"All classes of wool now have free entry to the U. S. This will enable the unwashed wool to go there this season. We think it would be just as well for the farmers to shear their sheep without washing. The flocks are now so small and in many cases this washing was poorly done and caused trouble to both buyer and seller.

Formerly unwashed wool was bought all round and sold to the local manufacturer the same way. When shipping to the U. S. it will have to be graded same as the washed. That is cotted, black, burry and seedy fleeces culled and bought as rejections."

According to G. G. Bramhill of the local Department of Agriculture the past winter was not a severe one on the fruit trees in the county. On a recent trip to the northern part of the county Mr. Brambill examined a number of the peach orchards in the fruit belt and found that the trees were uninjured. He states that unless some unforseen calamity happens the fruit crop in Lambton county will this year be a bumper one.

Simmons Bros., of Shiloh, report a good catch of fur bearing animals this season, vz: —21 Skunks, 21 Muskrats, 52 Weasels and 4 Coons.

HOW NAPOLEON DIED.

Cancer Was the Cause of His Death Says Physician's Grandson.

Some interesting additions to the last chapter in the life of Napoleon—the five and a half years he spent on the island of St. Helena—are made by Mr. L. M. Shortt, the grandson of by Mr. L. M. Shortt, the grauuson of Dr. Thomas Shortt, who was principal

medical officer on the island during the last months of Napoleon's life. Two months before the death of "the little Corsican," which took place about ten minutes before six o'clock on the evening of May 5th, 1821, Napoleon was told that a splendid mansion had been completed for him on the island, to which he could move at any time. Napoleon, how-ever, regarded the building with horror, and would never go into it. Dr. Shortt, and those obliged to be on the spot, had beds in the mansion, being its first inhabitants.

Napoleon developed many eccentricities before his death. It was with the greatest difficulty that he could be persuaded to take either food or medicine. Indeed, Dr. Shortt had to invent a plan to make Napoleon take medicine without his knowing it.

By this means the doctor managed

to give him ten grains of calomel, and he derived advantage from the medi-cine, but his strength declined rapidly and his existence soon terminated Dr. Shortt mentions in The English Review, that Napoleon would allow no stranger to approach him, and, although he continued in consultation until Napoleon died, he did not see him until after his death.

A post-mortem examination reveal-ed the fact that Napoleon's body was a perfect mass of disease from cancer. His father died when younger than himself of the same disease, so that it was hereditary, and uncon-nected with climate or the mode of life he led at St. Helena. There is little doubt that he would have shared the same fate had he been seated on the throne of France. It is said that Napoleon's sister, the Princess Borghese, suffered from the same dis-ease, and Bonaparte was anxious that his own symptoms should be fully ascertained for the purpose of being useful to his child, who might inherit from him the complaint.

FRUIT AND SHADE TREES.

Now is the time to attend to old fruit and shade trees that are overgrown with moss and lichens, which harbor a horde of injurious insects. Make a compound of commercial

caustic soda, one pound, and an equal quantity of crude potash. Mix each separately with water; then mix the two solutions together, stirring in a pound of soft soap and adding sufficient water to make ten gallons of the complete mixture. Smaller quantities can be made in the same proportions. Care must be exercised in using this mixture not to get it in the eyes or en the clothes, and gloves should be worn in preparing and using it.

Apply the compound with a syringe, brush or sprayer to destroy the moss, lichens and hibernating insects such as the woolly aphis, codling moth, caterpillars and scale, clearing out any other insects that may be lufking in

POULTRY BREEDING.

An Oregon Hen Lays Three Hundred Eggs Within a Year.

The 300 egg hen has arrived! At least Oregon claims to have her, says the Country Gentleman. This appears to be the world's record for fowls The Oregon champion deserves the ribbon for America, and her record is all the more convincing since she was one of a pen in which another hen laid 291 eggs. The best five hens of the flock are said to have exceeded 280 eggs each, while the entire flock of forty hens averaged more than 210 eggs each a year.
While it is true that high records

achieved by special breeding and feed ing, may have little significance to the commercial poultryman, they do give more grounds for the hope that the commercial hen with the ability of producing 200 eggs or thereabouts each year may some time not be rare. Of course the 200 egg hen is no more the commercial standard today than is the cow that can produce 1,000 pounds of butter in a year, but no one will deny that the 1,000 pound cow

This achievement with the hen is of more significance because it has come so early in the history of intelligent poultry breeding. Improvement of the dairy cow dates back almost a cen-tury; improvement of the hen for egg production is a matter of less than a generation. The ease with which conlitions surrounding the fowl can be controlled and the rapidity with which generations may be produced have, of course, made this quick improvement possible. Yet we know so little of the principles of breeding with respect to fowls that the optimist is justified in predicting some startling records for the future, when the real utility

hen is developed.

The poultryman must be faithful to his task. He needs to stick to a plan of breeding with the same tenacity that the early stockmen used, and re-sults will be just as surely forthcoming. The hen is no more subject to chance than other live stock.

ending Without Sewing.

Mending Without Sewing.

