INSTALLATION OF KNIGHTS OF

Those who were privileged to witness the installation of the 17 Knights of the Order of the Bath at Westminster Abbey must have been struck with the traditional continuity in perfect detail of our old English pageantry (writes a Daily Chronicle representative), who goes on to say:

The Knights entered the Abbey by the West Cloister door, and passed up the centre of the nave into the choir. Four magnificent Guardsmen, with white plumed headdresses and long staves, stood at the bottom of the steps, and between them the procession passed. Rows of military functionaries in all the trappings of their office, members of the Order, and foreigners of note, occupied the seats, filling the main hall, and making an audience almost as brilliant in coloring as the procession.

First came the Abbey beadle, who led the way for the trumpeters and the Abbey Cross, the ecclesiastics (dignified in gold cloth and white), then the choir, the tiny lads in front habited in rich scarlet and gold, the others in white, and after these the canons of Westminster in their gowns of white and gold.

Then, with the fine music rising in crescendo, came, solemn and stately the Knights Grand Cross, gorgeous in the panoply of their Order.

Some still walked with sprightly air, holding their heads upright; but many, the truth must be recorded, found themselves already battling with old Time. the persistent antagonist of all Inights both on land and sea. Crimson robed, carrying black hats, each tufted with snowy white plumes, the Knights advanced ascending the steps before the altar past the wonderful picture of Edward the Confessor, graced for the occasion with the great gold plate of the Abbey set beneath it. Two by two they went into their own chapel

The organ sent forth its triumphant note as the Sovereign, his train borne by the Pages of Honor, and the Grand Master (the Duke of Connaught), with the groom of the Robes and the Yeoman of the Guard. made their way to the installation

The King stood under the banner, the Knights of Grand Cross on either side, Bath King of Arms in the center. He bowed to the Knights Grand Cross, who were to be installed, and they came forward to the middle of the Chapel, made reverence to the Sovereign and Grand Master, and ascended to their stalls and stood within. They were:

Lord Reading, General Sir Arthur Wynne, General Sir Herbert Miles, Admiral Sir Francis Bridgeman, Lord Muir-Mackenzie, General Sir Henry Leslie Rundle, Admiral Sir William May, Lord Kilbracken, Sir Evan McGregor, Sir Rgeinald Wingate, Sir Arthur Paget, Admiral Sir Hedworth Meux, the Earl of Dudley, Sir Inigo Thomas, Sir Archibald Hunter, Lord Hardinge of Penhurst and Sir George Murray.

Viscount French. Sir Horace Smith-Dorien, Sir George Buchanan, Viscount Esher and Sir West Ridgeway were to have been included, but could not be present, and their installation had to be deferred.

British Calm and U. S. Naval Criticism.

The imperturbable calm with which roversy at Washington on the same Even the publication of President American naval officers, which was fact that to be a great naval strategist, a man should be a landsman and British paper and un by most of them. The tersest reference was that of the London "Even ing Standard," to the effect that the President, in deprecating professional conversatism, and extolling amateur initiative, was merely saying what the "man on the street" was saying in England throughout the war. The President, in 1917, was urgent that the Allies "throw prudence to the winds," and demanded that "something unusual" be done; but he was speech was not published broadcast. As the "Evening Standard" says: "If the Admiralty had simply aimed at something unusual," something unusual would no doubt have happened. perhaps something as unusual as the defeat of Great Britain."

When the text of President Wilson's peech was publish a fortnight or so ago, it had a strangely familiar ring to some Canadian editors. Soon the source of resemblance became evident. In thought, if not in diction, it was precisely like dozens of letters that were thrown into the waste basket of this office during the war. Invariably such letters deplored the lack of initiative of British generals and admirals, and suggested that a profesiosnal person, would make hort work of the Germans. Some of our correspondents in Saskatchewan, remiskaming, and even in Toronto, likewise claimed to have made repre sentations to the British Government which had been unheeded. But these were obscure individuals. To mos of them it should be some consola tion to feel that the President of the United States thought just as they did, or at any rate pretended to think so, when he addressed the officers of the American navy as their Commander-in-Chief. Perhaps, however, it was just his way of bucking them up against timidity born of a sense of nexperience. The ready letterwriters, however, were quite sincere, and many of them are perhaps still puzzled to understand how British arms on land and sea chanced to ob-

Under the circumstances, it is not to be wondered at that British politicians and editors who heard the theory of amateurism expounded on every curb and in every club during Washington controversy. Their genial attitude should commend itself to Secretary Daniels, as the wearer of the smirk that won't come off .- Saturday Night.



Upon the recommendation of the ood Control Board, and under the provisions of the Food Control Act. 1917, and the War Measures Act. 914-1916. His Excellency the Goveror in Council has been pleased to approve the following Regulations rerarding the sale of Sugar:-

1. The wholesale price of sugar when sold by the importer shall not exceed Twenty-seven and one-quarter ents per pound, when it is a cash

he price shall not be in excess of Cwenty-eight and one-quarter cents

ion. Twenty-five barrels or over shall nstitute and be deemed a wholesale ery of at one time. Any less quantity han the above, sold in original package, shall constitute a jobbing transtion. A barrel shall be held to conain not less than three hundred

4. From and after this date the reail price of white granulated sugar within the Municipal limits of the own of St. John's shall not exceed hirty cents per pound, and in the outorts thirty cents per pound, plus ransportation, insurance and egular charges.

5. Any person who shall offer for ale, or shall sell any sugar at a greater price than that fixed in above Regulations, shall be guilty of a breach

6. All foregoing prices are for cash

7. No dealer shall refuse a tender f cash when a purchase is made. 8. Any person violating any of the rovisions of these Regulations shall be guilty of an offence and liable upon mmary conviction before a Magisrate or Justice of the Peace to a penalty not exceeding one thousand dol-

lars, or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months, or to both fine and imprisonment. (One half of the fine shall be paid to the informer and the balance to the Food Control Board, for the benefit of the Domin

9. No Sugar shall be imported into Newfoundland unless a permit to do so shall have been obtained beforehand from the Food Control Board.

10. These Regulations shall be, and come into effect on the First day of June, 1920. 11. The Regulations respecting Su-

gar, Flour and Molasses, published in the Royal Gazette on the eight of October, 1918, are hereby cancelled. R. A. SQUIRES,
