CANADA now has its own standard of manners, laid down by no less an institution than the attractive little green-covered book bearing the one word title, "Manners" and stamped with the provincial coat-of-arms, under which are the words "recommended by the Minister of Education for use in school libraries in Ontario." It is strictly against the law to distribute bills of any kind of mail matter in rural mail boxes unless full postage is paid thereon, and couriers are instructed to collect all such deposits and deliver them at the post office, where they will be treated as "dead" matter. This is a point in connection with the rural mail delivery system that is not generally known, and we give it as a piece of information. Any person, however, can deposit a fully prepaid letter or parcel in a rural mail box for any other rural mail patron along the same route and it will be delivered by the courier as if mailed at a post office. It is necessary, however, that the courier obliterate or deface the stamp before placing it in the box to which it is addressed.

The teachers think that there could not be any better stimulus for the children than to receive letters from across the sea and to know that their letters are going over there not to be read merely by one child, but to be read in a school to all the pupils, and the replies received treated similarly. If children can be brought into contact with things that are going on outside their own little home, if they feel that they can draw knowledge and interest from those who are a long way away, and can return the advantage, such exchanges of ideas will undoubtedly have lasting results and is an education in itself. Principal Shrapnell and staff are always on the alert to embrace any new idea that will tend to make more thorough the education of the children under their care.

NOTE AND COMMENT.

A most important development of the air brake was demonstrated in recent experiments on the Pennsylvania Railroad when a twelve-car steel train, nearly 1000 tons in weight, running 60 miles an hour, was stopped within its own length of about 1,000 feet. The new Westinghouse brake may be operated with pneumatic or electric control, and it embodies among other improvements two shoes for each wheel instead of one as at present.

The thirty-eighth annual report of the Provincial Liquor License Department has just been issued. The total number of tavern and shop licenses for the license year ending April 30th, 1913, was reduced by 70, as compared with the previous year. Of the revenue the total amount paid to the Municipalities for the license year 1912-13 was \$339,459.13; while the provincial end of it was \$414,816.09. The fines collected during the year amounted to \$37,433.05 and in total

option municipalities, \$14,764. The number committed during the year for drunkenness was 4974, an increase of over 1750 over 1912. There were 235 prosecutions under the Liquor License Act. 179 convictions were obtained, 33 persons were discharged, 6 withdrawn and 17 not dealt with. The fines imposed in addition to sentences of imprisonment were \$18,949. During the year there were seized 4730 bottles of whisky, 186 bottles of gin, 2 barrels of wine, 50 gallons of high wine, 91 barrels and cases of ale, 2108 bottles of beer.

A Louisiana senator has introduced a bill for nation-wide refusal of marriage licenses to persons who have been divorced. If the bill should become a law the divorce mills would rust through lack of use. In fashionable circles many prospective marriages are arranged for before divorce proceedings are instituted. All of which is very naughty.

It is unofficially stated that a scheme is in preparation by the government to take over rural telephones and to operate them upon much the same system that hydro is operated, namely, at cost to the patron of the telephone. There is said to be 400 or 500 telephone companies in existence in the province. One set of poles could carry power and light as well as the telephone wires, and one group of linemen could superintend all wires.

Every year many are puzzled by the obvious discrepancy between the dates for the beginning and ending of Lent and the forty day duration of that period. It is readily seen that more than forty days elapse from Ash Wednesday to Easter. Those who are in any way connected with the churches which formally observe Lent know that all Sundays are feast days instead of fast days. They are like islands in the sea or oases in the desert, from the point of view of those who look upon Lenten curbs upon the appetite as hardship. Sundays are in Lent, not of Lent, and they have to be counted out to get the true length of that period, between its beginning and its end. This year there are six Sundays in Lent, and that fact explains fully the excess over forty days from Feb. 25th to April 22, both dates included. It is a simple matter when once understood, but it has caused much argument and confusion among those who have had no personal familiarity with the usage of the churches which observe the long period of fasting as the days lengthen into spring.

Scores Extravagant Living

That the general mode of living of the people of today is too luxurious, was the substance of a topic on the high cost of living at a well-attended meeting of the Women's Institute held at Simcoe. Extravagance in dress also came in for criticism, as a factor in the problem of economical living. Plain modes of dressing were recommended as being beneficial from an economic standpoint, as well as appearance.
Delicacies in foods also came in for their share of probing. Plain and wholesome articles for the table were recommended to substitute the indigestive, palate-ticking dainties that are costly and injurious to health.
Telephones were also placed in the luxury class.
Although wages have steadily increased during the last few years, it was pointed out that the expenditures for pastime, including theatres and picture shows, has grown more than proportionately larger.

