The former is one of the improved Battery Condensers, and when put up will be in the shape of a box. It is twelve feet high and three feet wide, with 96 pipes, thus giving the largest condensing power. As this building is set apart for the condensing and purifying of the gas, the Company will be enabled to do this part of the work thoroughly, and supply the best possible article.

The works were originally built to accommodate about eighty consumers, and partly as an experiment. At present there are 170 consumers, being a gain of 112 per cent. in three years and a half. The delivery of gas to the town is 15,000 test per day, and is not half enough, owing to the want of sufficient stowage accommodation.

The improvements should have been completed by the first of this month; but, owing to the hardness of the rock, difficulty with the water, and other hindrances, it has been found impossible to complete them for this year's work. The manager informs us that they will be completed by August of next year. The Gas Company are losers to a considerable extent by this delay, as they have not been fully able to supply their customers with gas. The Directors have discovered their mistake in building works just the actual size required, and these projected improvements will provide for all requirements for the next six or eight years.
