USEFUL HINTS.

Cross bridging between floor beams should be of 1 1/4 x 3-inch stock, and from 5 to 8 feet between rows. The rows should be continuous, so that each strut may abut directly opposite the ends of others in the row.

The usual method of removing old paint by scraping or burning it off is extremely laborious, and too slow for general purposes. A more thorough and expeditious way is by chemical process, using for that purpose a solution of soda and quicklime in equal proportion. The solution may be made as follows: The soda is dissolved in water, the lime is then added, and the solution is applied with a brush to the old paint. A few moments are sufficient to remove the coats of paint, which may be washed off with hot water. The oldest paint may be removed by a paste of the soda and quicklime. The wood should afterward be washed with vinegar or an acid solution before repainting to remove all traces of the alkali. The advantage of the use of alkali solution over the scraping or burning off of the paint is in leaving the surface in better condition for working upon.

LEGAL DECISIONS.

TRUDEAU VS. DALLAIRE.—This was a case in the Superior Courts at Montreal, in which the plaintiff alleged that by a contract *sous seing prive* of 30th November, 1888, he was to furnish the defendant with 100 toises of stone, to be delivered at St. Henri and Ste. Cunegonde. The defendant accepted six toises, the price of which amounted to \$48, but refused to receive the rest. The plaintiff claimed \$100 damages, beside \$48 for the stone accepted. The court maintained the action, and gave judgment for the \$148 demanded.

American slate varies from 167 lbs. to 181 lbs. per cubic foot, good purple slate averaging 174 lbs. Slates vary from 3/4 to 7-16 in. in thickness. Slating is always measured by the square of 100 feet sup. In measuring slating, the width of the eaves is to be allowed, measured at the widest part. Eaves, hips, valleys, combings and cuttings against walls, are to be measured extra. Allowing 1 foot width, by whole length of such work. Openings less than 3 feet square are not to be deducted.

All lead, tin or other metal work, flashings, valleys, etc., are extra. Chimneys and flues are not deducted, and cuttise around them measured lineal, 1 foot wide.

For curved plans, 1/3 of the superficial dimensions is to be allowed extra.

For borders, figures and any change of colors in plain work an extra charge is made. Also, for work on steeples, towers, and on perpendicular surfaces.—*Building Trades Journal*

When varnish is being used from a can only at long intervals, the can should be closed each time after taking out the required quantity with a cork that will go down level with the top of the nozzle, and this should be plastered with melted rosin or hard soap to exclude the air and keep the remaining varnish from getting thick and tough.

CONTRACTS OPEN.

LAKE MEGANTIC, QUE.—A new R. C. church will be erected.

GEORGETOWN, ONT.—The town council are talking about water works.

INGERSOLL, ONT.—Plans have been prepared for the new Baptist church.

WINDSOR, ONT.—A large flour mill will be constructed on the Pulling & Hanna sub-division.

TILSONBURG, ONT.—The Ridout St. Methodist church will build a parsonage to cost \$3,000.

BAILLIORNO, ONT.—Tenders are being asked for a new Anglican church to be built this summer.

GUELPH, ONT.—A site has been granted the Fat Stock Club for the erection of an exhibition building.

LONDON, ONT.—Tenders will be immediately asked for the erection of extensive additions to the Talbot street and Waterloo street schools.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—The Public School Board has decided to employ Mr. Stewart, of Hamilton, to draw up plans for the new Central school.

HAMILTON, ONT.—The continuation of the block paving on Cannon street east to about half a mile beyond the city limits is being proposed.

DELHI, ONT.—The Presbyterians will build a new church.—The site for a new school house has been selected, and operations will begin immediately.

BERLIN, ONT.—The congregation of St. John's church have decided to erect this season a new church costing about \$5,000, with a seating capacity of 300.

HALIFAX, N. S.—A meeting will be held to consider the question of the erection of an art school building.—An Oddfellows' temple, to cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000, will be erected.

BOWMANVILLE, ONT.—Tenders will be received by Messrs. Knox, Elliot & Jarvis, Queen and Victoria Sts., Toronto, until noon of the 12th inst., for the erection of a small church here.

