission similar to that which was appointed when he was in India to receive the homage of His subjects in that Empire. King George's ambition is to be the first King to visit not only Canada bu also Australia and South Africa.



The violins no longer possess the familiar curves and sturdy frames They are peculiar hollow tube-like af fairs with strangly arranged strings The 'cellos are in a similar emaciated condition, their ample sides having ap parently dwindled into slight wooder supports. Every instrument, however, boasts a little aluminium hor directed towards the parent trumpet in order to concentrate the sound waves at one common point. Perched on a high platform near the roof is the conductor, whose lofty position chosen to take him out of the way o the all-important sound waves.