Here is a simple and efficacious way of mending a tear, three cornered or otherwise, in an article of clothing: Place the cloth flat on a table and smear a little white of a raw egg all around and over the tear on the reverse side. Now cut a piece of linen (a handkerchief will do) a little larger than the tear and place it over the rent so that it adheres to the white of egg. Then get a hot iron and simply press it, without troning, over the linen. The linen will adhere firmly to the cloth and will not come off even if washed. The rent in the material will now be almost invisible on the outside, and the mending will last as long as the dress or suit.—London Answers.



THE PRODUCTION OF HOGS.

hogs must feed and graze continuously on pastures and crops particularly planted for them, is the advice of experts of the farmers' co-operative branch of the bureau of plant industry, department of agriculture. Very seldom is the growing of hogs for slaughter a source of profit unless proper grazing and feed-

ing methods are followed.

In the spring, summer and fall there are many crops for pasturing hogs, but during the winter the crops to select from are limited. On almost every farm the production and keeping of hogs in winter is expensive and generally it is not profitable, for the reason that large quantities of corn are fed without products of green crops. More winter grazing is needed, for which many crops are adapted. The most reliable are, however, rape, rye, oats, wheat and barley

For grazing purposes these pasturing crops for hogs should be sown on specially well drained and prepared land that is either rich or has received a liberal application of manure. Good winter pasturage is not obtained except on the best drained

The seeding should be heavy to insure a thorough planting. The young plants will grow slowly in the winter and many plants will be needed to furnish plenty of pasture. Crimson clover will do well with rape, rye, oats, wheat and barley and will land.

#### A DURABLE STACK COVER.

Will Be Found Convenient to Use For Many Purposes.

A very durable stack cover can be made of boards in sections about four feet wide by six feet long. Place four boards one inch by four feet by six inches side by side and fasten together with braces. Paint joints on upper side and paint bats before covering the joints. Do not run bats way to the top, but run one bat along the top, extending over

about two inches on half of them and put no bats on the other half, so that the

bat will cover them both. Put bats on right side of each section so that it will cover the edge of next section. hasps on the bats so that they will fit staples on the companion section. Care should be taken to get these hasps and staples rightly located. These covers will be found to be very convenient to use as stack covers and for machinery, chicken coops, pig shade, cattle shade, etc. Being light and movable, they can be put to a great number of uses and, being rigid, are not easily blown away, nor will they sag.-Iowa Homestead.

Winter Care of Peach Trees. Peach trees are especially subject to the attacks of the San Jose scale. The bark of infested trees is covered with a crust of grayish scales, the insects multiplying rapidly and finally killing the tree. The remedy is spraying with lime-sulphur during the winter. When trees are badly infested it may be necessary to prune them back severely before applying the spray. Take care to burn all the wood cut from the

Electricity For Chickens. Before the London Royal Society of Arts, Thorne Baker, the electrician, advocated the application of electricity to chicken farming. Experiments, he said, had proved that chickens could be grown under electric stimulus at about double the normal rate and with a mortality practically nonexistent. An induction coil giving a one inch spark could successfully treat 1,000 chickens.

#### Hydro-Electric Radial Meeting

The mass meeting called for Friday evening was not so largely attended as was expected. At 8 o'clock about twenty-five people sat chatting around the stove in the Lyceum, and when the meeting was called to order some 15 minutes later, not more than 100 were present. Probably 75 or 100 more dropped in before the speeches were concluded.

Reeve Stapleford presided, and in his introductory remarks urged, that the del-

introductory remarks urged that the delegates appointed on the deputation to Ottawa should also joun the delegation that will interview the Minister of Public Works re free gravel from the St. Clair river. The speakers were Mayor Stirrett, of

Petrolea; Mayor Graham, of London; Mr. H. J. Fowler, of London; and May-or Petrypiece, of Forest. The speeches were all good and were attentively listen-

were an good and were attentively listended to.

Mayor Stirrett, as county representative, explained at some length the plans of the Hydro-Electric and Radial Commission and urged the uniformity of the different municipalities of the county in helping to carry out the scheme. Surveys of the county will be made shortly, and Lambton will likely be one of the first counties to be served. He could not conjecture where or in what direction the lines would run. The terminals, population served, products of the district, and points of least resistance in construction would be decided first. The report made after the survey would give the probable cost of construction including the right of way; and tell whether opered to. the right of way; and tell whether operating of the projected lines would pay a surplus or leave a deficit. Negotiations would then be made with the municipalities through which the projected lines would run, estimates laid before the electors and a vote taken to authorize the ectors and a vote taken to authorize the construction. If the vote is tavorable debentures will be issued. The Commission takes the debentures, which will not be offered for sale. At the end of 30 years it is expected that the profits of the roads will be sufficient to wipe out the obligation, the debentures will then be handed back to the municipalities and the future profits of the roads belong to the radials and thus enrich the users and the country generally. All that is neces-sary is the backing up of the municipal-

Mr. H. J. Fowler thought the people should do something for themselves. Hydro-electric would reduce the cost of lighting and power, and radials would work the same way. The building of radials would bring practical results and would give cheap transportation on lines owned by the people and managed for the benefit of the people. He hoped a good representation would be sent from Watford to Ottawa to demand something

Watford to Ottawa to demand something tor the people.

Mayor Graham represented the Great Waterways Union, and said their aims were coupled with those of the Hydro-Electric and Radial Commission. He explained the difference between the proposed Georgian Bay Canal and the Welland Canal schemes and showed the superiority of the latter, not only with regard to shipping but as to the development of power.