What is a Bag of Potatoes?
One of our townspeople bought three bags of potatoes from a farmer on Monday, and gives his experience for the benefit of any who are in the habit of accepting a purchase without making inspection as to weight or measure. In order to assure himself that he was getting proper measure he had the three bags weighed separately. The result was one bag of 87 pounds, another of 77 pounds and the third of 76 pounds. As a bag of potatoes is supposed to weigh 90 pounds, he found that he was just 30 pounds short of what he had paid for, which represented 30 cents, as the price of the tubers was 30 cents a bag. On having the discrepancy pointed out to him the farmer made good. We venture to say that in nearly all cases people who buy potatoes by the bag are satisfied to accept a bagful as a bag, regardless of size or weight. The custom has obtained for so long a time that it is quite probable the farmer who was selling the potatoes did not intend to be dishonest in the transaction.—Glencoe Transcript.

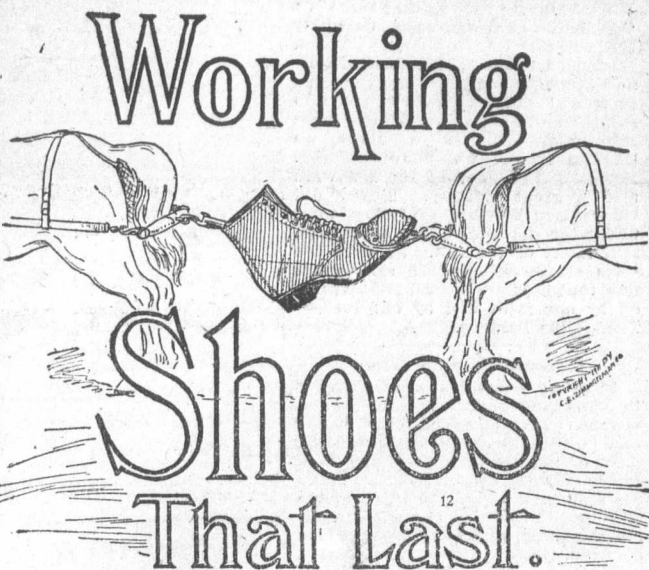

About Wool

Long & Biaby, wholesale wool dealers, Hamilton, have sent out the following circular:—
 "All classes of wool now have free entry to the U. S. This will enable the unwashed wool to go there this season. We think it would be just as well for the farmers to shear their sheep without washing. The flocks are now so small and in many cases this washing was poorly done and caused trouble to both buyer and seller.
 Formerly unwashed wool was bought all round and sold to the local manufacturer the same way. When shipping to the U. S. it will have to be graded same as the washed. That is cotted, black, burry and seedy fleeces called and bought as rejections."

According to G. G. Bramhill of the local Department of Agriculture the past winter was not a severe one on the fruit trees in the county. On a recent trip to the northern part of the county Mr. Bramhill examined a number of the peach orchards in the fruit belt and found that the trees were uninjured. He states that unless some unforeseen calamity happens the fruit crop in Lambton county will this year be a bumper one.
 Simmons Bros., of Shiloh, report a good catch of fur bearing animals this season, viz:—21 Skunks, 21 Muskrats, 52 Weasels and 4 Coons.

Toronto
 Toronto, March 24.—The cattle trade continues very dull this week and although there was but a slight run offering the market was very slow, with prices inclined to weaken on medium and light butcher cattle. There were practically no choice butcher cattle in the market, outside of one or two picked steers.

Although trade is expected to be more active next week in preparation for the Easter trade one or two heavy runs would probably result in material breaks in prices, as the market is liable to be easily overloaded. 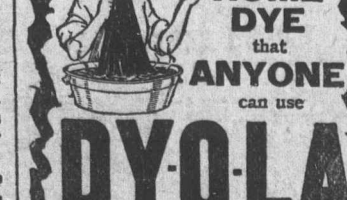

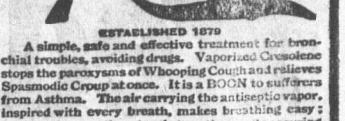

THE PRODUCTION OF HOGS.

To produce pork profitably hogs must feed and graze continuously on pastures and crops particularly planted for them, is the advice of experts of the farmers' co-operative branch of the bureau of plant industry, department of agriculture. Very seldom is the growing of hogs for slaughter a source of profit unless proper grazing and feeding methods are followed.

In the spring, summer and fall there are many crops for pasturing hogs, but during the winter the crops to select from are limited. On almost every farm the production and keeping of hogs in winter is expensive and generally it is not profitable, for the reason that large quantities of corn are fed without products of green crops. More winter grazing is needed, for which many crops are adapted. The most reliable are, however, rape, rye, oats, wheat and barley.

For grazing purposes these pasturing crops for hogs should be sown on specially well drained and prepared land that is either rich or has received a liberal application of manure. Good winter pasturage is not obtained except on the best drained lands.

The seeding should be heavy to insure a thorough planting. The young plants will grow slowly in the winter and many plants will be needed to furnish plenty of pasture. Crimson clover will do well with rape, rye, oats, wheat and barley and will mean an improvement on the land.

A DURABLE STACK COVER.

Will Be Found Convenient to Use For Many Purposes.

