BRITAIN'S DRINK BILL

The drink bill of Great Britain is something terrible. We read that three million unemployed people in Great Britain and Ireland, very many of whom are miserably poor, earning hardly enough to keep soul and body together, in this country in which there is so much poverty, the enormous sum of \$600,000,000 was expended for strong drink.