MONTREAL, QUE.—The Roads Committee recommend that Place D'Armes hill, St. Lambert hill and Barrack street be paved with granite blocks, at an estimated cost of \$5,000, \$6,000 and \$16,000 respectively.—St. Lawrence market will be enlarged.—Improvements to cost upwards of \$4,000 will be made to Bonsecours market.

WINNIPEG, MAN.—Improvements are to be made to the Legislative buildings during the coming summer.—Notice of incorporation of the Winnipeg Grand Opera House Company is given, with a capital of \$50,000.—Two opera house building projects are on foot here. Both it is said are to be carried out this season.—An appropriation of \$5,362 appears in the Dominion Government's supplementary estimates for repairs to the Manitoba Penitentiary.

BROCKVILLE, ONT.—Mr. M. Dunham will erect a brick block consisting of three stores, four stories.—Mr. Liston, architect, is preparing plans for alterations to R. Bowes' brewery, this city; parsonage and improvements for R. E. church, Spencerville; and block of stores for Mr. N. Larmour, Cornwall.—Mr. Allan, architect, has in course of preparation plans for a residence for himself to cost about \$4,000; public school at Winchester, to cost about \$15,000; Lansdowne township hall, to cost about \$6,000; and a residence here for Mr. Ault, estimated cost \$6,000.

OTTAWA, ONT.—The supplementary estimates just brought down by the Government include: Welland Canal, \$15,450; Toronto examining

warehouse, purchase of water lots, additional amount required, \$4,000; Petrolia public buildings, \$4,000; Brantford post office and custom house, \$700; Toronto post office improvements, \$5,800; Toronto custom house sanitary works, \$2,200; Owen Sound, dredging entrance channel, \$4,000; Kingsville, repairs, \$1,200; Georgian Bay, removal of Robertson rocks in main passage between Clapperton and Croker's Island, \$3,000; Beaverton Wharf, \$5,000; Scugog River improvements at Lindsay, \$3,000; Wiarton, to complete breakwater, \$9,000; Saugven River, \$1,600; Big Bay, north Keppel, \$2,000; Thornbury, dredging, \$3,000; Parry Sound narrows, \$6,000; Goderich harbor, \$2,500. Among the harbor and river appropriations are \$123,150 for Nova Scotia, \$16,200 for Prince Edward Island, \$43,350 for New Brunswick, \$55,300 for Quebec, \$57,300 for Ontario, \$2,000 for Manitoba, \$8,500 for British Columbia.

TORONTO, ONT.—The Water Works Superintendent recommends that the pumping capacity be increased by replacing the No. 1 Worthington engine by a high duty engine having a daily capacity of eight to ten million gallons.—New water mains are recommended to be constructed on Preston Avenue from end of main to Hallam Avenue, Manchester Avenue, from end of main Ossington Avenue to Shaw St.; Dewson St., from end of main Dovercourt to Rusholme Roads, Batty Avenue, east from Broadview Avenue.—Mr. Jos. Connolly, architect, has prepared plans for improvements to be made to St. Michael's Cathedral, to cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000.—Messrs. Denison & King's plans for a branch library building to be erected on College street, have been approved.—A sub-committee of the city council has decided to recommend a grant of \$20,000 towards the erection of an industrial school for girls.—Ald. Ritchie has given notice of motion that plans be prepared for a new fire hall on Dundas street.—The city council has appropriated \$2,100 for the erection of a dog pound.—The citizens will be asked to vote \$50,000 for the erection of a public abattoir.—Tenders will be asked for the erection of a new conservatory at Horticultural Gardens.—The congregation of Bonar Presbyterian church have completed arrangements for the erection of a new church on Lansdowne Avenue.—A site has been purchased from the University of Toronto on which the new Wycliffe College will be erected. Thomson, five 3-storey bk. stores and offices north side Adelaide street, opposite Grand Opera House, cost \$18,000; G. W. Hunter, pair 2-storey and attic bk. dwellings, Czar street, cost \$6,000; J. & J. Taylor Safe Works, 2-storey bk. add. to factory, Frederick street, cost \$10,000; George Dermott, pair 2-storey and attic bk. fronted dwellings, Ontario street, north of Gerrard, cost \$2,400; R. G. Trotter, alterations and additions to dwelling, corner Belmont and Bloor streets, cost \$2,000.

One of the most satisfactory wax finishes for wood is made by boiling a quarter of a pound of white wax with one ounce of pearl ash and one quart of water.