A very durable stack cover can be made of boards in sections about four feet wide by six feet long. Place four boards one inch by four feet by six inches side by side and fasten together with braces. Paint joints on upper side and paint bats before covering the joints. Do not run bats way to the top, but run one bat along the top, extending over about two inches on half of them and put no bats on the other half, so that the bat will cover them both. Put bats on right side of each section so that it will cover the edge of next section. Place barn hasps on the bats so that they will fit staples on the companion section. Care should be taken to get these hasps and staples rightly located. These covers will be found to be very convenient to use as stack covers and for machinery, chicken coops, pig shade, cattle shade, etc. Being light and movable, they can be put to a great number of uses and, being rigid, are not easily blown away, nor will they sag.—*Lowa Homestead.*

Winter Care of Peach Trees. Peach trees are especially subject to the attacks of the San Jose scale. The bark of infested trees is covered with a crust of grayish scales, the insects multiplying rapidly and finally killing the tree. The remedy is spraying with lime-sulphur during the winter. When trees are badly infested it may be necessary to prune them back severely before applying the spray. Take care to burn all the wood cut from the trees.

Electricity For Chickens.

Before the London Royal Society of Arts, Thorne Baker, the electrician, advocated the application of electricity to chicken farming. Experiments, he said, had proved that chickens could be grown under electric stimulus at about double the normal rate and with a mortality practically nonexistent. An induction coil giving a one inch spark could successfully treat 1,000 chickens.

Mr. Callahan, on behalf of himself and wife, thanked the donors for the gift of the kind wishes, and expressed regret at leaving so many warm friends. Lunch was served by the ladies, a number of speeches made, all regretting the family's departure, and a very enjoyable time spent in music and dancing. The address was read by Mr. Joseph Woodcock, and Mr. Wiley made an efficient chairman.

Hydro-Electric Radial Meeting

The mass meeting called for Friday evening was not so largely attended as was expected. At 8 o'clock about twenty-five people sat chatting around the stove in the Lyceum, and when the meeting was called to order some 15 minutes later, not more than 100 were present. Probably 75 or 100 more dropped in before the meeting was concluded.

Reeve Stapleford presided, and in his introductory remarks urged that the delegates appointed on the deputation to Ottawa should also join the delegation to the Minister of Public Works re free gravel from the St. Clair river.

The speakers were Mayor Sturtevant, Petrolia; Mayor Graham, of London; J. H. Fowler, of London; and May Pettypiece, of Forest. The speeches were all good and were attentively listened to.

Mayor Sturtevant, as county representative, explained at some length the plans of the Hydro-Electric and Radial Commission and urged the uniformity of the different municipalities of the county in helping to carry out the scheme. Survey of the county will be made shortly, and Lambton will likely be one of the first counties to be served. He could not conjecture where or in what direction the lines would run. The terminals, population, and products of the district, and points of least resistance in construction would be decided first. The report made after the survey would give the probable cost of construction including the right of way; and tell whether operating of the projected lines would pay a surplus or leave a deficit. Negotiations would then be made with the municipalities through which the projected lines would run, and estimates laid before the electors and a vote taken to authorize the construction. If the vote is favorable debentures will be issued. The Commission takes the debentures, which will not be offered for sale. At the end of 30 years it is expected that the profits of the roads will be sufficient to wipe out the obligation, the debentures will then be handed back to the municipalities and the future profits of the roads belong to the people. Any surplus over expenses would be used to decrease rates. He explained how light and power could be utilized for 8 or 9 miles on either side of the radials and thus endow the users and the country generally. All that is necessary is the backing up of the municipalities.

Federal Subsidy for Hydro-Radial Lines

To support the hands of the municipalities promoting the Hydro-radial enterprise, Mr. Thomas Marshall (Monck) has given notice of a resolution dealing with the matter. It recites the advantages to be derived from cheap and rapid rural transportation, and declares: "Our prompt manner in which this question has been taken up by the Chairman of the Hydro-electric Power Commission, and would respectfully memorialize the Government of the Dominion of Canada to grant to Hydro-electric radial railways constructed by or for the benefit of the municipalities of the Province under the direction of the Hydro-electric Power Commission a subsidy in all respects equal to that granted to steam railways under the provisions of the act governing the granting of subsidies to aid in the construction of railways."

Tax Reform

The second reading of Mr. R. J. McCormick's bill in the Legislature for a change in assessment matters was before the House on Monday. The Globe says: "Mr. McCormick explained that his bill amounted to local option in taxation. He maintained that the people in townships, villages and cities had a right to raise their taxes whichever way they chose, and that improvements should not be taxed as much as they were at present. He pointed out that New Zealand and the Province of Alberta had already adopted the system which the bill proposed, and contended that Ontario should not stand still and allow other communities to go ahead. With regard to the city of Toronto, he believed that if taxes were taken off improvements and put more on the land that building would go ahead and it would be a benefit in more ways than one.
